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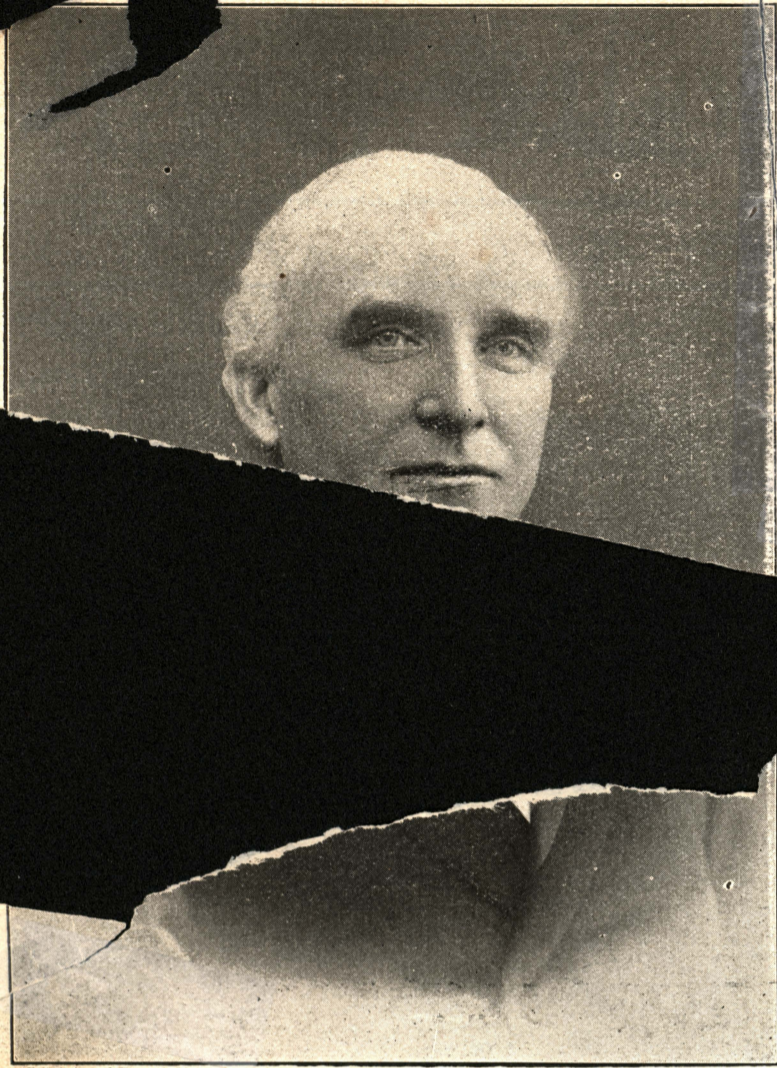

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Epworth League Rally Day.

The Epworth League of Archer Memorial M. E. Church attended the rally at Pearl River, July 1st, 1904. It had been decided that all go in one wagon. The trip was very pleasantly anticipated, but when the morning of July 1st dawned the sky was dark and lowering. Many anxious faces were turned heavenward and silent prayers were breathed to Him who rules the storms. At the time appointed for assembling at Archer Hall the sky had cleared and a powerful team of prancing horses, with a smiling young Epworthian driver, awaited us. Soon a party of seventeen enthusiastic Epworthians were on the way to the rally.

The afternoon was all that could be desired. The clouds had passed away and a gentle breeze had sprung up. God had once more proved to His children the blessed promise, "Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my name ye shall receive."

All seemed happy as the stout horses sped on their way. Songs of thanksgiving, joy and praise echoed and reechoed through the deep forests. The ride over hill and dale was most delightful. In about two hours we reached our destination, Pearl River, a place much to be admired and never to be forgotten, situated on the N. Y. & N. J. R. R. and overlooking the beautiful river from which it derives its name. We soon reached the beautiful church overlooking the village and river and were received by the genial pastor of group No. 3, Rev. Frank Chadwick, Spring Valley, N. Y. Each delegate was presented with a beautiful souvenir badge bearing the league colors. The afternoon session had commenced when we arrived but we were in time to hear the beautiful solo by Miss Nellie Bogert, Pearl River. The speaker for the afternoon was Rev. C. L. Mead, D. D., of Hoboken, N. J. His subject, "The making of manhood," was exceedingly interesting. The session closed with the doxology and benediction. We were then invited to refreshments in Unique hall, a beautiful building overlooking the river, and about fifteen minutes walk from the church. About sixty delegates sat down to supper, having sung John Wesley's famous song of grace, tune "Old

Hundred:"

"Be present at our table, Lord; Be here and everywhere adored; These creatures bless and grant that we May feast in paradise with Thee."

The supper was one worthy of much praise and one the delegates only can appreciate; words cannot express how beautifully we were entertained. May God's blessing rest upon his servants who had worked so willingly to advance his cause.

After supper was finished we listened to a number of interesting after dinner speeches by Dr. Felter, Mr. Knox and Rev. J. W. Dally of Pearl River, Rev. W. A. Knox, Rev. M. H. Blauvelt and A. T. Ryerson of Allendale. Rev. Frank Chadwick acted as toast master. We then returned to the church for the evening session. Vesper service was conducted by our pastor, Rev. W. A. Knox, and an anthem, "Praise ye the Lord," was rendered by the choir. J. D. Dunlap of Spring Valley sang a beautiful solo. The address "A symmetrical life," by Rev. R. E. Bell of New York city, was highly appreciated.

The rally closed with the benediction. After thanking our sister league for the hospitality and kindness of her members we started on the return trip. It had been raining but was now clear. Soon the moon rose in all the beauty of its fullness and a sense of the sweet peace of God who made the moon and stars, filled our hearts. We reached Allendale at twelve o'clock. As we went to our different homes we felt that indeed this had been a day of thanksgiving, singing and praising God. 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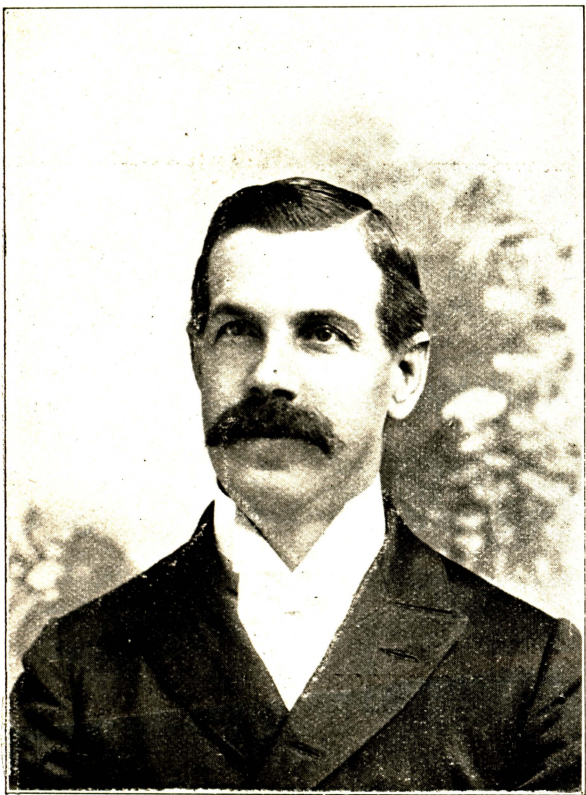
