Flood Control Commission Appointed

New Parking Regulations For Shoppers

Chief Forshay today announced new traffic regulations for the Allendale motorists. They are as follows:

There will be No Parking for the motorist in front of the Stop and Shop market from 9 a.m. till noon, every day. This place will be reserved for trucks only. After that time no trucks will be allowed to park there, only pleasure cars.

No double parking signs will be placed on both sides of Allendale Avenue in the business section. This traffic violation will be strictly enforced.

A truck parking zone only will be created alongside of Leff's "Allendale Spa" although the red buses will continue to discharge and pick up passengers.

There will be two pedestrian crossing signs placed, one in front of the post office and the other in front of Towne Cleaners. Motorists are asked not to park in these cross walks. The street will be marked off in white stripes. Pedestrians are asked to cross there.

There will be no parking on the south side of East Allendale Avenue from the Turnpike to Powell road.

No parking on the south side of East Orchard street.

Chief Forshay, when asked the reason for these two regulations stated "in case of a fire, the trucks could not go through these streets with parking on both sides as is the case during Church services."

The parking of pleasure cars in front of the market on W. Allendale Avenue has been the reason of double parking on the part of truck drivers and this did create a dangerous condition for drivers entering the street from Myrtle Avenue. All deliveries will be made in the rear or side of the building after lunch and this should give the shoppers some sorely needed space.

Additional pedestrian crossings on Allendale Avenue will be laid out in the near future.

McCord, Fowler Represent Boro For County Aid

Relief for the long suffering flood victims of Allendale was started last night by the mayor and council when a resolution was introduced to form a permanent Flood Control Commission. They are to work in conjunction with neighboring communities in the widening and clearing of all waterways which will include the Ho-Ho-Kus Brook that caused most of the damage last month.

Councilman Frank McCord and Mr. A. Fowler of the planning board were appointed to serve. Members of the council will be called upon to aid if needed.

Another step in the same direction was made to clear up a annual trouble spot when the council instructed Borough engineer Beswick to work with the Low development on Elmwood and find costs of fixing a drain across the street to prevent flooding every spring and winter. Property owners in that street will be asked to aid in controlling surface water.

A resolution asked by the Planning Board that would just about eliminate any more gas stations in the borough was referred back to that body after considerable discussion by the council.

Councilman Groszick spoke on the raising of additional revenue for the Boro by a new license on amusements and a beverage license. No action was taken by the council.

All members of the council were present and Mayor Johnson conducted the meeting that ended at 10:10 p.m.

TALBOT DUNN FILMS ENTERTAIN MENS CLUB

The Archer Memorial Men's Club was entertained last Thursday evening by two different, but equally interesting, talks, illustrated in one instance by movies, and in the other, by slides, both in color.

Mr. Talbot Dunn of Allendale described a trip to Labrador, which he and his family made last summer, and showed the moving pictures that he took en route.

The Dunns drove to Sidney, Nova Scotia, ferried across to Newfoundland, then rode for 26 hours on a narrow gauge train to St. John's, on the opposite side of the island of Newfoundland, where they boarded a steamer for the trip up the Labrador coast.

The boat from Newfoundland, which runs from the time that the ice leaves the harbors of Lunenburg, about the middle of September, takes about 12 days for the round trip to Hopedale, about halfway up the coast of Labrador. The duration of the trip, and dates of arrival at any given port, are dependent on the vagaries of the fog, which makes navigation impossible. The Dunns were lucky, for they were away only 36 hours by the fog.

The boat on which they traveled served for freight, hospital facilities, and general utility purposes, and is the only link between the inhabitants of the Labrador coast and the outside world. During the months of the year when the harbors are ice-bound, communication is by dog sled, except for an airplane that makes an annual mail trip at Christmas.

The boat makes about 3 to 6 stops each day, usually anchoring offshore, as most of the ports have no docks to accommodate it. The townspeople come out, dressed in their best clothes, and buy tobacco, candy, and other luxury items, selling or transporting liquor is forbidden by law but occasionally some is smuggled in by a sailor.

The Dunns saw at least one iceberg every day during their boat trip, except the last day, and saw the Northern lights every night. The days were unusually long, and in July, dusk came about 11:30 p.m., while the nights were cold with temperatures close to freezing.

Mrs. Lawrence Landrine of Maywood showed a number of slides taken during hunting trips on which she accompanied her husband to Maine, and to the Catskills, during the last few years.

During a trip to Maine a few years ago, Mrs. Landrine shot a black bear, which puts her in the select class of female Nimrods who can stalk and kill the big game.
