Petty Thief Eludes Capture At Crestwood

Proclamation

The Korean War has meant untold suffering and anguish to the Korean people. Three million innocent civilians have perished. Ten million other Koreans are homeless. And many more are without clothing sufficiently warm to insure their survival of the forthcoming winter months.

Before these destitute people can begin the long hard task of rebuilding their ruined land, they must first prepare themselves against the certainty of bitter cold and the very real possibility of freezing death. Their need is great. They must have blankets and warm clothing—more than they can possibly make for themselves. Their survival of the approaching winter depends entirely upon the warm generosity of their neighbors to the East.

Their need invokes our greatest sympathy, not only because their plight is so desperate, but also because their nation has been the battleground of one of freedom's most heroic stands. Our boundless compassion for the citizens of Korea awakes in all of us a desire to come speedily to the assistance of these unfortunate people in their hour of greatest need.

Accordingly, therefore I, Alfred E. Driscoll, Governor of the State of New Jersey, do hereby proclaim the month of August as

Collection of Clothing For Korea Month

and urge the nearly five million citizens of New Jersey to join whoheartedly in the spirit and purpose of this collection campaign.

To this end, I call upon the Mayors and governing bodies of every municipality in New Jersey to designate one or more public buildings as Local collection depots from which volunteer New Jersey truckers will carry the donated supplies to a central point for shipment to Korea; and

I do further call upon the newspapers, churches, veterans organizations, boy and girl scouts and other civic and charitable groups to lend every effort to the success of this crusade.

SURVEY ON SCHOOL MADE IN BOROUGH

A recent survey has been made of the conditions of the schools in this suburban area and the following is the report of the local school situation; Allendale was one of the towns which found it necessary to readvertise for bids on an eight room addition to its lone public school, where original bids were in excess of the amount of money appropriated.

The original appropriation, approved at a referendum, was for \$213,000 but an additional \$47,000 had to be approved to meet the minimum costs.

The addition is expected to meet the town's needs for at least five years. Some part time sessions were necessary last year, but the addition will permit full time sessions again this year.

Thomas Under New Inquiry On Paper Purchase

A new Federal investigation into the financial affairs of J. Parnell Thomas, former congressman, has been ordered by United States Attorney Grover C. Richman, it was announced Monday. The government wants to know if he has assets or income sufficient to pay a \$10,000 fine imposed when he was convicted in 1949 of pay roll padding and accepting salary kickbacks during his term of service in Washington.

Mr. Richman said he ordered the investigation after hearing, through newspaper reports that Mr. Thomas and certain unnamed associates did form a publishing company to buy three newspapers in the Ridgewood area. Reported purchase price for the good will and subscription list is reported between \$5,000 and \$10,000, which does not include equipment.

"We intend to collect the fine," Mr. Richman said. "If an informal inquiry shows that Thomas has acquired income to go into the publishing business we will make a formal investigation with the view of making him pay the fine."

He said that he has assigned John J. Corcoran Jr., assistant United States attorney to make the investigation. Mr. Corcoran conducted a check into Mr. Thomas's assets before but was unable to find any. The Department of Justice is said to be holding deeds to certain pieces of property as collateral for the fine.

Mr. Thomas, a Republican now 56, served seven straight terms in the House of Representatives from this district. He was at one time chairman of the House Committee on Un-American activities. Upon his conviction he was sentenced to six to 18 months in jail and fined \$10,000. He was paroled last September after serving eight and a half months of the sentence.

The weekly newspapers bear the same name, "Community Press", and are published in Ridgewood, Ho-Ho-Kus and Glen Rock. They claim a 5,000 circulation.

EMPLOYMENT FIGURES SHOW BIG INCREASE
Total employment in June reached 61.8 million, up 600,000 from May and about 300,000 higher than in June of last year.

Unemployment rose in June to almost two million, from 3 million in May. This was due chiefly to job seeking students and recent graduates. There was no important change in the number of adult workers who were jobless in June.

Students, however, have an easier time finding jobs. Only 20 percent of those wanting jobs failed to find them in June. Last year it was 30 percent.

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THE FORGOTTEN MEN

Twice a year, in April and November, there is a stir in our community as we select the men we want to represent us in Washington and Trenton. Sometimes the "stir" is so feeble that Primary Day and Election Day come and go and we do not even bother to cast our vote. At other times, as in the last election, we become incensed at the laxity of our representatives and determine there must be a change. We discuss the issues with our friends and neighbors, sometimes with dire results. We listen to the radio and hear both sides; we even buy two or three opposing newspapers in order to study the pros and cons. We listen to the different candidates; we consider how each will measure up to the task to which he is committing himself. On election day we go to the poles. In the privacy of the booth, we pull the lever that determines our choice of candidates. Perhaps as we emerge through the withdrawn curtain we feel that, as good citizens, we have done our duty and then go home and forget the whole episode.

The men we have named to represent us in Washington and Trenton truly become the "Forgotten men".

For instance, how many of us are aware of what Congressman William B. Widnall has been doing in the House of Representatives lately?

He has just introduced a bill to create a select committee authorized to conduct a complete and full investigation and study of the guaranteeing and insuring loans for housing by the Veterans Administration and the Housing and Home Finance Agency including the Federal Housing Administration.

Such a bill is geared to check the faulty workmanship which has been prevalent in many houses built under FHA and VA guarantee. Many homes have been built on plots with bad sub-surface water conditions. In many instances, drainage and sewage have been improper.

Such a committee as the bill would authorize could determine whether guarantees have been issued on loans without proper protection to the borrower as to the construction of the home. In this way any improper practices could be exposed and insure to the veteran and other purchasers of FHA and VA mortgage homes that the loan guarantee signifies that the home has been constructed properly.

Senator H. Alexander Smith and Senator Robert C. Hendrickson are protesting the failure of the Federal Communications Commission to allocate any educational TV channels to the State of New Jersey.

They have asked for an oral hearing, pointing out that New Jersey is the only State in the country for which no educational channel would be specifically authorized.

We have just cited at random some of the things our men in Washington are doing. Why don't we write our Senators and let them know how we feel about what they are doing?

It will strengthen their hands to know that behind them are interested citizens who have not forgotten the men who are in the front line at home.
