To Break Ground For New Archer Hall Sun.

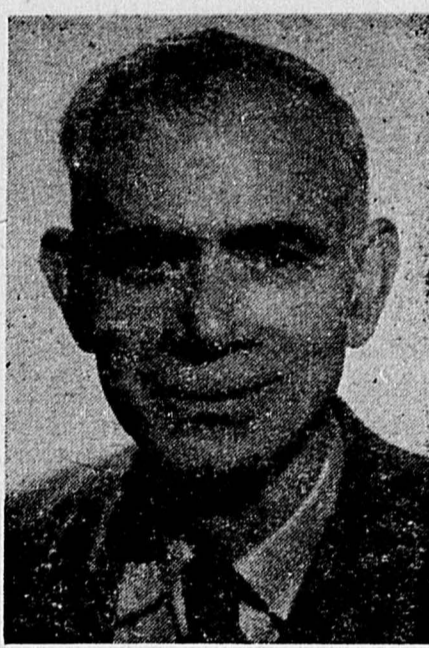

CANDIDATES ANSWER PUBLIC

Your roving reporter in wandering around town found that many of the residents in Allendale are concerned about what is happening in the Borough and what may develop in the near future. The management of the Borough is in the hands of the Mayor and Council and some people thought it would be good to know how prospective councilmen feel about some of the problems facing the Borough.

A group of questions were posed by responsible citizens and sent to each candidate and we are pleased to print the questions and answers as they came to our desk.

Referring to the various questions asked by you of all the candidates running for councilmen at the approaching election, a discussion was held amongst the undersigned as a result of which answers are submitted:

Leonard Baum, Michel Pasquier, John E. Wattles.

Q. What do you propose to do about keeping Borough taxes from going higher?

The Taxpayers League
A. By referendum, the people of the Borough of Allendale have committed themselves to a school addition which will have to be paid for by the taxpayers. This expenditure is of sufficient proportion that it will contribute to a further sizeable increase in taxes next year; and, nothing can be done about it.

On the other hand, expenditures necessary for Local Government will be kept at a minimum consistent with following this policy for efficient government. Therefore, following this policy, it is hoped to keep taxes within reasonable limits.

Mr. Illingworth answers

A. I will make a careful analysis of all matters to come before the council, being certain that the borough will receive the maximum value for every taxpayers' dollar spent. I will aid in planning expansion of the borough with the intent of minimizing the number of schools required and preventing the necessity of an excessive sewerage system.

At the present time it is impossible for anyone to prevent taxes from going higher, as the country is in an economic condition where the tendency is toward increased expenditures of all types. Regardless of the present trend, it behooves all public officials to finecomb all current expenditures so that money is not spent unnecessarily.

The tax rate last year was held down to some extent by financing the school on a calendar year basis instead of continuing it on a fiscal year basis. This eased the pain of a much higher tax rate but the carry-over will be reflected in this coming year's tax rate. We are all aware of the increased cost of living. This in crease affects the expense of the town as well as individuals. We all want something for our money - good schools, police protection, a neat, clean, town good roads and adequate parking facilities - all this costs money. The Borough of Allendale is very fortunate to have excellent employees who are not only capable but diligent. These men are working for their living just as you and I, and they are entitled to a living wage. The equipment to help maintain the town in the condition in which you expect to see it, is another problem. Funds have not been set aside to replace the Borough's equipment, and a large sum of money must be appropriated with a resulting jump in the tax rate. I believe the Borough should set aside funds equal to the annual depreciation rate of the equipment. In this way, costly equipment could be replaced without increasing the tax rate in any one year.

Mr. McCord answers:
A. I cannot honestly say that I can see any way to keep the taxes from rising. The lion's share of the tax dollar goes to the school and the in-

creasing enrollment will necessitate a larger budget. I also look upon the following as necessities:

- A. Higher wages to full-time employees.
 - B. Laying aside funds to replace equipment. (This should have been done in the past, but wasn't).
- Aside from the above, increased labor and materials costs will run up expenditures for ordinary maintenance work.

Q. Are you in favor of sewers or storm drains in Allendale at this time, and why?

The Taxpayers League
A. This is a general question concerning the taxpayers of the Borough at large, and, therefore, it is a matter that should be resolved by referendum.

Mr. Illingworth:

A. I am not in favor of installing a sewerage system at this time. It is my belief that a critical drainage problem does not exist, however, storm drains are needed in a few locations and should be provided.

Mr. Hanson:
Due to the growth and expansion of the town the question of sewers and storm drains is rapidly becoming a major problem. When this situation finally comes to a head there will be no alternative, we will be compelled to install sewers and storm drains. However, at the present time I do not believe they are necessary.

Mr. McCord

A. I do not favor sewers at this time. The cost is too great and we will do well to wait until they are forced on us by the county.

Q. Do you favor the compulsory collection of garbage for the Borough?

The Taxpayers League
A. This also is a matter that should be decided by referendum.

Mr. Illingworth:

A. I would favor compulsory

collection of garbage by the borough providing a contract be arranged with a private scavenger that would lower the current rate without reduction of service.

Mrs. Hanson:

I am in favor of the compulsory collection of garbage for the Borough, however, I do not feel that it should be done at this time.

Mr. McCord

A. I do not favor compulsory garbage collection. To make this readily enforceable would require municipal operation or sub-contracting. Past experience indicates that most municipal operation results in poorer service.

Q. Do you favor the proposed bond issue for State Teachers Colleges?

The Taxpayers League
A. This question is presently on the ballot, and the answer will be furnished by the voters at the next General Election November 6th, 1951.

Mr. Illingworth:

A. This is a State rather than a Borough issue, hence, I do not feel the necessity of taking a public stand on the matter.

Mrs. Hanson:

This is not a local issue.

Mr. McCord

A. This is not a Borough problem. Anyone who knows me can make an informed guess as to how I shall vote, but my vote in this case is my own problem.

Q. What future plans would you favor for improving parking in the shopping area?

The Taxpayers League
A. The elected officials of the Taxpayers League during their prior terms of office while serving the Borough were responsible for the authorization of acquiring property, which has since been purchased, for this purpose. And, in the current year's Budget moneys have been appropriated to start this necessary improvement, and by the end of this year a portion of this improvement will have been accomplished and a substantial

parking area should be available for use.

Mr. Illingworth:

A. I am in complete support of a Planning Board's proposal of resurfacing and improving the area East of the Erie Railroad tracks and also behind Leff store, to permit the parking of fifty vehicles.

If future housing expansion, and the resultant increase in commuters, creates an additional parking problem, I would favor the improvement of the borough property, west of the Erie Station and in the general area of the Firehouse.

Mrs. Hanson:

A plan for adequate parking was formulated by the Planning Board and Master Plan Engineers after spending many hours discussing and looking at locations. When this plan was placed before the owners of the property in the shopping area a few of these owners failed to give their support to the Plan and it had to be dropped. However, money has been appropriated for parking facilities on the East Side of the track adjacent to the shopping area. This will be completed in the near future without any additional increase in the taxes.

Mr. McCord

A. We are at present restricted to the Plaza improvement. Attempts to obtain the cooperation of landowners in the business district have so far proved unsuccessful. Parking meters have been suggested, but my own experience in other towns seems to show that while these meters may produce some additional revenue, they do not relieve parking problems.

PENNY POSTAL OUT STARTING JANUARY 1

A bill to abolish the penny postcard and to raise postal rates \$117,000,000 a year was signed yesterday by President Truman.

Beginning January 1, 1952 postcards will cost two cents. The law does not change the three cent rate for ordinary first-class letters or affect existing air mail rates.

The following increases are authorized. A 10 per cent rise in second class mailing charges for newspapers and magazines effective April 1, 1952. The rate will jump another 10 per cent in 1953 and 1954 for a total increase of 30 per cent.

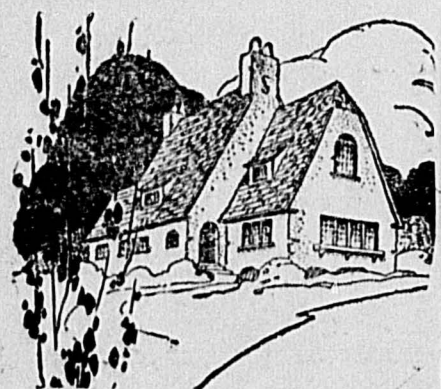
After June 20, 1953, an increase of one cent a piece to one and a half cents a piece for bulk mailing of third-class mail will be in effect. The increase in second and third class mail will not apply to non-profit religious, educational, scientific, philanthropic, agriculture, labor and veterans organizations.

A rise in the cost of special delivery stamps from 15 cents to 20 cents beginning January 1 will be in effect as well as increased charges for most postoffice special services such as insured and registered mail and C.O.D. deliveries.

The new rates will hardly make a nick in the postoffice deficit, which has been estimated at \$520,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952.

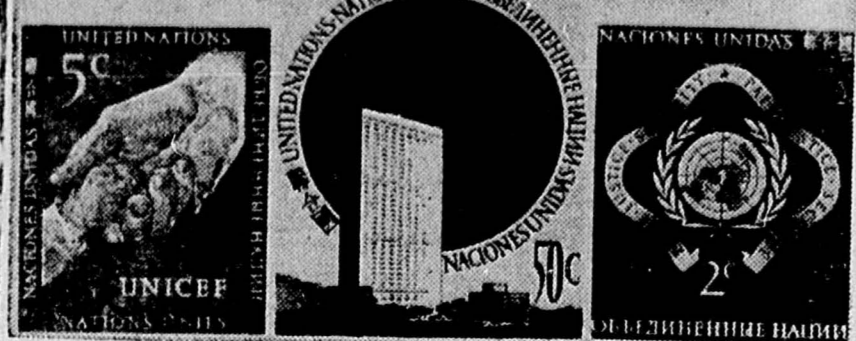

U.N. to Issue Own Postage Stamps



The United Nations postage stamps shown above will appear during the fall of 1951 and will be used in all mail sent from U.N. Headquarters. Under a recent agreement between U.N. and the United States, U.N. will issue its own postage stamps and will establish a United Nations Post Office to replace the U.S. Post Office now in operation at Headquarters. Ordinary stamps will be issued in 11 denominations. The airmail series will be issued in 4 denominations.

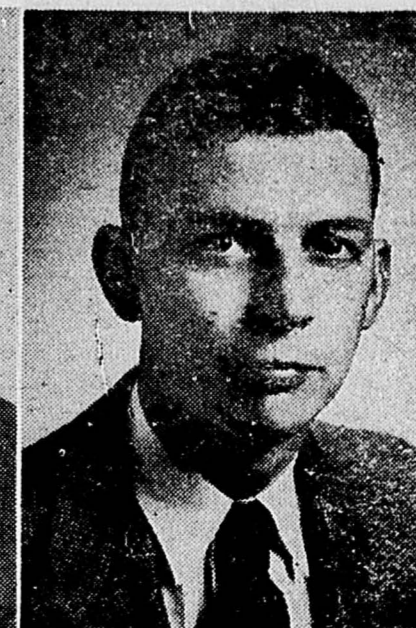

U.N. Aids Thailand's Health Campaign



Yaws—a crippling and disfiguring disease, mostly contracted in childhood has been for years the scourge of Thailand. In order to tackle the problem in a countrywide basis the Thai government recently called for United Nations' aid. A joint group of experts of UNICEF and the U.N. World Health Organization was rushed to Thailand to train local personnel and provide the necessary medical supplies. Here, a UNICEF/WHO Public Health Nurse leads a group of children to an open air clinic in the region of Ratchaburi.

STREETS AND CURBING FOR CRESCENT AVE.

A letter from Mrs. Robert S. Phair inquiring about sidewalks on Crescent Avenue, created quite a stir at last week's council meeting.

The council have been doing much of the preliminary work such as contacting property owners whose frontage would be affected by the installation of sidewalks. Some owners were most cooperative others had certain reservations.

In as much as Crescent Avenue is one of the town's main arteries, Mayor Johnson agreed with many of the townspeople who felt that permanent sidewalks should be put in at this time.

The Borough Attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance covering the acquisition of land and installation of curbs and sidewalks.

Borough Engineer Beswick was retained for a fee of \$100 to survey Harding Avenue and establish a grade.
