It Is Your Duty and Privilege To Vote

In the recent British General Election which aroused considerable interest around the world, it was estimated that about 85 per cent of the electorate voted. It has been reported that enthusiastic campaigners, on both sides, went out into the highways and byways, brought in the aged and infirm, just so long as a vote could be cast.

It would be a fine thing if we could absorb some of that enthusiasm for our election on Tuesday. Granted that the local issues may not be so spectacular as those of a nation fighting to determine whether it shall have a socialist or conservative form of government, yet at the local and county level we should be concerned with returning men and women to office whose names should mean more to us than just those of candidates on an election ballot.

Before you go to the polls, and that, of course, is assuming that you will exercise the inestimable privilege of the franchise, have you given any thought to the qualifications and platforms of your candidates? Locally, you are asked to choose from among six candidates, three who will direct the affairs of your Borough in the difficult days that lie ahead. Are you being thoughtful in your selection or don't you care? Remember, the future of your borough depends upon the councilmen you return with full powers to act for you.

Something additional on the ballot will be the bond issue of \$15 million for the construction of additional facilities for teacher training, to enable New Jersey to secure and prepare the thousands of new teachers needed to take care of the rapidly increasing enrollments in our schools. The conditions in our teachers training colleges are disgraceful and the only way they can be remedied is by the substitution of the old out-moded buildings with modern constructions, adequate for the job that has to be done. This takes money, hence the proposed bond issue. Give this matter your thoughtful consideration and put your mark in the right box.
