## SCHOOL BOARD HEARS CRITICISM ON LIBRARY

Mrs. John Lothian, chairman of the PTA library committee, stated at a board meeting held Monday that the library is not being used to its fullest extent by the children. She suggested that the services of a part time librarian, the use of a larger room, and the reclassification of books might tend to

make the functions of the library more adequate. However, lack of money precluded the possibility of doing anything at this time about the first two suggestions, excellent as they are.

The basis for her facts was not questioned by the board and her source of information was not given.

Mrs. Geismar and Mrs. Kanning were appointed by the Board to investigate her contention that the library is being used by only 25 per cent of the students.

Paul D. O'Connor, school principal, reported a total enrollment of 346 for October with an attendance of 94.775 percent.

Judy Anderson has been receiving bedside teaching from Mrs. Buhlman and two high school teachers began bedside teaching this week in the case of Robert Creighton.

In observance of Education Week parents were invited to attend school Wednesday and visit their children's rooms during regular class periods.

Mr. Odo and his football team have had a successful season so far, having won from Saddle River, Franklin Lakes and Wyckoff. The games with Ramsey and Waldwick were lost and two games are still to be played.

The Board has been unable to hire a physical education teacher but will pay Mr. Odo \$150 for the first semester and \$150 for the second semester for the extra work he has done in athletics.

The nurse's report indicated that the health program is progressing satisfactorily.

2,705 meals were served in the cafeteria in October at a slight deficit.

Stephen Van Houten addressed the Board on the subject of insurance and since additional insurance will have to be acquired to cover the new addition, it was thought advisable to revise the entire insurance set up.

James Standing and Mrs. Kanning were appointed as a committee to consult with the four insurance agents in the town and work out a program whereby the agents writing the policies would receive 40 per cent commission and the remaining 60 per cent would be shared equally by the remaining agents.

For lack of student participation, there will be no individual policies for the pupils this year, as there was last year at a cost of \$1.00 per pupil, paid by the parents.

James Standing and L. R. McPeck were appointed as a committee to set up a rental basis for organizations desirous of renting the school for meetings. They will also set (Please turn to Page 5)

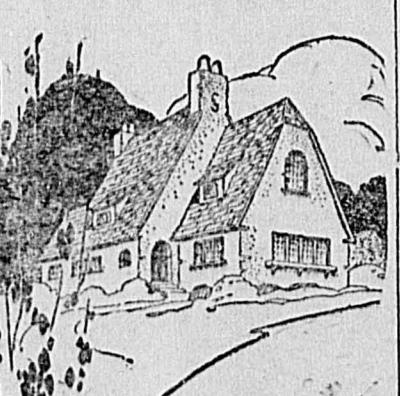

## COST OF OPERATION LOWEST IN BERGEN

Bergen not only has the lowest per capita cost of government of any of the 21 counties in New Jersey, but also shows the lowest per capita budget expenditures of any county for 1951.

This is reflected in the 1951 edition of County Finances, a study prepared by the New Jersey Taxpayers Association.

Budget expenditures include all operating costs, debt service and provision for capital improvement. In this respect, the survey shows that Bergen's per capita cost for 1951 is \$12.81 compared with \$36.69 for Ocean, highest of all 21 counties. The average per capita budget expenditures for all counties is \$29.33 which means Bergen's county government is operated at \$7.52 less than the State average.

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**Chief Cautions Drivers On Holiday Accidents**

Going home or visiting for Thanksgiving?

Lots of people are, and most of them are planning to drive, because they'll be taking the whole family. And the best way for motorists to insure a happy Thanksgiving, Chief Marshal Robert Wilson warned yesterday, is to make adequate preparations before starting and to drive carefully on the way.

A sudden snowfall, or a sudden freeze, which may make rainy streets slippery, he pointed out, can easily lead to tragedy which will take all the joy out of Thanksgiving.

"Records show that sometime this winter the millionth person will die as a result of a traffic accident," Chief Wilson said. "It may be hastened during the Thanksgiving week end. To make sure you won't be one in a million, don't start on a trip until you know your car is safe for possible

winter weather driving. Hospitals and doctors have more than they can do already. Don't add to their burden."

Best things you can do before you start out, Chief Wilson suggested, are to be sure that your brakes are equalized,

Governor Bradford of Massachusetts decreed a day of Thanksgiving and the women of the country spent days in preparation of the feast. We are all familiar with the story of the hardships they encountered not only from the elements, but from the Indians, yet in the light of history, theirs is a story of triumph.

As we approach this Thanksgiving Day, when families are united, let us give a thought to those early settlers who worked, late and early, just to survive, but who never lost that love of liberty nor their faith in that God who had brought them safely to the Promised Land.

"Laws, freedom, truth and faith in God  
Came with those exiles o'er the waves;  
And where their pilgrim feet have trod  
The God they trusted, guards their graves  
And here Thy Name, O God of Love  
Their children's children shall adore  
Till these eternal hills remove,  
And Spring adorns the earth no more."

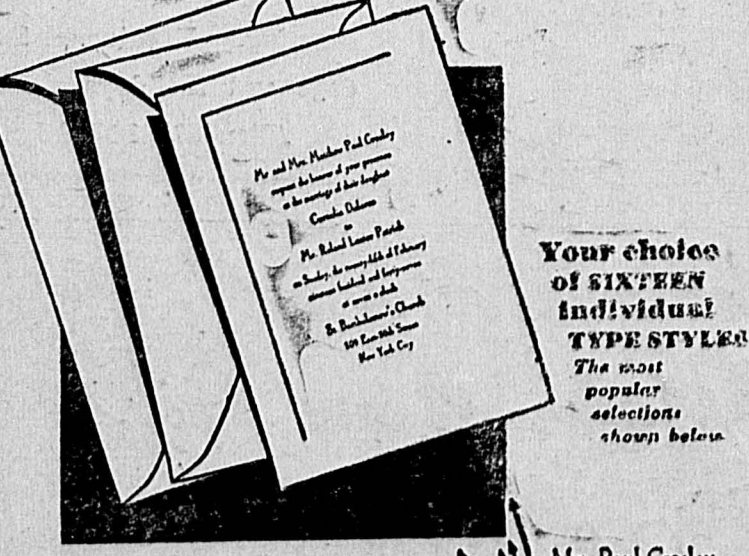

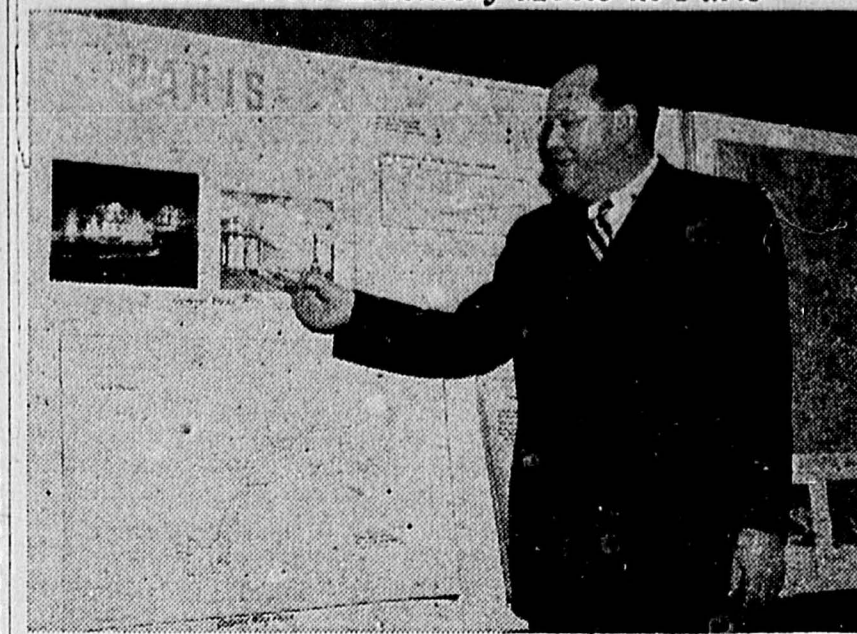
