## PLANNING BOARD ASKS BUILDERS TO POST BONDS

Budget problems took up most of the meeting of the Planning Board on Monday night at the Fire House. After considerable discussion a tentative figure of \$525. for operating and \$1,025 to complete the payments to the Master Planners for the borough. Mayor Johnson a member of all Boards, smiled rather ruefully, his headaches are starting early this year. This budget figure will be given to the council.

The percolation tests made by the Allendale Produce Gardens were unsatisfactory but other tests will be taken after grading before issuing occupancy permits. It was moved to approve Allendale Produce Garden map, subject to a performance bond of \$1,000 covering curb and pavement and grading according to site grading plan. A bond of not less than \$150 will be required covering maintenance of curbs.

A fee for examination of the grading for developers were set at \$20. and over. Engineer Beswick stated he would like some retired engineers to do this work.

Two applications for subdivisions were received by the board and turned over to the committee on sub. division. They were Harold Critchley. Please turn to page 10

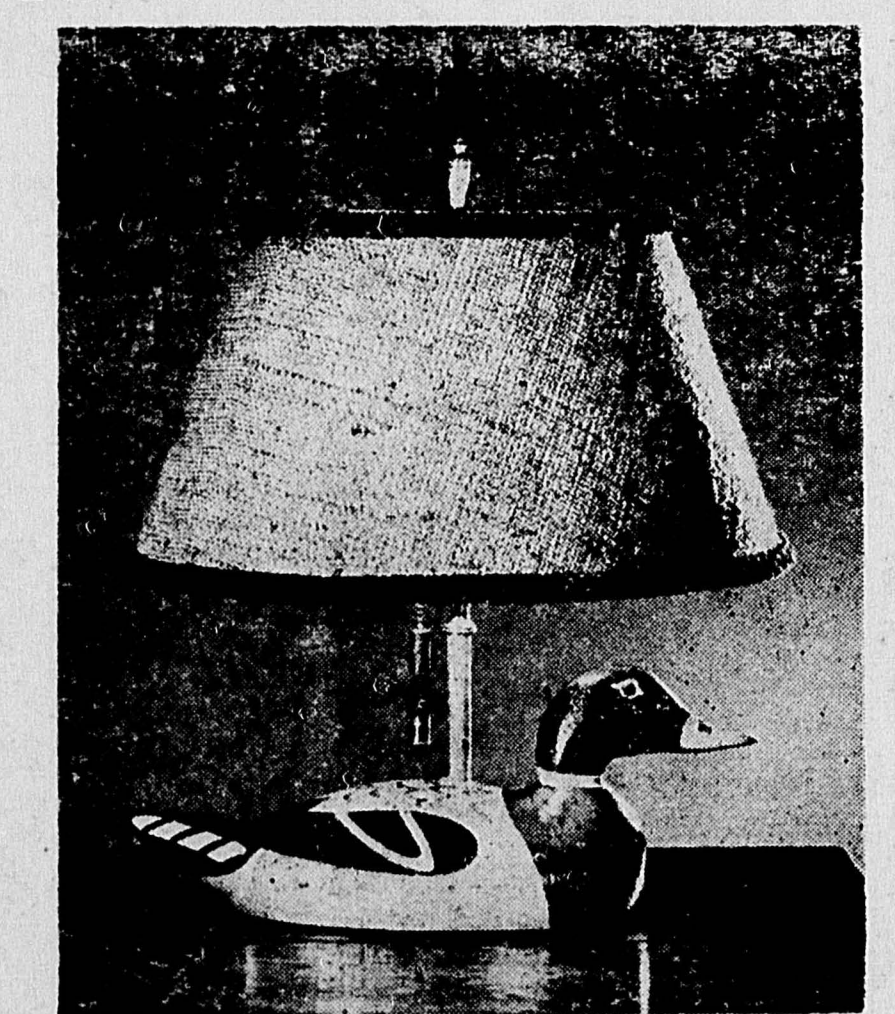

The Rev. Harry W. Goodrich conducted the memorial service which was eloquent in its simplicity. No flowery eulogy was necessary for a man whose life for more than a quarter of a century had been devoted to work among the young people of the community, a silent tribute to that service was a large group of high school boys who will be better men for having come under the influence of this good man.

Mrs. Gilbert Nichols, church organist, played as a prelude, some of Mr. Berdan's favorite hymns and Mrs. Truman Keet rendered, as a solo, his favorite hymn, "The Church's One Foundation."

In reviewing Mr. Berdan's many and varied activities in the church and in the community, his pastor recalled the significance of the Christmas season when a Babe, born in Bethlehem, became the hope of the world and of every Christian therein, and an inspiration for service. The loss to a church and community in the passing of such a man as Frank Berdan is hard to replace yet it is a challenge, to close ranks, and carry on as he would.
