First Aid Class Opens With Thirty Five Present

Archie Farrell, instructor in First Aid, was gratified at the response to the first class held Wednesday night at the Ambulance Corps Building. 35 interested citizens attended, including three ladies.

After enrollment, Farrell gave a short talk on the use of the hands in first aid and explained the uses of several new appliances. He also outlined the material to be covered in the subsequent meetings which will be held every Wednesday night at 8 p.m. Satisfactory completion of the courses will merit a diploma from the American Red Cross.

Wednesday will be the last opportunity for anyone to join this class which already includes air raid wardens, auxiliary police and members of the Allendale Ambulance Corps besides interested citizens who realize the value of such training. Farrell hopes that upon completion of the course, there may be several recruits for the Ambulance Corps.

Education and What It Costs You

"Education must be geared to the times and nothing less than the best will serve". This and similar statements we see everyday in the week as we scan our newspapers and read statements by educators, by laymen serving voluntarily on Boards of Education, by interested citizens serving on Borough Councils. We are particularly conscious of the expressions of such sentiments at this time when, in the very same papers, we see in cold figures what our desire for the best is going to cost us.

We, in Allendale, have an opportunity to get down to specific cases and know what our school is costing us, in dollars and cents. If you missed reading the extract of the budget in last week's Press, we suggest that you get a copy and sit down, leisurely and thoughtfully and study the budget, item by item. Members of the Board of Education have already spent many hours considering where expenditures may be cut without sacrificing efficiency in services or quality in workmanship. After all, Board members are taxpayers, too, and you can depend upon it, they have no intention of spending money foolishly.

However, this is still a democracy and every taxpayer has the right to challenge any item on the budget that seems to demand an explanation. However, one can only do that who has honestly and sincerely examined the budget.

On January 29, a public hearing will be held on the local school budget. This is when any questions which may have arisen from your study of the budget, will be answered by the men who know the reason for every item in the budget.

Now you may or may not be convinced that the increase of \$16,200 is necessary this year; but you still can do something about. On February 13 at the School election you may vote for or against the budget. That is your privilege.

What we are asking is that you know the why and wherefore of your budget and vote, not blindly, but intelligently. The welfare of your school and the future of your children depend upon decisions made today.

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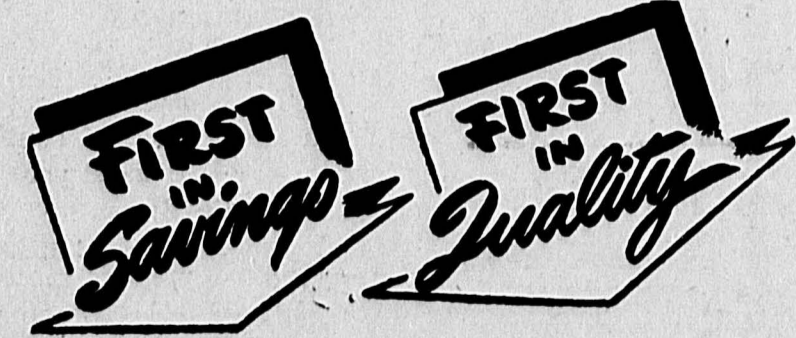
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THE WISE OLD OWL
