BLOOD MOBILE TO VISIT DARLINGTON

In order that the students and faculty of Immaculate Conception Theological Seminary might further the Red Cross Blood Program and participate in helping our wounded soldiers overseas, Father Cary, of the Seminary, has arranged with the Ramapo Valley chapter of the Red Cross to be host to a Bloodmobile at the Seminary on Wednesday April 2 from 12 noon to 6 p.m.

At the present time, 118 pledges have been received from the Seminary personnel, but in order to meet the quota of 125 pints of whole blood, it will be necessary to secure an additional 40 pledges. If you feel you would like to give life saving blood to our wounded men on the front and there is no doubt that it has saved many lives, will you contact the local Red Cross blood donor chairman in your own town or call Red Cross headquarters in Ramsey?

Those who have at any time in the past had jaundice will not be eligible to donate. Nor will those who have heart trouble, rheumatic fever, tuberculosis, undulant fever or malaria within two years; a major operation or a baby within one year; or a cold, anaemia, or sore throat at the time of donation be accepted as donors.

This will be the third visit of the Bloodmobile to the Ramapo Valley area, the others being on December 5, 1951 and the second, under the auspices of the American Legion in Waldwick on February 11, 1952.

FAULTY OIL BURNER DAMAGES LOCAL HOME

Mrs. John Wattles turned in a still alarm to the Fire Department Wednesday morning when the oil burner back fired and filled the house with smoke.

Prompt shutting down of the oil burner by Mrs. Wattles prevented any serious damage.

Over 125 interested citizens attended the council meeting last night when the subject of the installation of sidewalks on West Crescent Ave. was on the minds of all present. The occasion was a public hearing on the installation of sidewalks at the owner's expense. Failure to comply within 30 days will necessitate the Borough doing the work, and assessing the cost to the owner over a 5 or ten year period.

When the hearing opened, Ernest Arlt moved that the hearing be closed to give the people most concerned an opportunity to study maps with an engineer of their own choosing and to consult with attorneys retained to go over such information as is now available to the governing body.

Mayor Johnson claimed that the hearing could be continued to another meeting but all who had questions or statements to make had to be given an opportunity to do so.

Gil Job who was spokesman for the home owners on West Crescent Ave. objected to the meeting being held since information as to maps and costs were not available at this time. However, since the Mayor ruled that the meeting should proceed, he presented a petition signed by 90 per cent of the property owners claiming the ordinance to be discriminatory and inequitable. The petition will later be used as a basis for legal action in the event that the ordinance passes.

From the safety angle, many favored passage of the ordinance which has been requested at different times in the past. Job who refuted the idea of any particular danger on the road, was confronted by Councilman Harvey who produced a petition signed by Job and other members of his family in 1948 stressing that, because of dangerous conditions something had to be done about installing sidewalks.

Others protesting the ordinance were Dunsby, Wenc, Pat Job, Bowman and Munro. For the ordinance were Forshay, Webb, R. J. Thomas who also presented a letter from residents bearing 401 signatures supporting the ordinance.

After hours of talk from both sides of the table the hearing will be reopened at a future meeting.

Mr. Wilson attended the Allendale School and is a radio officer in the Merchant Marine.

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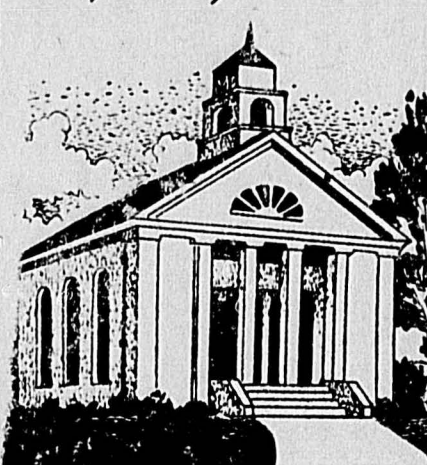
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Nursing Begins At Home

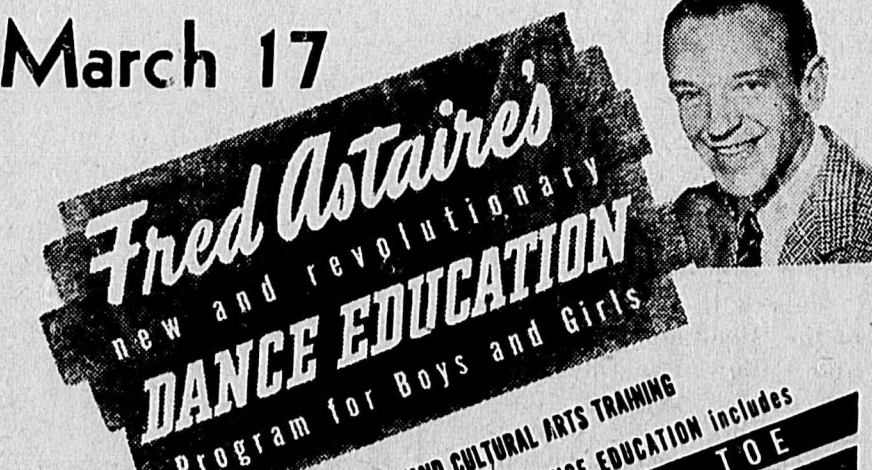

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NEW INTERSTATE TOLL RATES FOR TELEPHONE

New interstate telephone toll rates went into effect March 1.

The changes, first announced by the Federal Communications Commission on January 14 provided generally for five cent increases on short haul toll calls going across state lines and corresponding decreases on longer interstate toll calls. The new rates also provide for the shortening of the initial and overtime periods on some interstate calls.

New Jersey Bell Telephone Company said that charges on calls within the state are not affected by the new rates on file with the F.C.C. The new interstate rates are nationwide in character since such rates are uniform for the same distances throughout the country, the company explained.
