## WM. WIDNALL TO STAND ON RECORD OF PAST 2 YEARS

Charging that his opponent has slandered every office holder in Bergen County, Representative William B. Widnall said Tuesday night he will



firmly stand on his two year record in Congress as the only valid issue in his primary campaign for re-election.

Speaking before Waldwick Republicans, the Seventh District Congressman said his opponent has given this statement as the keynote for the primary campaign: 'The definition of an office holder in Bergen County seems to be a man who can keep from behind bars.'

Pointing to his record, which he said no one on the opposition has yet seen fit to criticize, Congressman Widnall cited the investigation of improper federally guaranteed housing which he investigated on a nation wide basis. He said he drew up the legislation calling for this investigation after receiving numerous complaints from veterans and other home owners about shoddy conditions that were allowed under F.H.A. and V.A. loan programs.

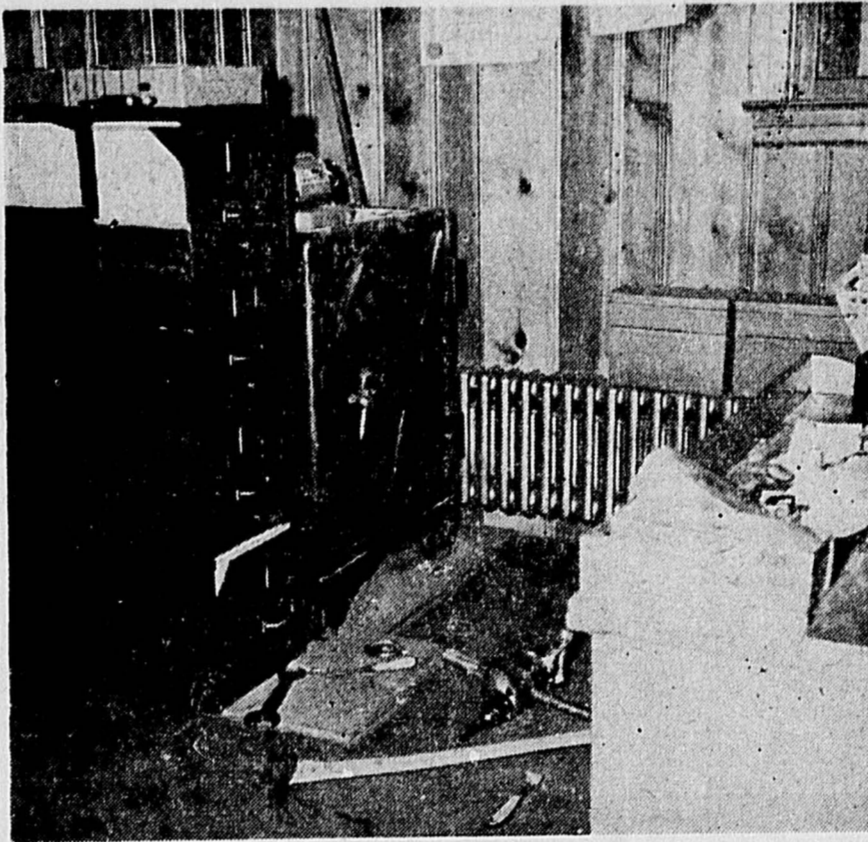
## Mayo Harvey Explains Boro Financial Program

Councilman M. Harvey, who is Chairman of the Borough Finance Committee, certainly proved that he knows his job on Tuesday evening when he outlined the workings of the Finance Committee and showed how it functions.

Harvey was introduced by Councilman Frank McCord, who was acting Chairman for the Republican Club. Harvey is completing three years on the Borough Council and is up for re-election for another three year term. He had sharing the spotlight with him David Colburn, Tax Collector and Mrs. Colburn, Deputy Tax Collector.

Harvey gave a complete picture of where the taxpayer's money goes and told how a budget is made up. He told of the various people who are responsible for the Borough's finances, such as the Borough Clerk, the Borough Council, the Mayor, the Tax Collector and the Auditor. Each one of these individuals or groups is in some way responsible for a certain part of the Borough's funds. He explained how carefully the Council studied the Borough's fund at special Finance meetings which are held on Monday evening preceding the Council meeting on the following Thursday. Each Council member keeps a careful account of the funds in his own department. The various departments include, Public Safety, which includes, Police Department, Fire Department, Board of Health; Streets and Roads Department; Buildings and Grounds Department; Water Department and Parks and Lights Department.

## AUXILIARY POLICE GIVEN EQUIPMENT FOR PATROL

A meeting of the Auxiliary Police was held at the Ambulance Corps building Wednesday night and the following equipment was passed out to the men: arm bands, night sticks, helmets, flashlights.

Eugene Dembinski tendered his resignation, Phil Weimer of East Crescent Avenue was accepted as a new member.

Captain Robert Rohl briefed the men on their duties during air raids. The men are well prepared for the test which is said to be scheduled for the week of April 27 to May 3.

An attempted safe cracking and robbery took place between 5:10 p.m. Thursday and 7:30 a.m. last Friday at the R. J. Christopher Lumber Yard on West Crescent Avenue. The discovery was made by George Christopher son of the owner when he arrived at his place of business Friday morning. Entry was made by breaking the side window. The thieves pulled down the side shades and worked undetected for some time.

A heavy steel safe failed to open in spite of the blandishments of enterprising yeggmen who tried hard with hammer and drills, ironically enough, tools that belonged to the Lumber Co.

It was evident that the company's grinding wheel had been used to sharpen drills used in the electric drill. However the safe resisted all efforts of the burglars who had to be content with a cash haul of \$80 found in two strong boxes outside the safe. The safe was opened later by the owner's son using a blow torch. Inside were the firm's payroll records.

Detective Thomas Martin of the Morristown Barracks of the New Jersey State Police, a fingerprint expert was called in to look for prints that might have been left by the yeggmen. After dusting the premises it was evident that the yeggs had worn gloves taken from the lumber yard.

The robbery was investigated by Trooper Martin E. Donohue of the Ramsey Barracks, state police; Chief Robert Wilson of Allendale and Patrolman Frank Parenti of the Allendale Police.

REPORT ON ARCHER CHURCH GIVEN AT ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Archer Memorial Church was held last Sunday night and a review of the year's work showed growth and vital accomplishments.

An outstanding feature of the development is the willingness on the part of volunteer workers to train for the work in which they are engaged. This results in greater efficiency.

While the church has increased its property value by about \$30,000, the real gains were the spiritual health and vitality of the church reflected in a flourishing Sunday School, an ever increasing scout troop, a vigorous Women's Society, an ambitious and hard working Youth Fellowship and a conscientious Official Board.

A report on the Archer Hall Building fund showed about \$2,800 in pledges yet unpaid and the necessity of raising about \$1,500 in additional cash to complete the project. It was voted to seek for a loan of about \$3,500 to meet the outstanding obligations due on the project which to date, has cost more than \$28,000.

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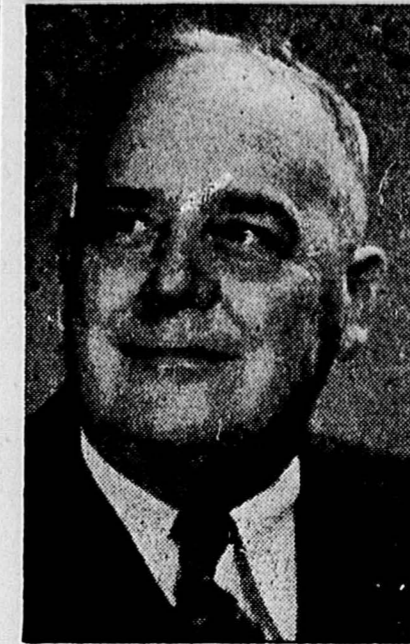
LOCAL CONCERN LOW BIDDER FOR CAR OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

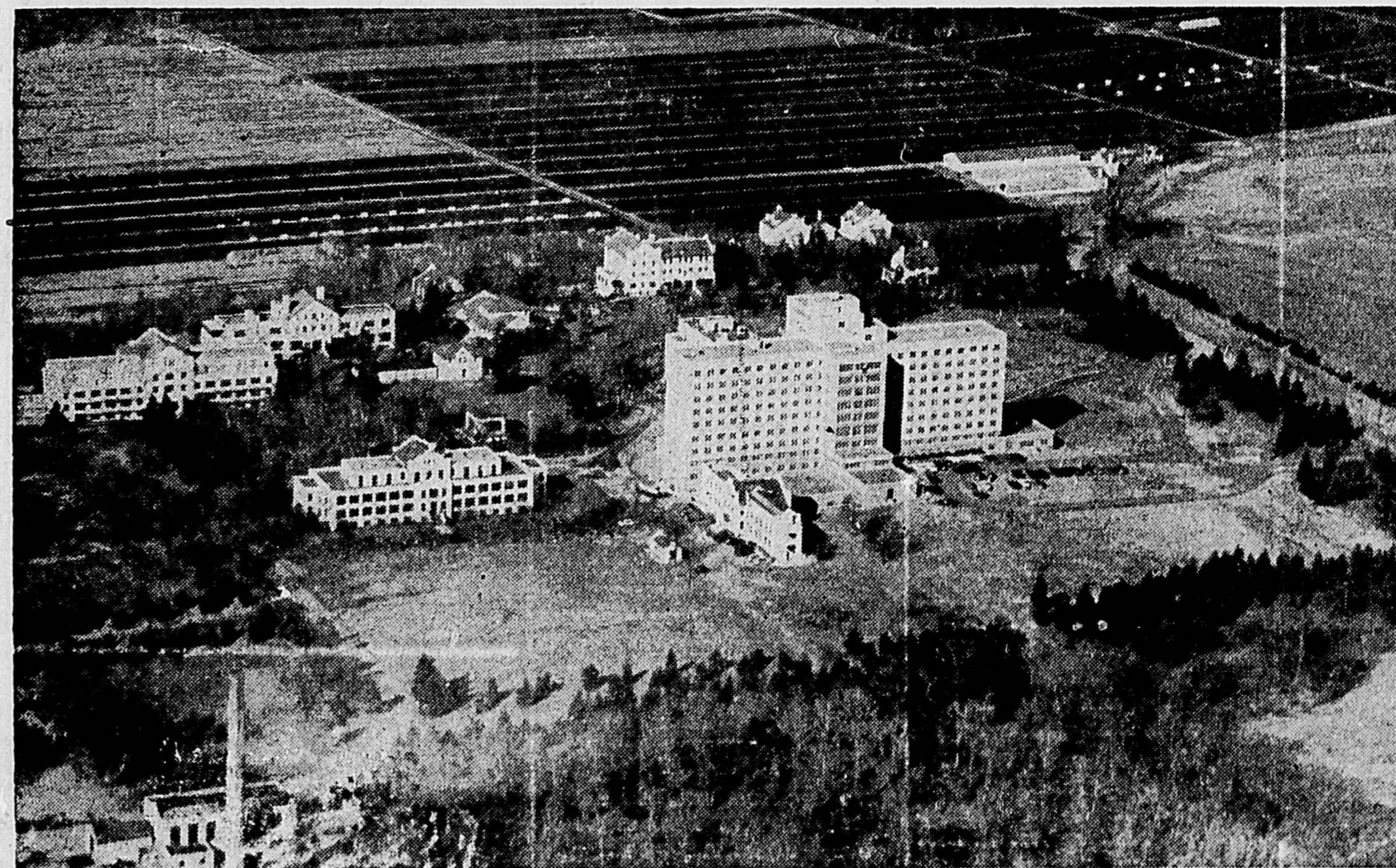

Colburn spoke of the fact that when he took over 13 years ago, there had been 6 tax collectors within one year. By way of comparison he stated that in 1940 the amount to be raised by taxation was \$74,000, while in 1952 the amount is \$189,000. Colburn gave a very complete and enlightening report of the duties of the Tax Collector and also showed that he thoroughly knows his business. Following his talk, the two men answered many questions put to them by the group present. When asked if he had any special rules or requests for the tax payers to use when paying their taxes, Colburn asked that people make their taxes payable to Borough of Allendale, rather than to David M.
