AIR RAID TEST DISCLOSES ACUTE DAYTIME SHORTAGE IN DEFENSE PERSONNEL IN BORO

School Brightest Spot In Boro-wide Survey Check

The air raid test went off as scheduled on Tuesday morning. As was anticipated, a dearth of air raid wardens was evident when various stretches in the Borough were not manned by any defense workers. The areas without wardens were from the Wyckoff line on Brookside Avenue to Franklin Turnpike; from the Ramsey line to the ball field on Crescent; from Route 17 to Franklin Turnpike on Allendale Avenue.

However, in the shopping district everything went very well. The streets were cleared in about 15 seconds.

the weaknesses of our Civilian Defense set up and correct them while there is still time.

In every community such as Allendale where a large percentage of the men folks commute, an acute shortage of wardens was noticed in Tuesday's test. The solution seems to be to enlist the services of women to serve as wardens. Where such a practice is already in effect, the benefit was felt Tuesday.

The phase of the test of which Allendale can really be proud was the efficiency with which the school children were evacuated to the shelters in the passage-ways and under the balcony in the auditorium. Another example of the value of training. Perhaps the children will have to take over if a real raid comes and direct the adults who have been too apathetic to learn what they ought to do in an emergency.

The Auxiliary Police who were available, were very efficient and looked the part with their helmets and night sticks.

Regional High School Discussed by 8 Town

John Klein of Allendale, and Walter H. Jones of Hackensack attended the monthly meeting of the Eight Town High School Survey Committee on Monday evening, April 28 at the high school to tell of their experience in making surveys preliminary to setting up regional schools or consolidated districts.

The survey committee, composed of representatives of Boards of Education from the eight districts having pupils in Ramsey High have been meeting since last fall in an attempt to make plans for the increasing enrollment in Ramsey High School.

All districts were present with the exception of Saddle River and Upper Saddle River. Mr. C. W. Den Hollander and Mr. Frank Sutton of the Midland Park Board of Education, and Mr. Herbert C. Haller of the Oakland Board were also present as guests. A communication from Ho-Ho-Kus acknowledged their invitation to participate and asked to be advised of the proceedings since they were unable to attend.

The next meeting of the Eight Town High School Survey Committee is scheduled for the latter part of May.

CRESCENT AVE. PAVING ORDINANCE TO BE HEARD ON MAY 22

An ordinance recently introduced authorizing curbs and street widening of Crescent Avenue at a cost of \$26,000. This project is the substitute for the recent sidewalk ordinance which was defeated after many hours of debate. The cost will be underwritten by the town and repaid later by the property owners concerned over a 10 year period. If the cost exceeds the appropriated \$26,000 the balance will be a general town assessment. A public hearing on this ordinance will be held at War Memorial Building May 22.

PARKED JOHNSON CAR IN SLIGHT MISHAP

Assemblyman Arthur W. Vervaet's bill extending the statute of limitations on gambling charges to four years has been signed into law by Governor Driscoll.  Mack Truck Distributors of Paterson, represented by Ray Haythorn of Dale Avenue were the only bidders for the new fire truck at last week's meeting of the Borough Council. The bid was \$13,995.41. This price included the allowance on the American La France truck of \$200. A new Rockwood foam fire accessory to the fire truck was ordered to be built into the new truck at a cost of \$375.
 An ordinance authorizing this expenditure from capital improvement funds was introduced at the Council meeting.
 Safety Commissioner Henry Cobb advised the Council that the new Plymouth Coupe Police car purchased recently from Allendale Sales and Service was now in use.
 Councilman Frank McCord on reporting on the delapidated condition of the town's 50 year old grader, was advised to dispose of it.
 The Borough recognized the creation of the sewer commission for Northwest Bergen by addressing a resolution to the Bergen County Board of Freeholders.
 Francis X. Scaturro, chairman of the Planning Board reported that the work on the Dr. Pittis subdivision had not been completed as stipulated in the terms of the \$10,000 bond covering the project. The question under consideration is whether to forfeit the bond and take over completion of the road work or ask for a higher bond. It is estimated that work would cost \$16,000.
