Playgrounds Discussed By Local School Board

The Board of Education met Tuesday night. The report of the Master Plan Consultants on the future school needs was read by L. R. Mc Peek.

Plans for playgrounds were discussed by the Board and a committee was empowered to discuss playgrounds with the assistant Commissioner of Education in charge of Physical Education and draw up specifications for bids.

57 children have already enrolled for Kindergarten and it is anticipated that by September there may be 67. There will be at least two classes, possibly three.

All teacher contracts have been signed for next year.

Joseph McGinnis, a senior student at Ramsey High School has applied for entrance to the new Bergen County Vocational school.

The School supply lists were approved and bids will be secured.

Principal O'Connor reported a total enrollment of 355 with an average daily attendance of 334.8.

On the recommendation of O'Connor, the Board approved a \$10.00 membership in a co-operative project in Educational administration for New Jersey Public School system.

The cafeteria report showed that 1,1631 meals had been served during April.

SERVICES HELD FOR JAMES THOMPSON, SR.

Funeral services were held Monday night at Irvington, N. J. for James Thompson, Sr., of Dale Avenue who died last Friday at his home after a brief illness.

The Rev. W. B. Quigley, pastor of the First Seventh Day Adventist Church of Paterson officiated. Interment was in Hollywood Memorial Park, Union.

Mr. Thompson who retired 20 years ago as supervisory foreman in the construction department of the New Jersey Bell Telephone Company, was born in Ireland and lived in Irvington for 43 years before moving to Allendale.

He was a member of the H. G. McCully Chapter of the Telephone Pioneers of America and Radiant Star Lodge, I.O.O.F.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Raymond S. Haythorn, at home; a son, James Thompson, Jr., of Chincoteague, Va., retired chief of the Irvington Fire Department; a brother, Edward, and two sisters, the Misses Annie and Eliza all of Ireland, and one grandson.

Charles Weleck who recently bought property on Hillside Avenue from the Shotmeyer Company, requested the same consideration that had been afforded the Shotmeyer Co. with regard to plots, lots etc. However since the arrangement with Shotmeyer is concluded and in view of recent ordinances governing sizes of lots etc. it was felt that, Weleck could not be given the same consideration.

The Planning Board will give the matter further consideration and try to reach a decision that will conform to existing regulations.

INA HAMILTON ADDED TO ADJUSTMENT BOARD

At last week's meeting of the Borough Council Ina Hamilton was appointed a member of the Board of Adjustment until April 16, 1955, and George Wolfson was reappointed to the Board of Health to serve until March 31, 1952.

The Borough Clerk announced the town's licensed dog population at 379.

After passage of the required ordinance, the new foam fire fighting apparatus will be ordered for the new fire truck.

Safety Commissioner Henry Cobb reported 233 incoming calls for the police department two brush fires and one house fire. It was again emphasized that it is unlawful to burn trash, lumber, brush and leaves without a permit. According to the recently adopted Fire Prevention Code any officer of the fire department or the police department can deal with those who violate the code. Water Committee Chairman Elwood Critchley let it be understood that Chris Ryan must be consulted by developers and others before any tampering is done with the water mains. He must also approve all installations.

Councilman Helen Hanson approved a bill leveling project proposed by developer George Wilson. She and the Borough Engineer, Harvey Beswick visited the project and said that the proposals are in the interest of everyone. Waiver of a performance bid was recommended. Francis X. Scaturro, chairman of the Planning Board, suggested that such an action might create a precedent that would cause difficulty later on. However, Mayor Johnson contended that each case will be treated as an individual matter.

The girls that went to the circus a week ago all had a fine time. They appreciate the other troops coming to help fill the bus.

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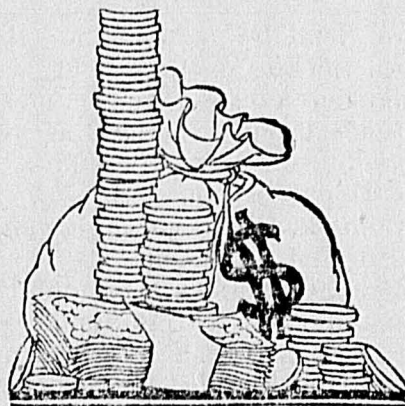
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
