Standing Speaker At Memorial Day Services

Lewis Thurston, Senior Vice Chairman of the local American Legion post completed the program for the annual Memorial Day parade in Allendale this week and sent letters to all civic and social organizations urging them to join with the Legion in honoring the men who made the supreme sacrifice.

Seeking to keep the affair local in every phase for the occasion, Thurston arranged to have Mr. James Standing, president of the Board of Education as the speaker for the occasion. Mayor Leslie Johnson will extend greetings to the marchers and audience and the address of welcome will be given by Post Commander David Kaplan. The three demonstrations will be represented by the Rev. Goodrich, Rev. Father Kalafsky and Rev. E. Carson.

The Ramsey band will play for the marchers to Memorial Park and sound taps at the close of the services there.

Organizations are asked by Legionaire Thurston to assemble at the War Memorial building at 9 a.m. The parade will leave there at 9:30. The line of march will be to Allendale Avenue through town then down Myrtle Ave. to Crescent Avenue turning left then to West Allendale Ave. to Park Ave. arriving at the park about 10.

Legionaire Albert Scaforo will be Grand Marshal of the parade.

WALTER CUP PERKS UP INTEREST IN HORSE SHOW

Entries in the Second Annual North Jersey Horse and Pony League show for June 21 are beginning to roll in according to Carol Thurston, show chairman.

The youngsters this year are playing a much more ambitious show than last year with several new classes open to all. One of the new events will be the Walter Challenge Trophy that must be won three times to retain permanent possession. Interest in this event seems to be the keenest. Only members of the organization are eligible for the event.

the borough in the patrol car, the fire was confined to the bar and restaurant. The noise awakened Pat Job, owner of the Crescent Inn who aroused his wife and two boys, Garry, three, and Joseph, one and a half. Aided by Cauwenburgh, the family made their way to safety in their bed clothes.

Wilson, racing to sound the alarm could see the flames burst through the broken windows. When the firemen arrived on the scene under the direction of Chief Wetterauw the entire lower floor was in flames and only the fine work of the men prevented the entire structure from going up into flames. The men had the fire under control in about 30 minutes but it wasn't until 4:30 that every spark was extinguished and the weary men returned home.

Four firemen were treated for smoke poisoning by the local ambulance corps who were called out. They were Cauwenberg, Straut, Varrish and Osborne. Ramsey Police aided in controlling traffic on Crescent Avenue.

As is the custom the bar was closed at 1 a.m. and the fire must have started shortly after. One end of the heavy bar was completely burned as was a coin box for the juke box. The exact cause of the fire has not been determined as yet. Damage cannot be estimated until a inventory of the stock is made. On first look all the liquors were destroyed. The floors of the dining room was burned out as was the walls. The living quarters over the bar will have to be rebuilt and most of up-stairs redecorated. Future plans for the rebuilding of the restaurant are still undecided by Pat Job.

Various classes and prizes are to be awarded but not horses and ponies, "Too big."

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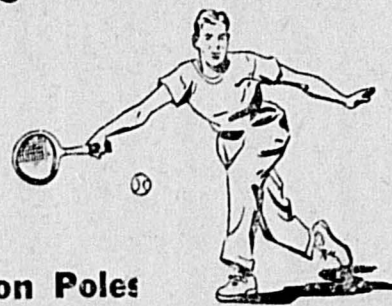
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**ROD AND GUN CLUB

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Might Can Be Right

Last week we celebrated Armed Forces Day throughout the nation. We have heard or read discussions by the Senate on military appropriations and most of us silently applauded the strong language of our State Department to the Soviet. We have staged air raid drills and one may ask why? Why all this? Why take our young men into training for a senseless war that may never occur. Why spend all this money in such waste of blood and means of our country?

First we must understand and agree that the country is no longer protected by two oceans and two countries that insure our defenses. The oceans have shrunk until they are mere moats around our castle. In fact the moats were greater hazards in King Arthurs Court days to attacking forces than the vast waters of the Atlantic and Pacific. The same barriers that were so safe in former times are agents to carry death and destruction to our shores.

Second we must define our reasons for defending what we call Liberty. Our mode of life and thought that involves the right to choose between right and wrong, good and bad, the choice of our leaders and the right to worship where, when and how we please.

When we have these two thoughts in the proper sequence we can better understand the terrific cost of man and money in the struggle to prevent a world-wide threat to this liberty. One cannot stop bullets with an idea alone anymore than ideas can be stopped with bullets. If we as a nation feel that our ideas of right and wrong are correct there is nothing else but to become and remain strong.

Naturally we are concerned with the cost of such a program. It is obvious that such a program could be put to far better use in some other field of human endeavor. Unfortunately we have no other choice, in fact the choice is not even ours to make. There is no other course open but to survival. No cost is too high when compared to defeat in either the moral or physical world.

All these preparations are being made not in hopes of winning a war but to become so strong that no nation will dare attack us. Here again we have no choice. Any sign of weakness would be but an invitation to our enemies to attack us.

That other countries have seen the same danger and have joined with us in a common defense of the perils facing our idea of liberty have committed us to spend huge sums of money to help. These commitments must be honored not merely because of the nations honor but also because of national defense. We strengthen them to strengthen ourselves.

These facts are grim but so is war. If we face them with the high resolve in our natural strength and resourcefulness that has marked our progress as a nation we are bound to win the liberty for all mankind.

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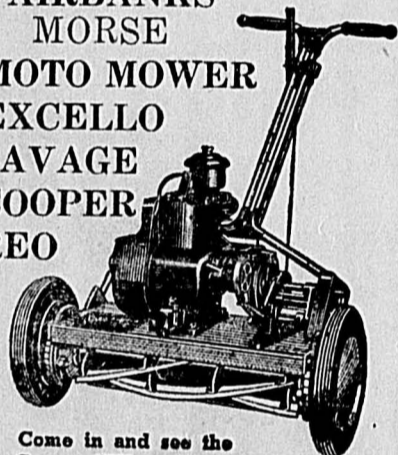
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**HYPNOTIST TAMES

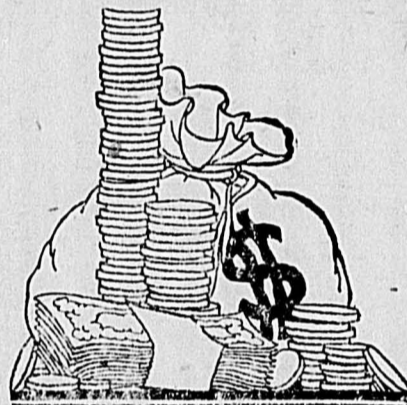
