## CRESCENT AVE. IMPROVEMENTS PASSED BY BOROUGH COUNCIL

### Property Owners Object To Method Of Tax Assesments

Allendale's Crescent Avenue residents went all out last week at the regular council meeting to hold up or delay the proposed improvement project for that street but after three hours of conflict, the ordinance was finally passed but the end is not in sight

by a long shot — Mayor Johnson tried to explain that putting in an ordinance does not commit the town to the project but does allow the borough to advertise for bids to find the true costs. All figure the borough fathers or Engineer Harvey Beswick spoke on were only their estimates.

Bids on the work will be advertised now, and opened at the meeting of the council on June 26. The ordinance appropriates \$26,000 for the project, which provides for curbs on both sides of Crescent Avenue, drainage pipe and catch basins. The total length of the section to be improved was reported to be 6,000 feet. It would be the section between Franklin Turnpike and West Allendale Avenue.

Under sharp and steady questioning, Councilmen repeatedly pointed out that they could

not be sure of the cost of the project until bids had been received and considered. These repeated assurances of caution were not well received.

The chief objection of the opposed residents, led by Walter Dunsby, Pasko Job and Gill Job, was a strategic one. They pointed out that the \$26,000 appropriation was the same amount involved in the Crescent Avenue sidewalk improvement which was dropped previously after some stormy public hearings.

This led Finance Chairman Mayo Harvey to point out that while \$26,000 was appropriated, the total cost estimate would not exceed something around \$22,000. In fact, he said, he did not expect the total cost to go above \$18,000.

Borough Engineer Beswick read an estimate with breakdowns on specific items. The total estimate \$22,000, not including engineers fees. This included \$8,729 for the curbs; about \$8,000 for the 15, 18, 21 and 24-inch concrete drainage pipe for a distance of 1,875 feet; \$2,000 for catch basins and \$400 for catch basin repairs \$700 for preparatory excavations and \$400 for paving repairs and \$1,300 for tree removal.

The sharpest objections came from the residents on such questions as: "How will the expense be apportioned between the town and the property owners? They demanded to know what it would cost the individual property owners for the improvements, and charged that they received "evasive answers" to their questions.

Mr. Harvey informally estimated that it would cost the owners less than \$3 per frontage foot, with the assessment to be spread over a 10-year period.

In preparation, the Council appointed a three-man Special Board of Assessors. They were Edmund Growsick, Werner Baarek and Arthur Ahrens.

These appointments, too, came in for sharp criticism. Mr. Dunsby claimed the Crescent Avenue residents were being made victims of "taxation without representation" because no interested property owner was named to the special board. Borough Attorney John Christie explained this as being a sound action on the basis that "it is the law."

Furniture and equipment is now being moved into place. The roadway leading to the hospital grounds has been paved and a black top dressing has been placed on the parking area east of the new building.

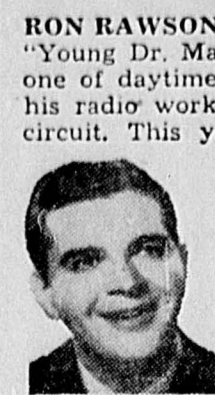
Ceremonies will begin promptly at 2 P. M. on June 7, with an invocation by the Rev. Robert W. Burniston, Bergen Pines Chaplain.

Following the formal dedication exercises the building will be opened for public inspection.

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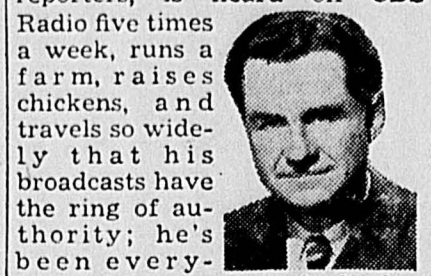

Highway Safety May Be Possible

Last week the acting director of Motor Vehicles for the State of New Jersey devised a system for halting the reckless drivers that are making our highways and roads the most dangerous in the country.

The system of points for various violations has been devised. Twelve points is the limit and the violators can fill their quota in a hurry.

Motorists responsible for fatal accidents and drunken drivers get their 12 points in one package. There is an 8 point penalty for leaving the scene of an accident.

There is a secondary provision that carries with it a barred threat. The misbehaving motorist, applying for reinstatement of his license after a revocation period, is going to be branded—not publicly branded with a marker on his car, but it amounts to the same thing.

William J. Deardon, a man with 40 years of experience is the gentleman responsible for the first concrete thought we have ever heard of cutting down the fatalities resulting from careless use of high powered engines of destructions.

The national safety council will be watching this state to see if the system works. They can predict the number of fatalities over any holiday with a fair degree of accuracy.

LOCAL POLICE WARNED OF FUTURE GAMBLING IN COTY

Deputy Attorney General Harry L. Towe, in a letter to all Bergen County Mayors and Police Chiefs, today urged them to be in constant watch for any suspicious activities that might point to the resumption of organized gambling in Bergen County.

Warning that professional gamblers may not attempt to resume operations here, following discharge of the Special Grand Jury, Towe said that such a challenge must be met quickly and effectively with the most diligent kind of law enforcement.

'I firmly believe', he wrote, 'that early arrests under your direction and vigorous prosecution under mine will be the best method of convincing professional gamblers that they will not be tolerated in Bergen County.'

Towe said that his letter to the Mayors and Police Chiefs is the first step in a sustaining 'get tough' program.

"Everybody's going to Vacation Church School." Who — Interdenominational — All children welcome regardless of their church affiliations. Starting with those children who are now four years old, through the Beginners, Primary and Juniors, including those who have just completed the sixth grade. Intermedi-

ates and young people are needed to assist in the very interesting art and activity projects. Any interested mothers are also invited to volunteer in this connection.

Where — Archer Hall.  
 When — Starting June 23 through July 3. What time — 9:30 a.m. until 12 noon. Every day, Monday thru Friday of the first week, Monday thru Thursday of the second week, with one special evening program on Tuesday, July 1st. This shall be known as the Sharing Program and will include both the parents and the children. At this time the children and young people will share their fun and projects with their parents.

What—What is this Vacation Church School all about? "Bible Stories, Games, Worship, Songs and Activities". A Vacation Church School is making the weekdays of vacation time count for Christian Teaching in the community. It is the summertime-through-the-week educational program of the churches. It is an opportunity to share Christian convictions with others. It is one unit of the year-around church school program. It is a plan for using the free summer period for experiences in joyous everyday living with the boys and girls of the community, thus discovering and sharing with them the Christian way of life.

What Happens? — Take some lively boys and girls, add some summer days, add some well prepared teachers, mix them all together in Christian living relationships, where they work, study, worship, sing, play and relax, and you have a Vacation School.

Who sponsors this movement and what will it Cost? The Vacation Church School is part of a national movement. It is guided in New Jersey by the New Jersey Council of Churches. In Allendale this year it will be started and sponsored by the co-operative efforts of Archer Memorial Church organizations, includ-

ing the Church Board, The Board of Education, The W.S. C.S. and The Evening Circle. However, since it will be a community venture, the parents of the children who attend are invited to make a contribution of their own choosing toward the costs a maintaining a similar school again next year. This contribution is entirely voluntary and may be offered either at the start of the session or on the evening of the Sharing Program.

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**POINT - ANNAPOLIS EXAMS TO BE HELD**

Examinations for West Point and Annapolis will be held July 14 at various designated cities in New Jersey. Congressman William Widnall announced this week.

The examination is open to all bona-fide male residents of the Seventh Congressional District who will have reached their seventeenth birthday and not reached their twenty second year on July 1, 1953, the date they enter either academy.

Widnall will fill one vacancy at West Point and two vacancies at Annapolis during 1953, following the system he instituted when first elected to Congress. Those receiving the highest grades will be appointed principals, and there will be three alternates to each principal, appointed according to their rating on the examination.

To be eligible to either Academy a boy must be a graduate of an accredited high school or preparatory school. Boys falling within the above mentioned qualified age group, but who are now in the service may take the examination at their base either in the United States or abroad. They should advise the Congressman in writing of their complete service address.

Any boy interested in taking the competitive examination should make his interest known in writing to the Congressman at his Washington office, Room 318 Old House Office Building, before June 15, 1952.

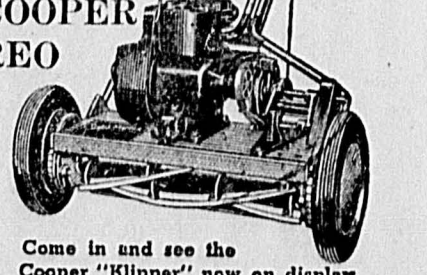

to have the Council commit itself to a fixed cost estimate for property owners or, finally, to commit the town to a fixed share of the cost. Both Mayor Johnson and Borough Attorney rejected this proposal as unsound and repeated their assurances that the ordinance does not either commit the town to the project nor the taxpayers to what they may deem objectionable assessments. Planning Board Chairman Frank Scafuro was positive in saying that the declara-

tion of a fixed share of the cost by the town would be a bad precedent in view of the unsettled actual cost of the project.

First step in the procedure now to follow, it was explained is to scan the bids. Then the Special Board of Assessors must draw up a formula for the assessments. There will be more hearings with the interested property owners in attendance and then hearings to listen to supporting arguments or objections from the town as a whole.

These latter hearings are justified on the basis that since the town at large will share the cost burden, all Allendale taxpayers have a vested interest in the project. Mr. Harvey said at one point in the council meeting that it was considered that the drainage improvements, especially, would benefit the whole town.

As the situation stands now, any number of things can happen. The bids may prove prohibitive, although that is not expected. Further public objections may stall the project. There will be no doubt be attempts to revise the assessment plan once it is established. Those who protested at the Council meeting are expected to continue to marshal opinion against the project.

There was no indication what the next concrete step to be taken by the objectors might be. The Council's next official action on the project will be to open bids at the June 26 meeting.

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
