TRAVEL BENT THUGS ROB LOCAL STATION

During the early hours Sunday morning possibly as early as 2:30 it is believed that thieves broke into the Allendale railroad station and stole 300 tickets. The door of the baggage room had been forced open by the prowlers and was discovered by a conductor on the 5:30 train which stopped at the station.

Local police were called in at 7 a.m. but found no loss other than the tickets. A small radio was in plain sight but was not taken and there was no evidence of further looting.

Station agent, Sol Lowe, Suffern, reported that the tickets were the kind used for single and round trip fares to towns on the Erie railroad in this area.

Allendale Fireman March In Maywood NY-NJ Parade

The Allendale Volunteer Firemen under Chief Martin Wetterauw marched in the third division with the pump truck at the annual New York-New Jersey Volunteer Firemen's parade held in Maywood Saturday afternoon.

Under the bright hot sun over 6,000 firemen, 59 bands and 160 pieces of fire fighting equipment marched before a crowd estimated at 10,000.

The parade was the concluding event of a two day conclave held in Memorial Park in Maywood. The convention headquarters was a huge big-top circus tent erected for the occasion. When all the firemen, musicians and fire wagons assembled in parade formation it was the largest demonstration of its kind ever held by the volunteer firemen.

is a guide for the accomplishment of a coordinated, adjusted and harmonious community developed in the most economic manner by avoiding situations that create needless expenditures and by timing public works with the town's ability to pay and as its ratables increase," he said.

"Or to put it another way, the purpose of the plan is to put the citizens of Allendale in control of their course rather than have each new development force them into new unplanned expenditures."

The Planning Board, Mr. Scafuro feels, has a legal responsibility to help the borough plan for its future. When the Planning Board was established it was assumed that its work would be making a comprehensive study of the town. And from that basic study, a master plan would evolve.

The technical job of planning

the general location, character and extent of the streets, bridges, waterways, playgrounds squares parking areas parks and other public buildings and property — as well as making recommendations for the removal, widening, narrowing, vacating or abandonment of existing property—is too much for a board made up of part-time citizens to do singlehandedly.
