ALLENDALE WATER HELPS NEIGHBOR BEAT SHORTAGE

Allendale came to the rescue when the Borough of Waldwick came perilously close to being without water last Saturday night. Waldwick's water supply went below the minimum required for fire safety and Mayor J. H. Lumley of Waldwick called Mayor Leslie Johnson and asked for help.

Mayor Lumley is a telephone interview expressed his thanks to the Mayor and Boro officials who made it possible for 200,000 gallons of water to be pumped from the Allendale pipes into the Waldwick tank. This emergency reserve protected the townspeople of Waldwick until 8:30 Sunday morning when the Waldwick pumps managed to restore the water supply to a safe level.

A sound truck drove up and down the streets of Waldwick Saturday evening telling people that a water emergency existed and cautioned citizens not to use any more water than was absolutely necessary.

Mayor Lumley said that the town's water problem stems from two sources. "Nine hundred home owners are trying to keep their lawns green and our pumps can't supply that demand," he said.

"Last week people all over town turned on their lawn sprinklers and used 50 times the normal amount of water. This caused the tank to become almost empty and brought on the emergency."

Another reason for the shortage Mayor Lumley explained, was that Waldwick is supplying 200 homes in Ho-Ho-Kus with water and this drains them dry. On Saturday morning when the water became low in Waldwick, the borough turned off the Ho-Ho-Kus supply. They did this after they found evidence that Ho-Ho-Kus residents were using water to water their lawns after repeated warnings against this practice from the water commissioner in Waldwick. The shut off lasted one day. The State Attorney General compelled Waldwick to continue serving residents of Ho-Ho-Kus with water, and the borough will do so until the first of the year when the new Ho-Ho-Kus water plant, recently voted upon, is completed.

Tomorrow a new well will be opened which will ease the shortage somewhat. But Waldwick will only be able to get through the summer without another emergency if residents forego green lawns and are careful in their use of existing water resources.

Dr. G. Pittis, 185 Myrtle Ave. submitted a \$15,000 performance bond renewal to the Borough Council last Thursday in connection with his subdivision, and the completion of Pittis Road.

CELLAR DUG ON WRONG PROPERTY

Mr. John Bajor, of Bajor Lane off Franklin Turnpike, looked out his window one morning this week and discovered heavy earth moving equipment digging a huge hole on his property.

Upon investigation, he discovered that Patsa Roto of Paterson, who held a deed to land adjacent to his property, was digging himself a basement.

Mr. Bajor produced his deed and claimed ownership of the property being excavated. The local police served a restraining order to Mr. Roto early the next morning.

This left Mr. Bajor with a half basement newly dug on his property, whether he wanted it not. And Mr. Roto had done a days work on another man's land.

Obviously the deeds were in error and the hole in the ground will remain until the legal technicalities are unravelled.

Freak Storm Hits Boro Power Fails; Cars Hit

The principle damage resulting from the brief, freak storm Tuesday evening was to the trees on Allendale Avenue. The wind and rain wreaked havoc with trees. Some of them more than 100 feet tall, snapped in the high wind and crashed to the ground.

After a day of intense heat with the mercury well over 90 degrees and high humidity accompanying in the evening the wind started to blow and mounted to gale proportions. Then about 7 p.m. suddenly and without warning, the skies opened up and literally dumped its load of rain. Some described it as a "wall of water" coming down.

HONIG DRAWS 2-YEAR SUSPENSION

On Monday the New Jersey State Supreme Court suspended Herman G. Honig, former magistrate of Allendale, in Bergen County, from practicing law in state courts for two years. He was charged with unethical conduct and accused of deeding to himself a home owned by Leon R. Kornhoff, a client. While four members of the Supreme Court voted for Honig's suspension, a three-member minority, including Chief Justice Arthur T. Vanderbilt, filed a dissent stating he should have been disbarred.

NEW MINISTER ACCEPTS CALL

The Church of the Epiphany will welcome a new minister, the Rev. Bayard Hancock, his wife and two children, on July 1. The Rev. Mr. Hancock comes to Allendale from the Berkeley Divinity School in New Haven, Conn., from which he graduated in June.

The Allendale Episcopal Church will be the Rev. Mr. Hancock's first full time parish and he will be the first resident of the newly completed vicarage. The Rev. Mr. Hancock was recently ordained at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Paterson.

The Rev. Edwin S. Carson, present minister, is retiring for the second time. It was in 1944 that his services were needed in Allendale and although retired from the ministry at the time, he came to help out "temporarily." His temporary assignment turned out to be seven years of service to his church and congregation.

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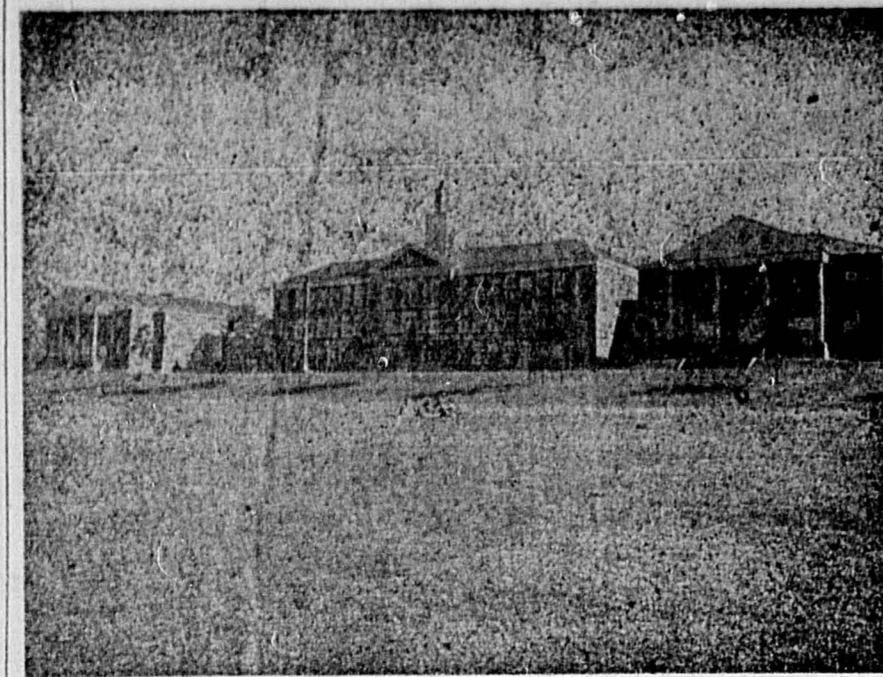

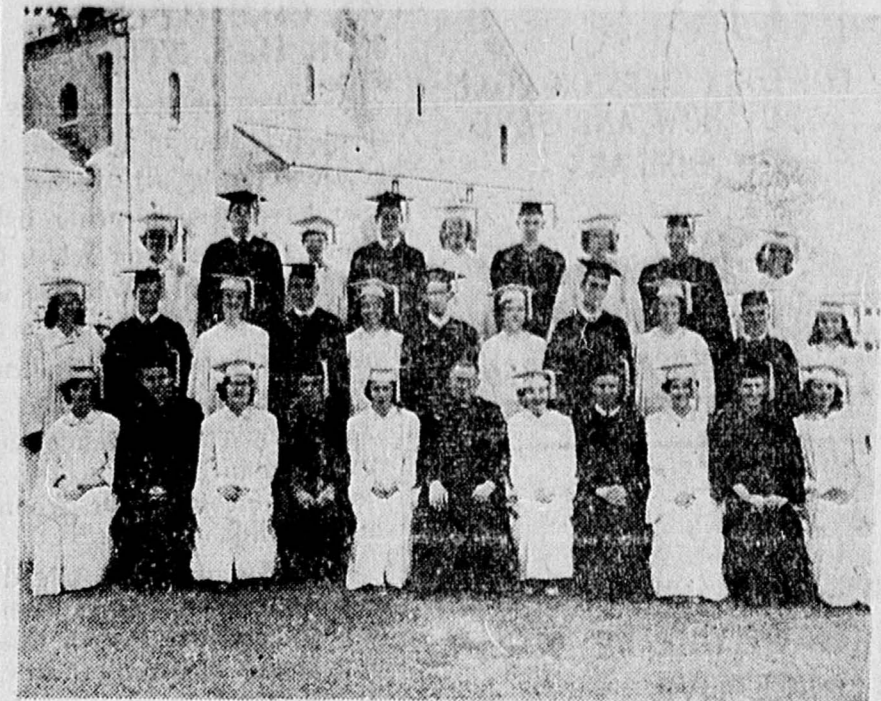

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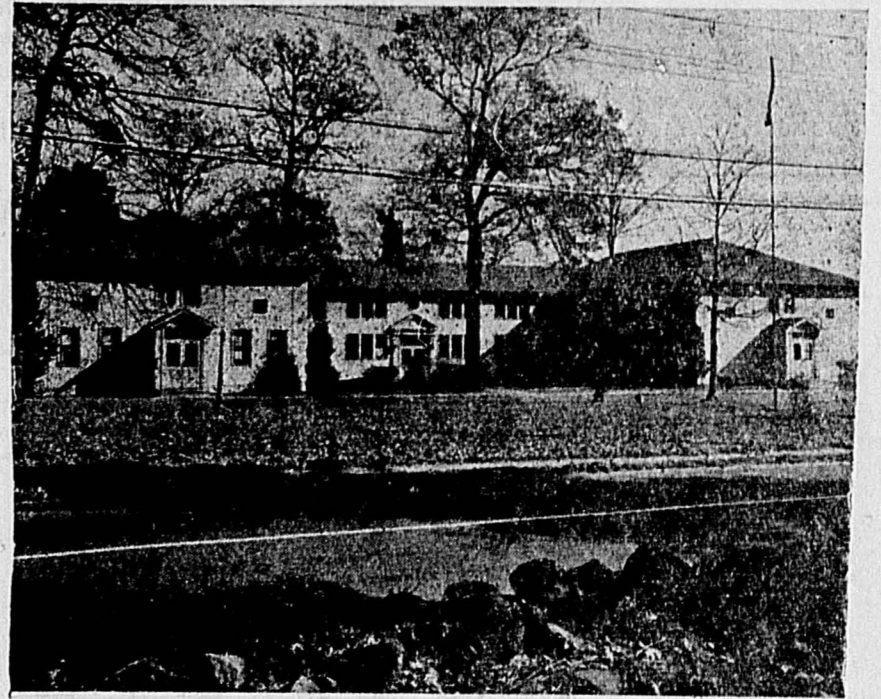
