N. J. H. & P. League Show Very Successful

The Walter Challenge Trophy for horsemanship, awarded for the first time at the Second Annual Horse and Pony League show held Saturday at Kennedy's Riding Stables, went to Catherine Foster. Second place was awarded Carol Thurston, chairman of the show.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Walter, 1 Cottage Place, plan to present this trophy every year. It will be given as a permanent trophy to any rider receiving it three times.

The show this year, held under the threat of rain which fortunately never materialized, was considered a successful exhibition of junior horsemanship. It was cool. A slight drizzle kept down the dust. The events clicked off. Fine horses were entered from many stables in the North Jersey area. And although the crowd was somewhat less than last year (due perhaps to the absence of a "big name" guest), the show attracted those who were sincerely interested in horses and horsemanship. The result was a well organized professional show which can be credited to the efforts of members and sponsors of the Horse and Pony League.

Allendale Master Plan Completed; Hearing To Be Held On July 14th

A Comprehensive Plan for Allendale prepared for the Planning Board, the Borough Council and the people of Allendale, has been completed by Scott Bagby and Weaver Pangburn, planning consultants, and is now in the hands of the Planning Board. It is a 40 page report in simple language, profusely illustrated with maps and charts to serve as a guide for the future development of Allendale.

Due to public interest in the long awaited "Master Plan" for the future of Allendale, the Planning Board has made it possible for all box holders to receive a copy of today's paper.

The Allendale Public Library will have copies of the plan on a free lending basis for those who do not wish to purchase a copy. The Library is open Monday, 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. also Friday from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m.

The map of the Comprehensive Plan, a reproduction of which is published in this issue takes a 20-30 year look as to how Allendale might be developed over that span of time. The capital improvements recommended can be tackled progressively and completed as the town acquires ability to pay based upon increased rates. The urgent and necessary things which may be planned over the shorter 5-10 year term are to be shown on an official map which will be developed and proposed by the Board following the public hearing on July 14th and an appraisal of what the people want.

The purpose of the July 14th hearing is to have the residents of Allendale guide the Planning Board in its adoption of the Master Plan.

The Board is interested in receiving from the citizens any constructive suggestions for changes in the plan before its adoption by the Board. Two alternatives are open to the Board on adoption of the plan:

1. Adoption by the Mayor and Council by ordinance after public hearing. This would "freeze" the plan, i.e. it would be cumbersome and difficult to make any changes in the future. This according to the Planning Board is undesirable.

2. Adoption by resolution of the Planning Board, after public hearing. This would keep the plan "flexible". If changes become desirable in the future, all that needs to be done is for the Planning Board to hold a public hearing and then adopt a resolution to carry out the desired change in the Master Plan.

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Observers Promise Gala Firework Display For July Fourth Celebration

The Fourth of July this year will be celebrated with more and better fireworks than the Holiday Observers have ever displayed before according to Fred Richerick, publicity chairman for the organization.

There will be more than 30 fixed ground displays as well as 90 aerial displays in the evening's after dark colorama at Recreation Park. Some of these are enthusiastically described. Onlookers will watch everything from Niagara Falls and Jewel of Splendor to Zig Zag Girandole. The finale is depicted as "150 assorted caliber shells, together with hundreds of floral bouquets; while the usual Grand Finale has an abundance of loud explosions filling the heavens with sky-light beauty."

Before the fireworks display there will be a band concert given by the Wyckoff Band with an assist from a number of Allendale musicians, under the direction of Band Leader Hovey of Wyckoff.

Throughout the day, from 7 a.m. when the flag will be raised by Explorers Post 59 and Boy Scout Troop 59, until the last skyrocket at night, there will be some activity for every member of the family.

Athletic events will feature many new contests, such as

sommersault races, waterfall races, hoop races, shot put and obstacle races, in addition to the old stand-by dash and jump events. All boys and girls of Allendale, ages 6 to 17, are urged to register for the events at local stores.

Prizes will also be awarded to winners of the men's horse-shoe pitching contest and the ladies' rolling pin throw.

Refreshments will be sold at Holiday Observers' refreshment stand all day. A greater variety of food and beverages will be served by the Observer Chefs this year.

The field will also be appropriately decorated for the spirit of the occasion, with flags, bunting, spotlights etc.

An added attraction, not shown on the program, will be a small fry baseball game at 1 p.m. Allendale's Team made up of youngsters 8 to 12 years old, will play the Waldwick

Small Fry All Stars. The local team, which is sponsored by Sam Braen and the newly reorganizer Allendale Athletic Association, has an excellent record this year and is tied for first place with Ho-Ho-Kus in their league. Waldwick has several teams in its own league and is taking the pick of these to make up the All Star Team.

The main baseball game at 2:30 features the Allendale Legion team, now setting a hot pace for the pennant with 4 straight wins, vs the Lodi Sinclair Giants, in a regular Bergen County Semi Pro League game.

All other events are listed in the program being distributed by members of the Holiday Observers in a house to house canvass this week. Some members of the organization will call on all homes to solicit contributions to the Fourth of July activities. This money, which buys a ticket to the Fourth of July Celebration and a program for the day also pays for the other Holiday Observers parties for youngsters at Hal-loween and Christmas.

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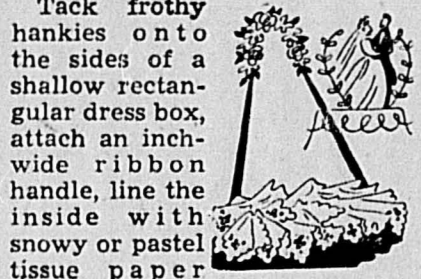

Police Lists Precautions For Local Vacationists

With vacation time here, Police Chief Robert Wilson took occasion this week to review the safety precautions Allendale people can take with their homes to prevent troubles while they are gone. The following check-list presented by Chief Wilson, will not only insure the safety of your property, he points out, but will also help the Allendale police force to protect the security of your home. Cooperating in the ways he has listed will help also to prevent crimes in the town, he says. Perhaps the most effective way to use this list is to run through all the items just before your departure. 1. Do not have the newspapers published the fact that you are leaving. Plan. The Planning Board believes this is the logical alternative.

The Comprehensive Plan includes a section on "Recommended Zoning". To carry out this recommendation, the Planning Board will explain, at the July 14th hearing, the proposed new ordinance for submission to the Borough Council. The proposed new zoning ordinance will provide much more flexibility in dealing with problems as they arise. It has been carefully drawn up by the planning consultants and studied by the Planning Board and our Borough Attorney.

In presenting this Comprehensive Master Plan to the Borough, the Planning Board is not only setting out the town's goals, but is discharging one of the most important obligations imposed upon it by the state Municipal Enabling Act which requires every Planning Board to make and adopt a Master Plan.

No Planning Board composed of volunteer part time non paid members has the time or the ability to tackle the technical job of developing a complete Master Plan. Professionally trained help was needed from a town planner. Our Board, at a very economical fee, engaged the nationally-known firm of Bagby and Pangburn to make a complete study of Allendale, its present facilities and potential growth and to make recommendations for the guidance of the people in meeting future growth. Their recommendations shown in the plan now published are, therefore, a guide for long years ahead. The plan is essentially fluid and has flexibility for meeting varying situations and circumstances. It is grounded on sound principles for conserving home neighborhoods, encouraging good business and suitable industry, and promoting stable municipal economy.

The Master Plan Report reflects not only the good judgment of the consultants, but the combined wisdom of the Borough's official leaders in government, education and planning. Their views of the desires and interests of the people of our town, of what is sound and practical in Allendale, are reflected in the interpretations of conditions and recommendations made in the report.

The Planning Board, as well as other Borough officials, recognize that in the long run, it is the people who will determine the future of our community. The Board is confident that if the citizens and property owners in Allendale read the report carefully, follow its reasoning, and recognize the techniques and actions which build a sound and progressive future for us and others who will join us as residents. Then the people will want to see the

principles outlined in the report made effective. The interest and support of everyone of us is required to guarantee this outcome.

The objective of the proposed Master Plan is that the residents of Allendale control their community's course rather than be forced by each new development into new and unplanned expenditures. It is therefore the earnest and sincere hope of the Planning Board that fellow residents will examine the plan in a spirit of helpfulness and unselfish cooperation in the interests of providing for the continued better development of the kind of community we all desire.

The Board hopes that the great majority who recognize the need and benefit of the plan will appear and speak up in the War Memorial Building on the night of July 14th at 8:30 p.m.

Make them in heart shaped baking tins and decorate with lacy shredded coconut framing an old-fashioned "engraved" medallion in the center. For extra drama, tint the icing a pale pink, or better still, tint the coconut. Coconut takes beautifully to coloring and is easy, quick and fun to do. The two hearts side by side on your prettiest tray will be a focal point for a party that both the bride and groom-to-be will remember together.



SHOWER CAKES FOR TWO

- 2 3/4 cups sifted cake flour
- 3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 5 egg whites
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla or grated lemon rind
- Seven-Minute Frosting
- 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut, tinted pink

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Beat egg whites until foamy, add 1/2 cup sugar gradually, and continue beating only until mixture will hold up in soft peaks. Cream shortening; add 1 1/4 cups sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add flavoring. Then add meringue and beat thoroughly into batter. Turn into two deep 9-inch heart-shaped layer pans which have been lined on bottoms with paper. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Cool.

Spread Seven-Minute Frosting on tops and sides of cakes. Moisten sifted confectioners' sugar with a small amount of water and outline a heart in the center of each cake. Fill in hearts with a thin layer of the confectioners' sugar mixture to form a smooth surface for lettering. Sprinkle rest of cakes generously with tinted coconut. Using a pastry tube filled with pink-tinted confectioners' sugar cream frosting, outline each heart and write name in the center.

TO TINT COCONUT: Place 1 teaspoon milk or water in a bowl. Add a few drops red vegetable coloring and mix well. Add coconut and toss with a fork until coconut is tinted throughout.

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
