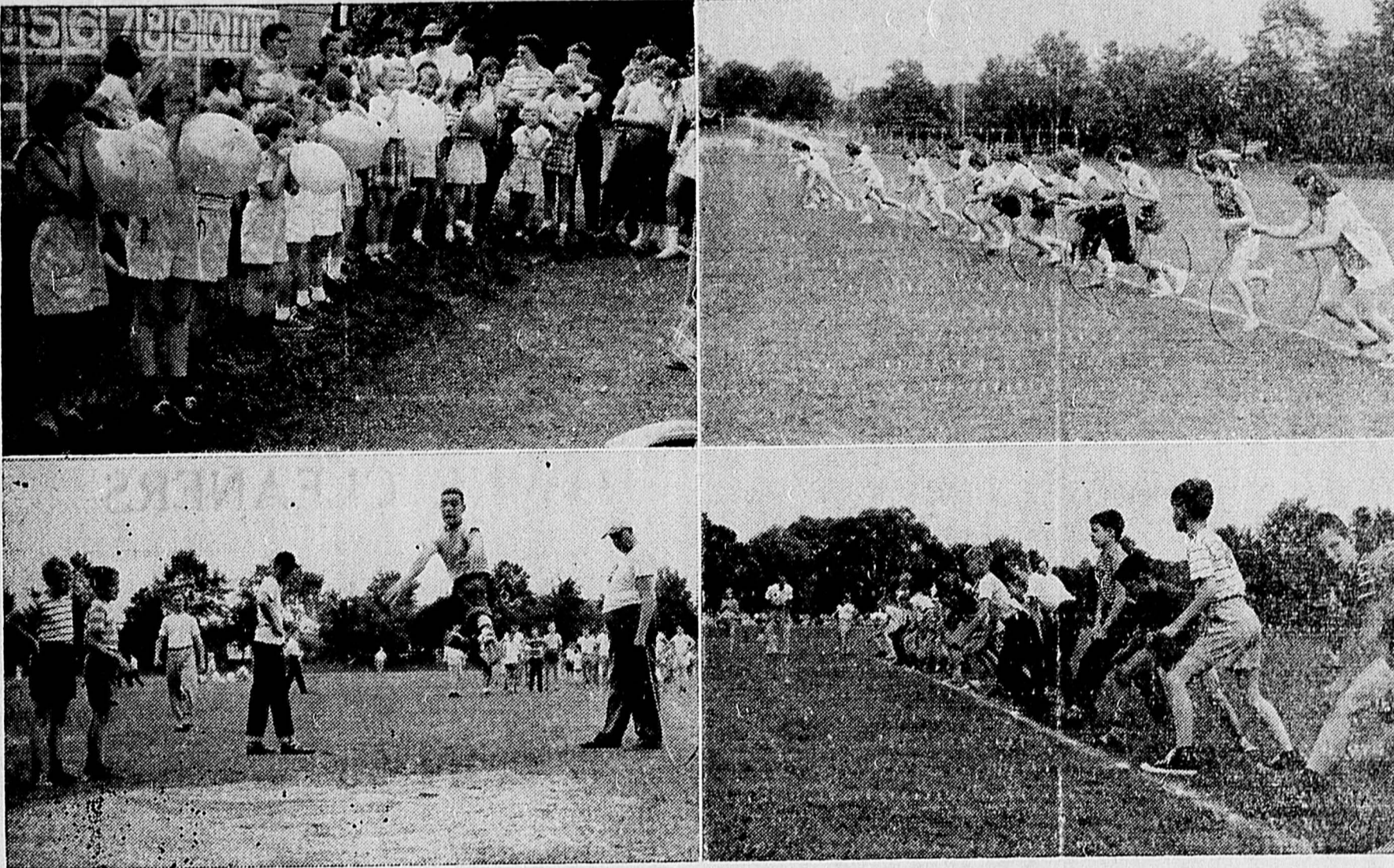

Scenes From The July 4th Field Day In Allendale Town Planners Prepared For Torrid Session



Plans for the forthcoming public hearing to be held Monday, July 14, at 8 p.m. at the Memorial Building on the Master Plan for Allendale were made at the Wednesday evening meeting of the Allendale Planning Board.

Francis X. Scaturro, chairman, announced that 216 copies of the detailed report on the proposed plan for the future of the Borough had been sold.

Copies of the 40-page report submitted by Bagby and Pangburn, Planning Consultants of Upper Montclair, N. J., have been placed on sale at a number of stores in the downtown business section and in the post office. All property owners and interested citizens are urged to procure a copy and study the plan which includes a detailed analysis of the background and proposed development of Allendale.

Indication that there will be vigorous debate on many aspects of the plan were reported at the meeting and members of the planning board made arrangements to be on hand to answer all questions regarding controversial aspects of the plan.

Basic problems facing Allendale will be thoroughly discussed and the goals and recommendations of the planning board will be presented to the public.

Other aspects of the proposed report will be thoroughly talked out. The long range financial arrangement in particular will be brought up at the public meeting.

The chairman of the Planning Board issued a cordial invitation to every member of the community to attend Monday evening's meeting in as much as the results of the meeting might very well vitally affect individual property owners in town. Also, it was pointed out, the blueprint for the future as proposed by the Planning Board will determine whether or not our town is able to meet the pressures of a growing community.

N. J. PONY LEAGUE TURN OVER \$200 TO POLIO WARD

A meeting of the North J. Horse and Pony League was held at the Walter home in Allendale on Sunday July 6. Barbara Walter, the president of the league conducted the meeting and the league's second annual horse show held on June 21, was discussed. The treasurer reported that there was a large profit and the members voted to give \$200. to the Polio Ward at Bergen Pines.

The judges score cards were discussed and everyone present was informed as to their faults.

ALLENDALE ROD AND GUN CLUB PLAN MORE LAND

The woodland acreage in Morris County owned by the Allendale Rod and Gun Club may soon be increased by 325 acres if the appraisal of land committee appointed by John B. Schockert, President of the Club, approves of the purchase.

This land adjoins the 4,200 acre tract already owned by the Rod and Gun Club. If the appraisal committee, which plans to inspect the proposed land in the near future, recommends its purchase the club will then own over 45,000 acres of woodland rich in wildlife and especially birdlife.

AMBULANCE CORPS OPENS DRIVE FOR NEW AMBULANCE

An urgent appeal for \$2,500 was sent to the residents of Allendale in the form of a letter by the volunteer Ambulance Corps this week. This is the remaining amount needed by the Corps to purchase a new fully equipped ambulance.

The letter which was sent out by Chairman Archie Farrell, S. T. Van Hutten III and John Comley pointed out that the service performed by members of the Ambulance Corps for citizens of Allendale Upper Saddle River and Saddle River, cannot be counted in dollars.

The new ambulance is something that members of the corps deem absolutely essential since the old ambulance has been in constant use for the past six years and is worn out. Last year, repairs on the ambulance totaled more than \$600.

Reply envelopes were included with the letter of appeal sent to all box holders. In the event that any citizen wishes to contribute to this fund and has not received a reply envelope Mr. Farrell said he may address his contribution to the Allendale Ambulance Corps, Allendale, N. J.

We Need \$2,500 NOW

Residents of Allendale as well as residents of Upper Saddle River and Saddle River received a plea from the Allendale Ambulance Corps for \$2,500 for a new ambulance through the mail this week.

It should not be necessary for this newspaper or anyone to say anything for this worthy volunteer organization as the work they do in saving lives speaks louder than anything we can add, but the fact remains that folks around here have been hit from every side and the old pocketbook is wearing thin but this is one plea that we can't afford to pass up if we want to show these men the people are really behind them.

The present ambulance has seen service and hard service since the day the organization took title—day after day we have heard the mournful wail of its siren as it streaked on its mission of mercy. We have been privileged to ride now and then and the look of thankfulness that greets the driver upon his arrival at the scene of an accident or a sick home is all the thanks the men want. They ask nothing for themselves but the means of doing their work more efficiently. Can we afford to deny them this? Of course we can't. This is something that is a must and a must right now.

They ask for \$2,500. Actually the new ambulance costs \$10,000. They have made the difference up with card parties and donations over a long period of time. This balance can be easily reached and it would prove to the 25-man squad who give so unselfishly of their own time and energy that we appreciate their fine work.

We would like to see the fund swell to \$3,000. This extra \$500 would enable the men to purchase a resusitator, so sorely needed in cases of drownings and heart attacks. We have an inhalator now—this helps by forcing oxygen into the patient's lungs—a resusitator does the breathing for the patient and is sorely needed. So if everyone gets behind the drive we can get the ambulance and equip it fully.

Allendale Ambulance Corps has a marvelous record of works of mercy. The cause they labor on is of the highest order. All they ask is for your contributions—large or small. So give, give generously, give it now, but GIVE!!

Thank you for inviting comments on the "Comprehensive Plan for Allendale." I thoroughly read the "Plan". It says that Noah heard a voice and built the Ark, and assumes that this so-called "Plan" is the Ark of Safety from a flood of people. The voice that Noah heard was the "voice of God", but how presumptuous to attribute this "Plan" to God; it is the work of Bagby and Pangburn. 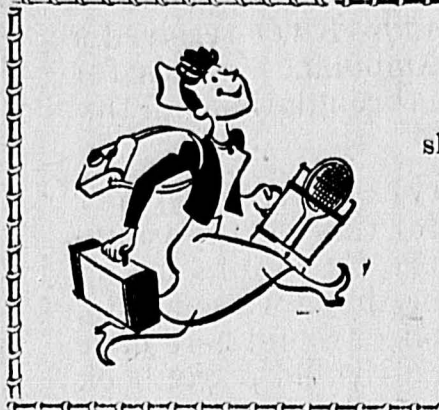
