Residents Voice Objections On Master Planning

School Board Award Playground Contract

The first step in providing the children of the Allendale school with their own playground was taken Tuesday night when the board approved the bid of the Foreit Construction Co. of Allendale of slightly under \$6,000 for the finishing and grading off of the ground adjoining the school.

Soft soil will be provided for the smaller children with a basketball court of black top also being laid out. Additional provisions were made for the higher grades to have play room but for the present, the borough's ball park would be used for soft ball until fencing and fill can be provided for. The work is to start immediately with hopes of completion before school opens in Sept.

Classrooms will be all polished and ready for the returning youngsters with all but two classrooms being occupied. One is to be set up for the visual education program with the equipment being set up on a permanent basis. This one room will be used for the PTA dancing classes and the Brownies when arrangements have been worked out with Mrs. Kanning and these groups. The board had provided more room last year but increased enrollment make this impossible this year with the future looking even blacker for outside organizations. The board have taken the position that the school must come first and nothing will be tolerated that will interfere with it.

The Allendale Coal and Lumber Co. was the low bidder for the oil needs for the coming year with a price of .0924 per gallon on 30,000 gallons used to heat the school.

Two teachers were added to the faculty when contracts were returned by Mrs. Roy Austin to teach home economics and Louis Murgia for Physical education. Both teachers have just received their degrees and it is felt the addition will give the present staff some new blood.

Principal Paul O'Connor advised the board that the eighth grade had presented the school with a new flag and a start of a fund to purchase a grand piano for the assembly. Their donation was \$100.00.

A contract for \$2,440 was approved with the Brisk Waterproofing Co. of New York for work on the stonework around the entire school and chimney to seal the many leaks caused by the caulking coming loose after twenty years of service. Work is to be started at once.

The board will not meet in August with the next meeting being called for September 9.

Planning Board Hits First Snag On Rezoning Program

The first of what promises to be a stormy series of public hearings on the Master Plan proposed by the Planning Board was held Monday evening at the War Memorial Building.

More than 175 citizens crowded into the steamy-hot auditorium to voice their objections to all or part of the plan: to ask questions about specific parts of the plan, or merely to listen and learn what the Master Plan was all about.

Hopes of the planning board to hold a limited number of public hearings and bring the Master Plan to a quick vote, were knocked down when it was realized at the end of the first meeting, which lasted till almost midnight, that only five pages of the 40-page plan had been discussed.

There will have to be a good many more public meetings for full hearing on all aspects of the plan before any action is taken.

Francis X. Scafuro, chairman of the planning board, introduced members of the planning board, Mayor Les Johnson, and Scott Bagby of the firm of Bagby and Pangburn, Planning Consultants who drew up the comprehensive plan for Allendale. He opened the meeting by saying it was the hope of the board that the

meeting would dispell many fears in the mind of the citizens and quell false rumors that were circulating.

Scafuro ran into objection from the floor when he proposed that each speaker confine his remarks to three minutes. J. Parnell Thomas, former congressman from this district, asked for unlimited debate. He said that in as much as adoption of the Master Plan would have far reaching consequences for the borough it ought not be agreed to without a fair and full hearing. He put this in the form of a motion and it passed.

Assessors Report Costs On Crescent Ave. Drains

The special committee appointed by Mayor Leslie Johnson met Wednesday night at the firehouse to explain the assessment to be levied against the Crescent Avenue property owners on the improving of this street and for a change, everything went just fine.

The figures set up by this committee are an estimate but it is believed that the final figure will not vary more than a mill or two. They broke the Crescent Ave. improvement into two parts with the railroad being the dividing line. Those owning property east of the track will be assessed 96.8c per foot for storm drains and \$1.54 per foot for curbing. Those west of the track, having no drainage problems are only taxed for the curbing of \$1.54 per foot. This charge includes the removal of trees and grading, etc. but not the rebuilding of retaining walls. These must

The figure of 96.8c for storm drains is based on the assumption that the borough will pay the same amount and the county will ante up a like amount. 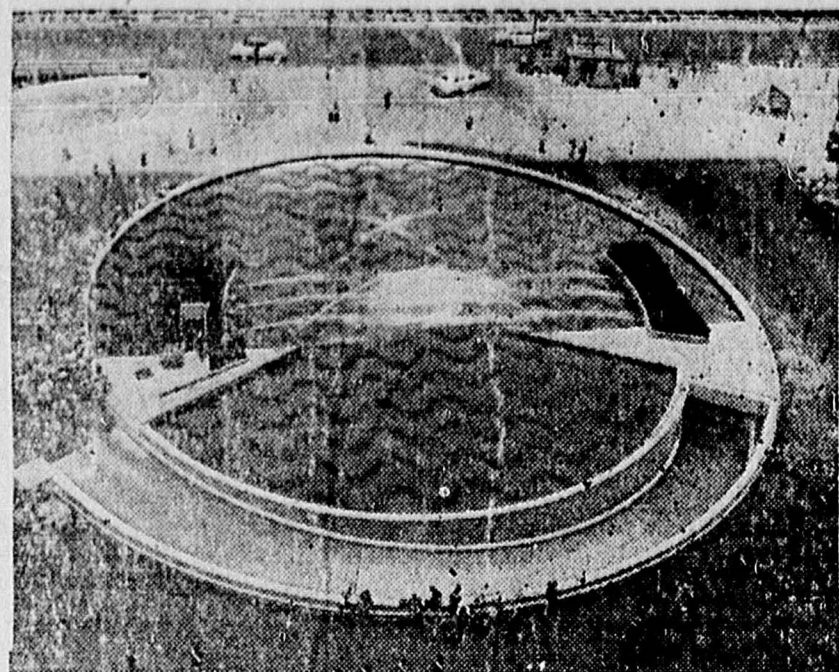

BORO OFFICIALS ASKS RESIDENTS TO SAVE WATER

Allendale water pumps are working overtime to meet the demands of water users in town and as a result of excessive usage, E. T. Critchley, water commissioner has offered the following watering schedule to all citizens.

Residents east of the railroad are urged to water on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights. All residents west of the railroad are asked to

water on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday nights.

Mr. Critchley stated that there is no water shortage, ie, no drain on wells as indicated by the water table, but already this year we have pumped 10 percent more water than during our peak month last year.

Chris Ryan of the water department says that the pumps are going night and day to supply the heavy demand and that a caution on the part of all residents will lessen the burden on our pumping station and insure safety in case of emergency.

In June Allendale pumped over five and a quarter million gallons in contrast to four and half million gallons used in June last year. Already indications are that the month of July will go much higher than last year's peak month.

Mr. Critchley also stated that lawn exports are now saying that it does little good to water lawns during these excessively hot days. The roots of grass naturally dig down straight to find whatever moisture there is in the soil, and if these grass roots are watered they come to the surface. When the hot sun beats down on the roots which have come to the surface, the roots are burned and this causes the lawn to die out faster than it would if left to natural water supply.

Therefore it is hoped by our water commissioner that people will quit watering their lawns, not only to protect our pumps, but also to protect their own lawns.

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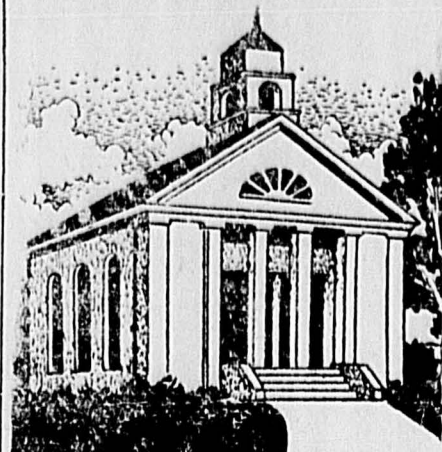

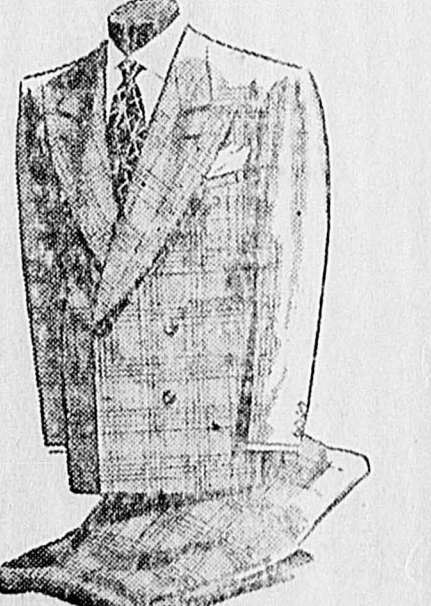
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RAMSEY ROTARY NAME COMMITTEES FOR NEW CLUB

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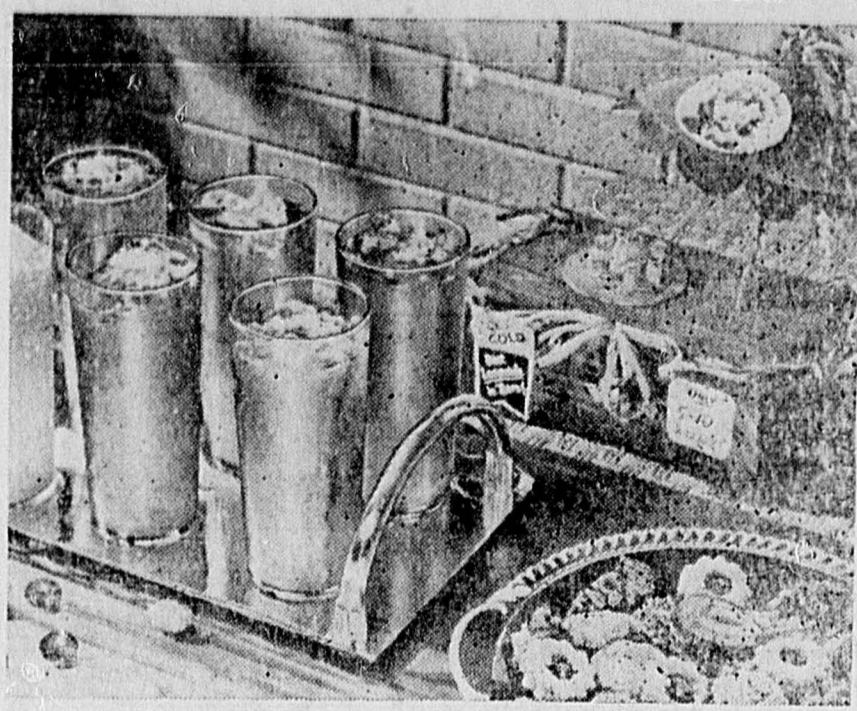

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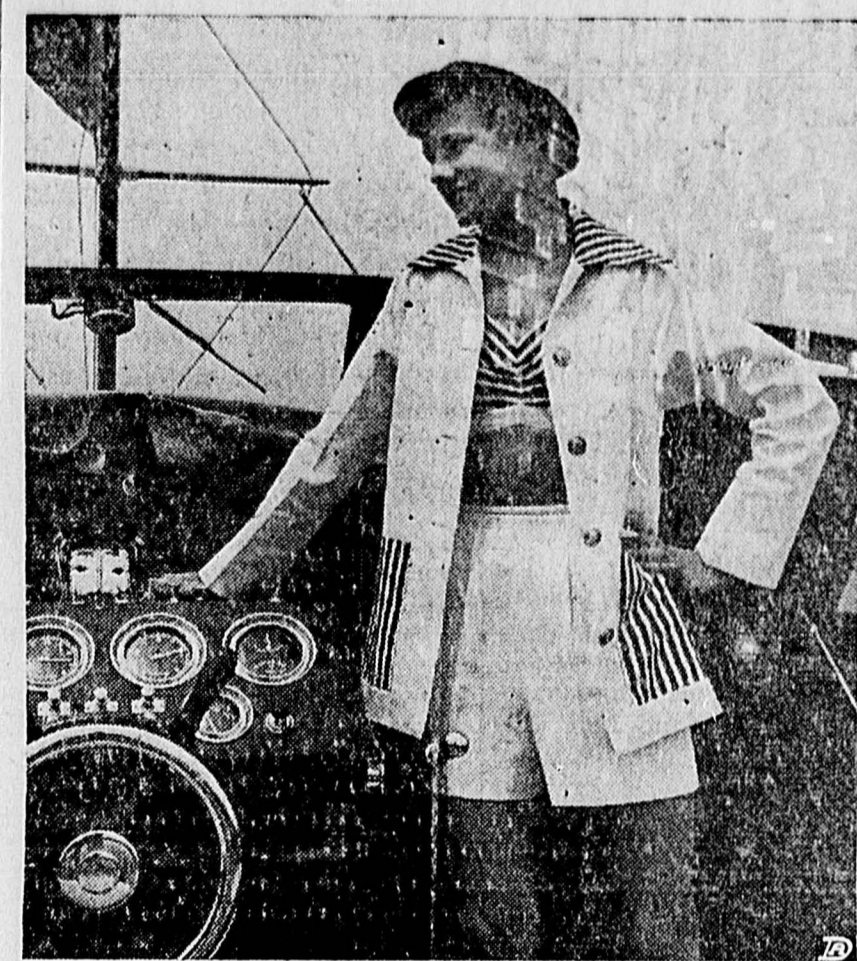

Fred Pfister wanted to know if the public would be given a chance to go over the Master Plan year by year. Chairman Scaforo assured him that open meetings would be held at regularly stated intervals to register community sentiment.

J. E. McGinnis asked about the power of the planning board. Chairman Scaforo said that the board had no power other than to recommend steps that the town might follow to implement the Master Plan.

The matter of a town sewer system was brought up by Mr. Thomas who cautioned against excessive spending for fear that "taxes will continue to rise so much that people will

for a "Utopia" that could never be realized and that the plan was visionary in the same way that the federal government had tried to plan for pigs in the 1930's.

Charles Webeck, attorney objected to the Chestwood Lake woodland area being zoned into AAA sections of I area and AA sections. He stated that the big lots were the expensive way of allocating land and unsafe because cars would speed through the uncrowded areas. Also he stated that he thought the board was putting extravagant prediction on the number of future school children who will have to be provided for.

"Allendale has always been able to provide education for its young people, and it always will be able to," he said.

Mr. W. S. Hughes objected to the land adjoining his property being zoned for business and part of it planned for the future civic center.

Mr. George Megnin could not see the wisdom of the plan in proposing any additional business for the center of town, which he says is too crowded now. He said light industry should be zoned away from the center of town where it would cause the least inconvenience possible.
