Freeholders Create Sewer Authority For N. W. Bergen

William C. Lee Laid To Rest Yesterday

William C. Lee, resident of Crescent Avenue and Park Place for almost a half century died suddenly in Paterson General Hospital Monday following an operation. He had been ill only a short time.

Mr. Lee was 87 years old and died on the 52nd anniversary of his wedding to Mary Kirkpatrick of Nashville, Tennessee.

Services were held yesterday morning at the Church of the Epiphany with Rev. Edwin Carson and the Rev. Bayard Hancock officiating. Interment was at Mt. Pleasant Cemetery in Newark.

The contributions Mr. Lee has made to the town of Allendale are immeasurable but the stamp of his personality, his vitality and interest in a wide variety of subjects will remain for many years.

Mr. and Mrs. Lee came to Allendale in 1905 for a number of summers and occupied the house they later improved and made their permanent home. This was when Allendale was a popular summer resort because it was only "four hours from the city by horse and carriage." Mr. Lee was employed by the United States Trust Company of New York and rose to the position of vice president before he retired in 1940.

Most notable among his contributions to the town was his interest and long service to the library of Allendale which stands as a remarkable structure of Colonial design at the corner of Franklin Turnpike and Allendale Ave. It was built after years of fund raising by the Allendale Library Association in 1926. HIGH TENSION WIRE KILLS MONROE MAN

For over two hours artificial resuscitation was given by Benjamin Constantino, of South Main Street, Monroe, N.Y., an employee of Rockland Electric Co., who was electrified in Saddle River on East Saddle River Road and Ackerman Road, by Archie Farrell and Jack Comley of the Allendale Ambulance Corps on Tuesday.

When Farrell and Comley arrived at the scene they had just lowered Constantino from the pole, and immediately Farrell started artificial resuscitation and Comley was giving the victim oxygen from the Corps' inhalator.

A call was put in for help to Chief Wilson for an resuscitator, and he notified the Waldwick Fire Department of the need, and dispatched Officer Pete Cauwenberg with another tank of oxygen. These men form a relay of teams and worked incessantly for over two hours in artificial resuscitation after Dr. Minck had pronounced the victim dead.

LOCAL BOY ON STAFF OF MEXICAN SCHOOL

Daniel Hamilton formerly of Allendale and now teaching in Moorestown, N. J. is working this summer at the Valley Institute at Phair Texas. Allendale has been extended an invitation, along with 16 other towns in the area, to join the newly created Northwest Sewer Authority.

The question of membership will be of particular interest to citizens in town who attended the recent public meeting on the Master Plan. The matter of sewers came up for discussion and the proposed sewer authority was mentioned in connection with meeting the town's coming sewer needs.

The Board of Freeholders created the new sewer authority Wednesday in order that the 17 communities located in the Passaic River drainage area be able to correct or solve their sewage disposal problems.

Membership on the part of the communities invited to join is not mandatory.

Planning Board To Hold Second Hearing Tues.

The Planning Board will hold its second public meeting for further discussion of the Master Plan Tuesday evening July 29, at 8:15, in the school auditorium.

It is felt by members of the Planning Board that by holding the forthcoming meeting at the school, where there will be more room, that it will be cooler perhaps, and that in the relative comfort of larger quarters, the business of discussing the merits and demerits of the Master Plan will be greatly facilitated.

192 FAMILIES SEND IN DONATION FOR NEW AMBULANCE

In response to the appeal in which Chairman Archie Farrell sent out for donations only 192 residents responded — so far for a total of \$1,272.00.

Chairman Farrell is stressing the fact the new ambulance is sorely needed, and no one knows the value of an ambulance until it is needed — and he hopes the residents will send their donations in as soon as possible.

Francis X. Scafuro, chairman of the Planning Board has invited the Bergen County Park Commissioner and Henry Fagin, Planning Director of the Regional Plan Association.

In view of the fact that at the first meeting a great deal of time was spent in explaining and establishing the procedure of discussion, this meeting will get underway more quickly. The pattern has been set. Discussion will follow the text of the Master Plan report of Bagby and Pangburn chapter by chapter. Unlimited debate will be permitted the speakers but it is hoped that this privilege will not be abused so that every shade of opinion will have a fair hearing. (Please Turn to Page Six)

Allendale Library Stands As Tribute To Generosity Of Grand Old Man

The red brick colonial library situated at the corner of Franklin Turnpike and Allendale Avenue stands not only as the town's most charming public building but as a living memorial to William C. Lee who died suddenly on Monday.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Lee have been so closely identified with the work of the library and the building itself for the past fifty years, that the town might well consider the efforts of this couple as the chief reason why we have such a fine library in our community.

Back in 1900 a meeting of the Village Improvement Association was held and a motion was passed to give Allendale a public library. It is a matter of record that the motion was bracketed in with a road improvement motion because members of the Village Improvement Association said that the roads were so intolerable that one citizen's carriage sunk axle-deep in a mudhole on Allendale Avenue.

But out of this early motion the first home of the library materialized. It was a non-municipal operation, as now, supported by a citizens committee. The library was in the frame structure on the east side of Franklin Turnpike that served variously as borough hall, public school and American Legion Community Center.

The library had a vicarious existence for nearly twenty years. Funds were limited. Quarters were cramped. Moves were numerous. The need for a school cloak room led to the library's first dispossession from the original Franklin Turnpike home. For two years it operated in a store rented to the li-

brary committee by John Ackerman.

Then the library people packed their books and moved to Allendale's "flat iron" building the old Braun building near the railroad station where the weather beaten sign "Allendale Library, VIA" swung until 1926.

The turning point in the library's history occurred in 1919 when it was reorganized as the Allendale Library As-

sociation. The transition made the members of the Village Improvement Association the trustees of the Allendale Library Association.

William C. Lee was one of those trustees. His wife served as librarian and has given her services to the present library unselfishly all these years.

The library supporters had long dreamed of giving the town its own building. When the reorganization occurred in 1919 the sum of \$104.40 of the Village Improvement Association was placed in a building fund for the erection of the (Please Turn To Page 6)

N. Y. MAN FINED FOR FISHING WITHOUT STATE LICENSE

Edward Downs of Weehawken failed to appear for traffic violation and was sent a letter in lieu of a bench warrant.

Teddy Kasperzak, Pompton Lakes and John Nagle of Wyckoff were fined \$5 each and \$3 each court costs for trespassing at Crestwood Lake.

Giving Thought To A Vital Necessity

Tucked away in last week's paper was a little item on the conservation of water issued by the Water Commissioner, E. T. Critchley. The ideas expressed by Mr. Critchley, if they are followed up by the users will save water but everyone knows that unless the borough passes an ordinance forbidding the use of water for lawn watering it will continue and there is nothing anyone can do to stop it. The only thing is public sentiment and that runs a poor second to the property owner who sees his hard labor burning up under the scorching sun. The water department can plead for help but it will get nowhere.

No, the answer to the problem lays in getting a bigger supply of water for the future growth of Allendale and sell the water conscious property owner all he can use or buy. We have, as everyone knows a fine source of water and the water table has not gone down any great degree despite the largest amount of water ever used in Allendale. For this we can be thankful to the foresight of past administrations. We have been told that J. Parnell Thomas headed the administration that sold the bonds necessary to make Allendale independent of neighboring boroughs for their water. These bonds, \$60,000 worth have been paid off and we, as a borough, are now in a position to make a profit on our investment. Our thought on the matter is the acquiring of lands for future use as a source of water and the starting of a fund to be derived from the present water department when it is necessary to purchase the equipment necessary to draw the water out.

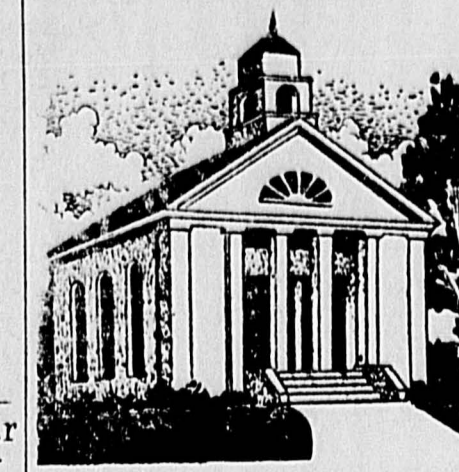
We were surprised to find no reference to water needs for the future of the borough in the Master Plan for the borough and possibly our thinking is all off, but to our mind the need for water will grow as the borough begins to fill out the new vacant land. Anyone that has been without water knows the importance of water. Why the planners did not set up a plan for the future when they made up this program is a mystery to us. Certainly it is more important to the town to have water than to think of buying Crestwood Lake or some of the other ideas expressed for the future plans for the borough.

Surely readers by this time are aware of the position we have taken to increased taxes but if we keep the profit from our water department from being used by some other borough project we will be able to install additional equipment and acquire new lands for water without adding a penny to our tax bill. Furthermore it will not be necessary to issue too large an amount of bonds. These bonds could be paid for out of the increased sale of unlimited water to the consumer.

While on the subject of water we would like to doff our hat to our hard working water department that regardless of time of day or the weather are ever ready to repair the service needs for the borough. Chris Ryan, a paid employee of the borough goes far and beyond his expected duties to keep water running to our homes. He thinks of the future needs for the town and important too is his approach to the pocketbooks of the taxpayer. It isn't often that both thoughts enter an employee's mind and we sincerely hope that Mr. Ryan will continue to be appreciated by his employer, Mr. and Mrs. Allendale.

In conclusion we hope the reader has been cooled off enough by all this talk of cold, clear water in this stifling heat as much as we have in writing it. If it does that our efforts have not been in vain.

M. J. FERBER URGES PARTY TO WORK FOR 'IKES' ELECTION

Following his election as Bergen County Republican Campaign Manager, Sheriff Martin J. Ferber today pleaded for party members to forget their personal views over the choice of the Republican presidential candidate and unite in a common cause to rid America of Communism, New Dealism and corruption.

"I attended the Chicago Convention as a spectator", said Sheriff Ferber, "because I was keenly interested in seeing Senator Taft win the nomination for president. (Continued From Page One) Ramsey who presented the resolution to the county board.

Over the past year Northwest Bergen towns gained approval for a preliminary survey of the area as the first step toward the creation of the Sewer Authority. This program has been given top priority by Freeholder Smeltzer who had the support of the Mayors of all area towns.

During recent months every municipality of this area has adopted resolutions asking the Freeholders for the establishment of the sewage program.

The new Authority will have power to issue bonds, acquire land and perform all contracts for a sewer plan similar to the one operating in the Overpeck Valley area. Appointment of the Sewer Authority Board of Commissioners will be the next step in the program.

The Freeholders pointed out that the program will be on a voluntary basis. Each municipality will join the sewer program as its local needs require and when sufficient money is available. These joining the system will sign contracts with the Authority and pay a proportionate share of the cost of installing and operating sewers.

Although no complete engineering surveys have been made, the Free holders said it is likely that the trunk sewer will be planned to connect with the facilities of the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission if that agency agrees to expand its present equipment. Otherwise a new plant would have to be built which would entail greater costs.

Starting at page 14 of the Master Plan, discussion will proceed on the chapters of "The Effect of Street Design," "Future Schools and Parks," "Other Public Needs - A Civic Center" and on through the rest of the plan as time permits.

The meeting is scheduled to last three hours, and it is hoped by the Planning Board that townspeople will have read the plan thoroughly before the meeting in order that the discussion proceed as rapidly as possible with little time lost in reviewing what is printed in the plan.

Because of the far reaching effects of the proposals in the Master Plan great interest has been evidenced in the public meetings. Mr. Scafuro was gratified at the turnout of

townspeople at the first meeting and hopes that even a larger number will come to the forthcoming meeting.

Members of the Planning Board are in hopes that those of the audience who are generally in favor of the Master Plan will make their opinions known, to balance the effect of the vocal critics of the plan.

Since the last meeting there has been evidence that critics of the plan have rallied support for their point of view and plan to vigorously oppose all or parts of the Master Plan.

In this regard, the Planning Board feels it is necessary to repeat that the adoption of the Master Plan is not a commitment of action or expenditure. Any major steps taken in relation to the plan must be taken in the usual manner, through referendum or hearings on Borough Council ordinance.

Public sentiment is high on both sides of the question of whether or not Allendale should adopt the Master Plan. This meeting to be held on Tuesday will be the place for citizens to voice their feelings and a cordial invitation is extended to everyone in town to come and express his views.

In 1923, the Library Association incorporated and purchased the site of the present library. Mr. and Mrs. Lee were both active workers for the new building because they realized that the library could no longer be maintained successfully by being moved from one rented building to another.

On December 18, 1926, the official open house was held for townspeople to inspect the new library that skeptics had said "couldn't be built in a town like Allendale." Mr. and Mrs. Lee worked tirelessly to make it possible for the town to have one of the largest selections of books for its size of any town in the vicinity.

In 1940 Mr. and Mrs. Lee gave the north wing of the library to the town. Mr. Lee served as president of the Library Association for over twenty five years. But it was not the offices he held on the Library Board nor the contribution of the north wing of the building that is outstanding, it his years of unselfish service to the cultural needs of our town and his great personal charm and friendliness as a member of the community that will be most vividly remembered.

for an equal number of years. Garden enthusiasts will remember Mr. Lee for his wonderful rose garden and his great interest in gardening. Up until very recently he was able to devote a great many hours to having one of the show places of Allendale and the grounds surrounding his home attest to his devotion to his hobby.

The home he and his wife lived in and improved throughout the past half century is filled with beautiful antiques and remarkable examples of early American life.
