## Record Enrollment Start Back To School Sept. 4th

A record breaking enrollment will march back to the Allendale school on Thursday September 4 at 9:00 a.m. Awaiting the children is a spanking clean school, all in tip top shape, the result of the hard work of custodians James Keivet and Andrew Jokobi during the long summer vacation.

Most of the classrooms have had some painting, furniture refinishing except the new addition. The new visual aid room has been equipped with dark shades and the permanent erection of the projector and films insure the children of this latest aid to education.

The external appearances of the grounds have been vastly improved with the new circular driveway off Brookside Avenue to be used for cars. This one way road will be closed for a week until plans for the use of it has been decided upon by the Board of Education. Work on the lawn has been held up pending the cooler weather and the construction of the driveways.

Another safety measure installed is the new walks on both the east and west end of the building for use by the children. This will keep the students from using the present driveways used by cars and trucks making deliveries.

One basketball court has been completely constructed of black top and will be used for out of door games in the future. The balance of the playground will be completed very shortly.

The large enrollment will see the opening of the third kindergarten class for the first time in Allendale. To enter the class a child must be five by the 31 of December and present a birth certificate to that effect at the time of registration.

New pupils for the elementary and high school will be registered on Wednesday, Sept. 3 between 9 a.m. and noon. Students to enter Ramsey must obtain an admittance slip at this time, from the principal, Paul O'Connor.

James Standing, president of the school board urges parents to caution the children to cross the streets in the neighborhood of the school where the safety patrol is stationed. Parents are urged to obey the requests of the patrol for the safe conduct of the children across the busy streets.

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WHY YOU SHOULD REGISTER NOW

More than 900,000 New Jersey citizens will be unable to vote in this year's Presidential election unless they place their names on registration lists before September 25.

Less than a month's time remains for this 30 per cent of our population to take action if they are to participate in the choice of our government for the next four years.

Certainly all of these unregistered citizens have a stake in the outcome of the elections as large as that of registered voters.

Certainly most of them have—or will have—definite opinions about the men who are running for office.

Yet none of them will be able to make their voices heard when the decision is made. None of them will be able to share in the decision, unless they take positive steps to register before September 25.

All citizens are entitled to vote. Yet only those who have placed their names on the official lists of citizen voters in the communities where they live, will receive ballots at the polling places on Nov. 4.

The reasons for registration are obvious—to provide checked lists of those eligible to vote; and prevent fraud in the voting. Few would object to the registration requirement.

Yet three out of every 10 New Jersey citizens are unregistered today. Three out of 10—30 per cent of the population—have disfranchised themselves by failure to register with their local election officials.

The privilege of voting is one of the major characteristics of our American system of government.

We have fought our wars to preserve it. If it were taken away forcibly, we would be keenly aware of our loss. Yet 900,000 people in New Jersey have given it up as not worth the bother.

How about you? The deadline is September 25.

JONES SEEK NEW INSPECTION SPOTS

Bergen County will have four new motor vehicle inspection stations and the existing stations at Hackensack and Ridgewood will be enlarged if Assemblyman Walter H. Jones can persuade the State Legislature to appropriate the needed funds next year.

Jones said today that he will strongly urge the Legislature to provide increased appropriations for the State Motor Vehicle Division to relieve over-taxed facilities at inspection stations in Bergen County.

William J. Dearden, acting director of the Motor Vehicle Division, has advised me that Ridgewood station is 60 per cent overloaded," declared Jones. "This pressure could be greatly relieved with two new stations in south Bergen, one in Paramus and another in Closter."

"Acting Director Dearden recognizes that Bergen County is greatly in need of additional inspection stations and I am sure he will cooperate with me in seeing that new stations are built and that the Ridgewood and Hackensack stations are expanded."

The record breaking heat of July was not the only record breaking during the month. Emergencies at Hackensack Hospital also hit a record high with 507 cases treated in the Emergency Room during July.

There were 43 highway accident cases, or more than one every day, and 169 home accidents recorded on the Emergency Room reports. The long heat wave resulted in 8 heat prostrations brought in for treatment in the Emergency Room.

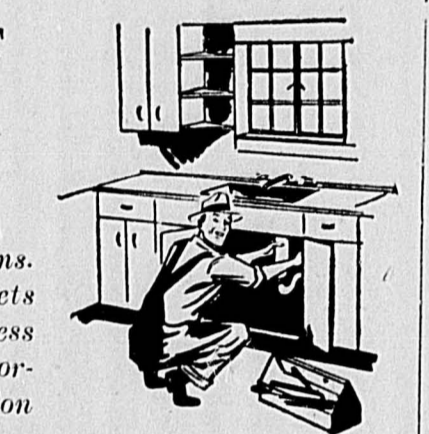

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COUNTY REPORTS

38 AUTO ACCIDENTS

Most of the accidents which occurred on highways in Bergen County during July were due to rear end collisions, according to the report of the Bergen County Police, which recorded 30 rear end collisions in the 38 accidents occurring during the month.

Cut off were listed by the police as causing 7 of the accidents recorded, and one motorist fell asleep, and crashed. An even dozen accidents occurred in the Paramus area, either on Route 17 or Route 4. In all, there were 14 accidents on Route 17, 10 on Route 4, 5 on Route 6 and 9 on other roads throughout the County.

County Police issued 299 summonses for violation of the motor vehicle laws during July, 142 of them for speeding.
