Parents Hear School Planned For East Side

Members of the school board gave a full account of their work to members of the Allendale Parent-Teachers Association Tuesday evening in the school auditorium.

The major part of the report was given by James Standring, president of the board. His talk dealt mainly with the school budget, which now totals about \$133,000, or two thirds of the town's taxes.

Mr. Standring explained that the money is voted by the electorate at the special school board election, then raised by taxation by the Borough Council and that money specified for certain uses could only be spent as allocated. At present the cost of education per pupil per year for the grade school children is about \$247. With the cost of education of high school students included, the figure is nearly \$300.

The difficulties the school board faces were described by Mr. Standring, who said that if the present rate of growth continues in the grade school, within three years Allendale will be in need of another building.

This year 60 new students entered the school. A peak enrollment is expected in three years, when the present building will be operating at capacity. Capacity, Mr. Standring explained, is actually an enrollment in excess of what the building can accommodate because this figure is arrived at on the basis of 35 students per room. The Allendale school has 15 classrooms, but by the very nature of some of the specialized teaching, 35 students in each classroom would create an overcrowded condition.

With this situation in mind, the school board is investigating the possibilities of building a school on the east side of town. No site has been selected as yet, but the board promises a definite report on this matter in "the foreseeable future."

Mr. Standring said it would be impractical to add another wing to the present building because this would concentrate too many children in one location.

The possibility that state aid for education may be increased was mentioned and Mr. Standring said that although his own opinion was that tax money "raised in Allendale is (Please Turn to Next Page)

Differences Are Here

ZONING CONTROVERSY IN BRIEF

Here, in outline form, are the positions taken on principal points at issue on zoning by the Citizens Committee in opposition to the zoning plan and by the Borough Council. There are also some notations on the regulations set up in the original zoning ordinance:

TRIPLE AAA ZONES

The Citizens Committee—Triple AAA zoning to be entirely eliminated.

The Council—Minimum lot requirements under AAA to be 26,000 square feet (a lot approximately 130 feet front x 200 feet depth); one-floor houses are to be 1,300 square feet.

The Original Zoning ordinance — Minimum lot size 40,000 square feet (175 x 230 feet) and one-floor house area to be 1,400 square feet.

DOUBLE AA ZONES:

Citizens Committee—Lot sizes to be 120 x 150; house area 1,050 square feet, and Double AA to replace all presently contemplated AAA zones.

Council—Lot size to be 115 x 175; house area to be 1,200 square feet.

Original Ordinance — 120 x 150 lot size; house area 1,200 square feet.

SINGLE A ZONES:

Citizens Committee—lot sizes of either 100 x 125 or 100 x 150; A-zone to take effect for all presently contemplated Double AA zones.

Council—lot sizes of 100 x 150.

Original Ordinance—lot size 100 x 100.

MULTIPLE DWELLING IN B ZONES

Citizens Committee—no opposition.

Council—Favors raising limits on erecting or converting multiple family dwellings from a ratio of 4,000 square feet per family (as stated in original ordinance) to 5,000 square feet per family.

GARAGES:

Citizens Committee—eliminate requirements for garage with each new house, and supplant this with provision for driveway to permit off-street parking.

Council—garage area or space for garage must be designated, but actual garage construction not mandatory.

Original ordinance—Every new house must have garage.

STREETS:

Citizens Committee—Change requirements that front yards must face on "dedicated public streets"

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Officer Parenti Assists In Chase On Route 17

Officer Frank Parenti Jr., will appear at the Hackensack Traffic Court on Monday to serve as a witness in the case of Theodore R. Davenport of Paterson, charged with driving his car from 90 to 100 miles an hour through the Allendale light on Highway, 17 early Saturday morning.

Officer Parenti answered a County police radio call at 12:25 Saturday morning reporting speeding motorist, presumably driving a stolen car, driving north from Ho Ho Kus on route 17 at a speed estimated to be over 100 m.p.h.

Auxiliary Policeman Harry Goodrich was on patrol with Officer Parenti at the time and together they proceeded to the Allendale light. Immediately Officers Parenti and Goodrich cleared all lanes of traffic turned on the police warning lights and Officer Parenti then focused the searchlight on himself as he stood at the side of the road awaiting the oncoming speeder.

Davenport, driving a 1952 Hudson, came thundering down the highway followed by five or six police cars all with sirens wailing. When Davenport saw Officer Parenti he gunned his motor even harder and sped by. Officer Parenti fired one shot at the wheels of his car in an effort to frighten Davenport into slowing down.

The chase proceeded on up Highway 17 for 22 miles. Davenport finally eluded the police in Harriman State Park. His car was traced by the Police who recorded his license number. He was picked up at his home in Paterson later Saturday morning. The car he was driving was his own.

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COUNCIL VOTES NO ON JOB PETITION

A test of sentiment on non-conforming uses of property was taken by Councilman Frank McCord at the recent Borough Council meeting.

He made a motion that Pat Job's tavern, the Crescent Inn, be zoned for business. The motion was unanimously defeated.

Mr. McCord said that he brought the matter to a vote of the council because he had promised Mr. Job that he would. In rejecting the motion, the Council said they voted against the motion because it would open the door to "spot zoning." Also, the said, the revisions in the proposed zoning ordinance provided non conforming businesses with proper protection.

Mr. Job thanked Mr. McCord for "sticking to his word," but said he was disappointed in the vote and could not accept their decision as the final word. He said he "was not satisfied" and that he would "carry the matter further — into the courts if necessary."

The Turnpike Tavern, another business operating in a residential zone under a non-conforming status was represented by Attorney David Amster of Waldwick. Mr. Amster said it would not be "spot zoning" to put the tavern in a business zone because everything south of the tavern — in Waldwick — is already in a business zone.

Mr. McCord reminded Mr. Amster that his client had brought the tavern with the full knowledge that it was non conforming. Mr. Amster agreed that refusal to zone his client's property as a business zone was a direct invasion of "constitutional rights which protect property."

present council in the last week of the year.

The objectors to the zoning ordinance again dominated the public discussion on the ordinance at the Borough Council's meeting in the War Memorial building last Thursday.

Mayor Johnson told the audience of about 150 people who packed the auditorium that he knew no ordinance would please everyone but that he and the other members of the Council had spent many hours on the problem, had listened to "a lot of comment, some con-

structive, some destructive," had "mulled over and sifted the comments," had taken the many letters into consideration, had come up with revisions he felt were "basically good for Allendale.

He then proceeded to read the revisions that had been hammered out by himself and the councilmen in executive sessions during the last two weeks. In general these revisions pertained to the sizes of lots in the several zoning classifications, relaxation of regulations on non conforming businesses in residential zones, a softening of the restrictions on garages and some other revisions which in essence were clarifications of language.

The Council's revisions met many of the minor objections of the Citizens Committee, but did not agree on such major points at issue in the proposed ordinance as lot sizes, non-conforming businesses, and the legality of maps approved by the Planning Board prior to the passage of the ordinance.

The Citizens Committee's objections were received by Borough clerk Charles Vollaro in a letter signed only "Citizens Committee" and he refused to read it until Mr. Wilson and Pasko Job agreed to list their names as signers.

The letter presented a detailed 11 point program for

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changes in the ordinance. In general these would downgrade requirements in zone classifications, strike out the requirement of garages expand the light industry area, eliminate non conforming statuses. It suggested that roads should be included in the ordinance and, finally, insisted that existing lots and maps previously approved by the Planning Board be exempt from the ordinance.

(For comparison of the Citizens Committee's objections, with the Council's revisions and the wording of the ordinance on major items, see accompanying story.)

It was on the last point in these objections — the existing maps approved by the Planning Board — that Mr. Wilson was most vigorous in his objections. He explained that a subdivision map he had drawn up two years ago was approved by the Planning Board but that his development plans had been upset by the zoning controversy and that in fact mortgage money had been denied him until the matter of his lot sizes had been definitely settled.

Francis X. Scafuro, Planning Board Chairman, asked Mr. Wilson if he had brought this matter to the attention of the Planning Board. Mr. Wilson said that he had not, but that he had brought it to the attention of the Council more than a month ago. "That was the wrong place to take your problem," Mr. Scafuro told him. Mr. Wilson did not reply.

A spokesman for the Council explained later a zoning ordinance could not be effective if it did not supersede such maps and (Please Turn to Page Seven)

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Lets Stop This Fighting!

Right now the borough of Allendale is seemingly divided into two rival camps, those who approve the zoning ordinance and those who are in opposition. It's too bad that the division exists because it is not good for the borough anymore than the railroad tracks that have divided the borough and held back its natural development.

The objectors who made up the bulk of the hearings of the council in September were objectors to the proposed Master Plan. In the whole it was a good plan and it still is. We believe it was misunderstood by most people that the Master Plan was only a guide, not a law, and the Planning Board (unduly defensive about its project) just didn't get that idea over to the people.

Of course, some of the items in the Plan were pretty far-fetched, and these could have been eliminated before the public hearings. But they were not and we see the results of it right now, at every council meeting.

We have attempted to analyze the differences between the opposing viewpoints on the new zoning ordinance as drawn up in another section of the paper and right now the differences are not so great that agreement is impossible. The sooner we can get away from the haggling and pettiness the sooner we can accomplish the final result that everybody wants — a sensible zoning law. We must forget the personal feelings and private feuds and get down to business.

Right now it looks like both sides are being stubborn. The lame duck council is determined they will put through an ordinance and the Citizens Committee seems unwilling to compromise the position that they have maintained all the time.

Here is where we go into the dog house with both sides but as The Allendale Press has always maintained and independent viewpoint, we feel this is for the best interests of the borough.

You taxpayers should study the various points of difference and let your opinions bring weight to bear to settle this thing before it gets out of hand. The delay and the growing bitterness are bad for the borough and at the same time hard on our pocketbooks.

A number of other citizens spoke at the Thursday meeting. J. M. Christopher asked why some of his property which had formerly been in the B zone had been changed to Double A.A.

Galenkamp, owner of a tract of land on the west side of Forest Road, objected to his property being zoned Triple

AAA. Mr. Galenkamp said that the lots were too big and that he would never be able to sell them.

He asked the Mayor if any adjustment could be made in his property and was told "no". Members of the Council expressed the opinion that Mr. Galenkamp's land was "reasonably zoned" and that they could not zone his land for smaller lot sizes without destroying the character of the ordinance.

There was objection from the floor to the extension of the B zone which provides for multiple housing. It was argued that Wyckoff is not zoned for multiple housing, nor for industry, and that Allendale ought to do the same.

At the close of the meeting Ernest Arlt, not concerned with zoning, brought up the matter of progress on the Crescent Avenue improvement project. He maintained that the road was being unnecessarily torn up and that work was being delayed.

Pat Job, contractor for the Crescent Avenue construction work, was on hand to answer his complaints and told Mr. Arlt that work had been delayed because the Rockland Electric Company had to remove a pole before work could continue.

position on this specific matter, presumably stands on the amended ordinance. The ordinance says that its provisions shall take precedence over "such rules, regulations or permits or by such private restrictions . . . The provision of this ordinance shall control.

OTHER CITIZENS COMMITTEE SUGGESTIONS

The Citizens committee suggested that roads be included as a part of the zoning ordinance, and recommended that all secondary roads should be of 50-foot right of way with 20-foot macadam paying with 6-inch penetration. In case of a road connecting two main arteries, a full 30-foot road with curbing would be required, by sidewalks not mandatory in any case.

OTHER COUNCIL AMENDMENTS:

1. In accord with Planning Board recommendation, the council amended the ordinance to delete the so-called C1 zone, thus not providing for outlying "neighborhood business districts."

2. Zoned Harold Christopher's garage for D (industrial) zone instead of A zone, as suggested.

3. Zoned Mrs. Elizabeth Berdan's property as C (business) instead of A, as suggested.

There were several other minor changes in the ordinance, intended to clarify the language of the law, and the Council also changed the zoning of two lots to conform with the surrounding area after hearing a plea from J. M. Christopher.
