## Buried Loot Declared Convicts' Local Lure

RAMSEY — Is there buried loot, probably totalling between \$75,000 and \$100,000, somewhere in the area between West Crescent Ave., Allendale, and the commuter parking lots south of Main St., here? Chief of Pasaic County Detectives Adam Reiser suspects there is, and that the buried loot was the reason for the visit of escaped convicts Michael Salvi and Abraham Prins to the Ramsey-Allendale area.

According to the theory of Chief Reiser, Prins participated in robberies that produced a considerable amount of loot. He is also suspected of having participated in the murder of Salvatore Malfetti in West Milford in October, 1960, and other gang killings, as well as having supplied the revolver with which former Lt. Nicholas Bernardi of the Jersey City police was gunned down in a Journal Square holdup.

### In Ramsey Before

Prins was definitely in Ramsey in January, 1955, as he was arrested that month by Lt. Norman Stegan for carrying a concealed weapon and violating parole. It is also regarded as a possibility that he was earlier one of the Jersey City youths who swam at Crestwood Lake, which would mean the area was even more familiar to him.

The burial place of the money would have to be one that was easily located by Prins, and would have to be fixed by a landmark not easily removed. For those reasons it is expected that the burial place would probably be located in a definite spot in relation to the Erie-Lackawanna right of way, its location fixed by relationship to a signal tower or some other easily spotted object.

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## Mahwah Rate up 99 Cents

MAHWAH — The 1962 tax rate will rise to \$9.12, an increase of 99 cents per each \$100 of assessed valuation, upon the adoption of the municipal budget introduced at the Township Committee meeting last Thursday night.

The budget shows requirements for the municipal departments, deferred charges, statistical expenditures and capital improvements amounting to \$555,469.66, an increase of \$44,617.02 over 1961. The amount to be raised by local taxes for local municipal purposes is \$324,158.68, an increase of \$82,088.23 over 1961.

### Valuations Decline

Mayor Morris E. Ruddick explained that the factors contributing to the increase are a decline of \$24,975 in net valuations taxable because of the elimination of household personal tax valuations and senior citizens exemptions, a decline in local revenues and a rise in the school tax.

A breakdown of the local tax rate shows \$6.13 allocated towards local schools, \$1.17 for the estimated county tax and \$1.82 for municipal purposes,

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## Hunters Have No Choice in Mahwah Park

MAHWAH — Yesterday's "Hunter's Choice" deer season was marked in Fyke Park by an all day patrol of the area by 11 men, five of them County Police, the others park guards to prevent any hunting of deer in the reservation. The entire park area is posted against hunting, and several men have been arrested in recent months for carrying firearms in the park.

One of the reasons for posting the patrols is the presence in the park of a herd which has recently grown from 10 to about 25 deer. ## School Budget Rises \$48,267

UPPER SADDLE RIVER — Following a one hour public hearing attended by 10 residents on Monday night, the Board of Education adopted a proposed budget of \$714,801.64 for the 1962-63 school year. This represents an increase of \$48,267.05 over last year.

Appropriations of \$111,820 include \$65,504 for state aid; \$8,450 for debt service; \$7,776 for tuition and \$30,000 from last year's budget, leaving \$602,981.64\*to be raised by taxation.

The largest category in the school budget is current expense, which accounts for \$578,069.79. The overall increase of \$44,435.65 consists of the hiring
