

### To Residents of the Northern Highlands Regional High School District:

In response to the opinion expressed by the voters on September 23, 1969, the questionnaire sent to all **v**oters in early November, 1969, and the work of a dedicated group of citizens on Board Advisory Committees, the Northern Highlands Regional High School Board of Education proposes the following revised plan to satisfy the educational needs of Allendale and Upper Saddle River for the foreseeable future.

Construct an addition to the present building, which will enable us to house the expected enrollment through 1976, and purchase 10 additional acres of land for future development. The total cost for the addition and land acquisition is estimated at \$3,968,000. This revised proposal received preliminary approval by the State Department of Education on March 11, 1970. The deletion of the swimming pool and outdoor locker facilities and deferral of other items from the September referendum have decreased the total cost by \$832,000.

Additional information and facts relating to this proposal are included in the following pages. You will have an opportunity to have any questions answered at the public hearing, April 30, and the Open Houses planned at the High School on May 3 and 10.

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

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
The planned construction conforms to the present building and is designed to provide at minimum cost, maximum educational facilities consistent with sound construction, reasonable operating cost and low maintenance.


#### HIGH SCHOOL POPULATION

The population study prepared last year by Dr. Henry Rissetto, Teachers College, Columbia University - Consultant, Educational Facilities has been brought up to date and proved to be correct. This study confirmed that the enrollment will probably level out at 1800 in about 10 years.

Our basic problem is: the present enrollment of 1170 is already about 170 more than can be comfortably handled with our present facilities. By 1973 we expect over 1500 students and three years later approximately 1650 students. Steps must be taken NOW in order to answer this obvious need. The proposed addition will provide facilities for about 1650 students; future requirements, if needed, should be only for additional facilities to accommodate 200-300 students.

### ADDITIONAL FACILITIES PLANNED

The planned facilities include additional classrooms for all areas of the curriculum, increased locker facilities within the building for physical education, and more seating space in the cafeteria. Additional administrative facilities have been provided and the guidance area will be relocated and expanded to meet increased enrollment. The special education classrooms will accommodate our students and those from sending districts on a tuition basis. The swimming pool and field house previously proposed have been eliminated.

## PROPOSED LAND ACQUISITION


The Board recommends the acquisition of the 10 acres east of the present property at the option price of \$150,000. This option expires on July 1, 1970. This additional land will provide for future playing fields and parking areas to help keep cars off local streets. However, of more immediate importance is the access to W. Maple Avenue which this land will provide; an access road will significantly relieve the existing traffic problems in the Hillside Avenue area.

This proposal will be a separate question on the ballot.

In subsequent years decreasing interest payments and anticipated increased ratables will reduce the rates outlined above.

#### CONCLUSIONS

Based on the population trend in Allendale and Upper Saddle River and the fact that our present high school building is equipped with sufficient "core" facilities to handle an addition, the Board believes this proposed addition to the present building is justified. This decision is further supported by the opinions expressed in the recent Board questionnaire.
