SUMMER SCHOOL BEGINS JUNE 29

The Northern Highlands Regional High School Board of Education will offer for the fifth consecutive year a summer school program for students who wish to enroll in review and enrichment courses.

There will be *one* six week summer school. The session will begin June 29, 1971 and will end August 6, 1971. The summer school will be directed by Mr. Alfred Vinci and Mr. Vincent Herold.

All courses offered during the regular year in grades 9 through 12 will be given for make up and credit.

Enrichment courses will be available in areas related to those offered during the year.

Driver Education will be offered this year for behind-the-wheel training. Scheduling for Driver Education will be done on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Registration will begin Thursday, June 24. Registration will take place in the high school office between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Any student who wishes to register early and has his program approved may turn the application (see inside page) in to Mr. Herold or Mr. Vinci before June 25.

The hours of attendance for students will be from 8:00 a.m. to 12:10 p.m. School will be closed July 5.

Jeanette Struchen Publishes New Book

Even if one is unaware of her accomplishments, there is something about Jeanette Struchen that makes her a standout. Tall and graceful, with smiling eyes, and hair touched by maturity, she is one of those lucky people in whom great charm and warmth are happily blended with keen intelligence.

An end product of Mrs. Struchen's attributes is her writing ability, never so clearly shown as in her newest book. *WHAT DO I DO NOW, LORD?* (Revell), a moving collection of conversations directed toward God by troubled women.

Some of her subjects are caught up in the rat race of modern society, some fight inroads of illness, others battle oncoming age. Some are exhausted by daily living in a changing world, tired of arguing with alienated children, weary of keeping communication lines open, unable to understand new life-styles, tastes and opinions. Some have marriages weakened by modern stress.

Some are faced with unexpected pregnancies, retarded babies, wandering husbands. All have finally thrown up their hands in despair and cried out, "What do I do now, Lord?"

The author says, "It is my hope that readers will do more than identify with the problems in my book. Above all, I hope they will discover anew the power of prayer which eternally binds wounds and heals heartaches in the human predicament. This book is about women who prayerfully are calling for help, knowing that Someone will listen and lead."

Presently teaching high school English at Northern Highlands, Jeanette Struchen has spent her life in meaningful contact with people.

A graduate of the University of Illinois, class of 1945, she gained her first writing experience doing radio commercials. Later, when daughter Deborah, now 19, was still a little girl, she spent five years as Director of Senior Citizens in Meadville, Pennsylvania, dealing first-hand with problems that attend encroaching age.

Later, as a leader of religious retreats, the author was able to explore the quality of deep faith, and saw its immediate application to everyday life. *WHAT DO I DO NOW, LORD?* has been a long time brewing because Jeanette Struchen felt she had lots of living to do before she could tackle other women's problems. In the meantime, she turned out three best-sellers, and numerous articles and books on a variety of topics.

Now that *WHAT DO I DO NOW, LORD?* is in print, this busy working wife is already working on another book, a book of love poems which she is also illustrating, and which will be published by Revell next Fall.

Summer School Will Begin June 29

The following is information which may be of interest to those who read this NEWSLETTER and are interested in participating in our 1971 Summer Session.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Northern Highlands Regional High School Summer Session is to give the students the opportunity to:

- a. make up credits for a subject or subjects failed during the year.
- b. strengthen background achieved during the regular school year.
- c. enroll in an enrichment course for cultural improvement without credit.

REGISTRATION

Thursday, June 24, Friday, June 25 and Monday, June 28. Registration will take place in the high school office between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Registration will be limited to students who are residents of the Northern Highlands Regional High School district and who were enrolled in grades 8 through 12 for the school year September 1970 to June 1971. The registration form for the summer session should be mailed or delivered to the District Office at the high school by 3:00 p.m. June 28, 1971.

DATES

Tuesday, June 29 to Friday, August 6. School will be closed July 5.

TIME

B. Enrichment

Time will vary depending on the arrangements made between the student and the teacher. The enrichment classes will meet between the hours of 8 a.m. and 12 p.m.

ATTENDANCE

Students enrolled in make-up courses for credit are expected to be in class every day. There will be no legal absence and work missed cannot be made up. All students will report to the auditorium at 8:00 a.m. on the opening day, June 29.

COURSE OFFERINGS

*All courses offered during the regular year in grades 9 through 12 will be given for makeup and credit.

*Enrichment courses will be available in areas related to those offered during the year.

Driver Education will be offered this year for behind-the-wheel training. Scheduling for Driver Education will be done on a first-come, first-serve basis.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation will be provided for those eligible beginning on the second day of school, June 30. Students will be notified of the bus routes along with pick-up locations in the auditorium on the first day. Students are expected to provide their own transportation *to* and *from* school on the opening day.

*The school reserves the right to withdraw any course due to insufficient enrollment level.

GRADING SYSTEM

a. Makeup—Grades obtained from Summer School will be A, B, C, D and F. Progress reports will be given to the students at the end of each week and at the end of the session.

b. Enrichment—Students will receive no credit or formal grades for enrichment courses. However, they will receive a satisfactory (S) or unsatisfactory (U) rating each week and at the end of the summer session.
