There are <u>6</u> extant pre-1900 Quackenbush homesteads in Allendale. The original Quackenbush property in Allendale seems to have been owned by Abraham A. Quackenbush, at about the time of the Revolution. In the Quackenbush family in this area, the name "Abraham" was a favorite. There were multiple Abraham Quackenbushes all living during the same period of time, and all either living in or owning property in what became the Allendale area. The problem is to distinguish, in early public records, one Abraham Quackenbush from another.

The first Abraham A. Quackenbush to live in what is today Allendale appears to be the Abraham A. Quackenbush who built the house at 700 Franklin

Turnpike about 1780.

Morris Ackerman opened a general store in 1869 in the hotel at Allendale. In April 1872 Morris Ackerman bought a lot, "on Allendale Avenue" from W. J. Ramsey; in the same month and year he sold a lot (probably the same lot), "34/100 of an acre, on the Erie Railroad" to R. V. Ackerman.

Richard V. Ackerman's first store (built by Sept. 1873) was just east of this present building. An ad in the 1876 Walker's Atlas Business index proclaimed: "R. V. Ackerman, Dealer in Groceries, Flour, Feed, Coal, Boots and Shoes." Ackerman built an addition to his store in 1878, served four years as Allendale's Postmaster, beginning Oct. 1, 1885, built a new coal yard in 1886, had Allendale's first pay telephone installed in his store (it was the only Allendale phone listed in the Ridgewood Central Office directory issued in September 1897), and built a large coal shed in October 1898.

About June 1903, R. V. Ackerman sold the house/ store to his son, John H. Ackerman. The Ackerman store was destroyed by fire on August 2, 1903, the Ackerman family awakening to the smell of smoke at night and barely escaping the fire, losing most of their belongings. The store was rebuilt that same year on a site slightly west of the old store.

John H. Ackerman ran this store, beginning in 1903, first as a general store/grocery store business. In May 1926 he sold his grocery stock to Winter Brothers and continued to do business as the Ackerman Coal and Fuel Co. John H. Ackerman's son, Richard V. Ackerman, ran the coal and fuel business with him; they had two offices--this one in Allendale and one in Ramsey. In 1953 they both retired from the business.

The Bergen County Historic Sites Survey (1983) lists this building in the "Allendale Railroad Station [District]" and describes it:

Ackerman's store is of commercial and architectural interest. Although its exterior has been altered by recent replacement shingles, some of the west first-story storefront details remain. Additional research may determine if this building housed Smith Roswell's 1878 grocery. By the turn of the century it housed Ackerman's Coal and Oil Co. This business shared early 20th century commercial significance with Richard Christopher's Coal and Lumber Co., (no. 6). Ackerman's store is close to the tracks, convenient for receiving produce, fuel and other shipments. There are no apparent architectural remnants of Ackerman's coal business.

Richard Vanderbeek Ackerman was born September 5, 1837 in New York City, the son of Abraham G. Ackerman and Catherine Vanderbeek. He died March 12, 1904 and was buried in Valleau Cemetery, Ridgewood. He married, first, on November 2, 1861 at Paramus, Caroline Ackerman, daughter of Col. Henry G. Ackerman and Ellen J. Zabriskie. She had been born February 27, 1840 (baptized April 1840, Saddle River Reformed Church), and she died December 31, 1898. They had children:



Vito Gasparini bought this property in 1902 from John A. Mallinson and his wife, Mary C. Mallinson. It is not known if the house had been built previous to this date. Gasparini had previously operated a shoe store and shoe repair business first on West Allendale Avenue next to Hop Yeoman's Butcher Shop (c. 1898) and later (c. 1900) in a house that stood on the site of the depot (the depot was moved to its present location on the west side of the tracks in 1902, to property purchased by the Erie Railroad from Vito Gasparini). Gasparini apparently conducted this business until the time of his death in 1925.

Vito M. Gasparini was born December 4, 1869 at Castle Grande, Italy, and died March 31, 1925 at Allendale. He first came to America in 1886, returning to Italy in 1888. He served 3 years in the Italian army as a sharpshooter. He married, in Italy, Mary DeLorenzo. They came to America, living first in Newark, Orange, and Paterson, and coming to Allendale in 1898. Vito M. Gasparini and his wife, Mary DeLorenzo, had children:

Richard J. Christopher came to Allendale in 1879 and started a saw mill in the vicinity of Park Avenue and West Crescent Avenue, near his home at 320 Park Avenue. He advertised in *The Allendale Methodist Herald* in August 1906: "Richard J. Christopher, Dealer in Saedd Timber, Fence Post, Kindling Wood, Saw Dust, etc. Truck Poles a specialty. P. O. Box 109, Allendale, N.J."

About 1911, Richard J. Christopher's sons, Jacob Muried Christopher and Richard J. Christopher, started in business as "Christopher Brothers." A printed invoice, dated Nov. 9, 1912, has the heading: "Christopher Brothers, J. M. Christopher, R. J. Christopher, High Grade Coal, Lumber and Building Materials." In March 1912 *The Ramsey Journal* reported "Messrs. Christopher Bros. are now erecting lumber sheds on their extensive property, and will be prepared to furnish the best of material at the lowest prices."

By 1920, J. M. Christopher was running the "Allendale Coal and Lumber Co., Successors to Christopher Bros." and by August 1923 the Allendale Coal and Lumber Company had moved into their "new and spacious offices on Park Avenue."

J. M. Christopher's brother, Richard J. Christopher, started a sawmill and lumber business on the northwest side the Erie tracks at West Crescent Avenue about 1928. He later ran this with his son, J. George Christopher, as R. J. Christopher & Son Lumber Company.

The Bergen County Historical Sites Survey (1983) lists this business as part of the "Allendale Railroad [District]" and describes it:

The lumberyard (no. 6, currently Allendale Lumber and Millwork Co.) retains a number of utilitarian-industrial buildings from the early 20th century Richard J. Christopher coal and lumber business. Some of the buildings have been altered because of age and continuous usage. Recent modifications to the brick west facade of the storefront building (no. 6A) are evident. The coal hopper (no. 6G) is certainly the largest and most interesting building in the lumberyard. It stands along a railroad spur, and it retains a number of coal chutes, the largest of which projects towards the spur. Although its condition is deteriorating and it is currently being used for lumber storage, the hopper building has not been greatly altered. The hopper machinery remains inside the upper stories....Site no. 6 includes a number of utilitarian-industrial buildings, some of which have architectural significance in Allendale's early

20th century commercial history. Additional research is necessary to determine the ages of the buildings and whether some of them are associated with an earlier (Ackerman's Coal and Lumber Co.?) business. Richard J. Christopher opened a coal and lumber business at this site in 1905. His father, Richard, ran a saw and grist mill at the interesection of West Crescent and Park Avenues from 1879 until 1908, when the mill building burned (see CKT 1974 map). Richard J. Christopher ran the 1905 coal and lumber business along the Erie mainline and Park Avenue with his brother, J. M. Christopher, as "Christopher Brothers". Later he worked in partnership with his son, J. George Christopher, as "R. J. Christopher and Son". (Currently the business is the Allendale Lumber and Millwork Co.) Lumber was brought by train from forests in New Jersey, Rockland and Orange Counties in N.Y., and Bucks County in Pennsylvania. The coal hopper building (no. 6G) is an uncommon feature among extant early 20th century industrial buildings in Bergen County. Most significant is that the building retains the coal-sorting machinery within its upper stories (coal is no longer sold here, only lumber). In spit of some alterations, the lumber yard and its buildings retain a turn-of-the -century flavor. Christopher's business remained in the family until it was sold within the last fifteen years. The Allendale Lumber and Millwork Co. is one of a few, if not the only, semi-industrial sites currently in Allendale. The lumberyard is a commercial link with the late 19th century Christopher mill. There is no other industry in Allendale.

Bldg. A: Commercial-residential; vernacular utilitarian; 2-1/2; stucco with brick details; West facade: 1st story - 5 bays, 2nd story - 4 bays, 6/1; gable; West facade: central entrance to upstairs interior has half-glazed door and semi-circular transom. Flanking store entrances have keystones in brick lintels. Store windows have similar ketstone and brick detailing and stone sills. Brick pilasters between 2nd-story windows. Pronounced gable cornice has dentils and frieze. Central round attic window has wood frame and keystones. Bldg. F: probably storage; utilitarian; 2; clapboard; varied; gable; Situated directly north of (behind) Bldg. E. Shorter in length and slightly higher than Bldg. E.

Bldg. G (Area 4): formerly a coal hopper, (R. Christopher's Allendale Coal and Lumber) now partly used for storage; utilitarian; multi-leveled; clapboard and vertical timbers; gabels; This is the most significant of the lumber yard buildings, since it continues to house an early 20th century coal hopper mechanism. One large north-facing wood chute is extant in deteriorated condition. It descends at an angle from below a projecting raised unit on the main roof ridge. Other chute openings are visible on the sides. Part of this structure is supported on heavy posts. The present owner of the Allendale Lumber and MillworkCo. is willing to allow a survey of this building, and the local chapter of the Society for Industrial Archeaelogy has been contacted by this office (5/83). Behind Bldg. G are two recent lumber storage sheds. A short railroad spur runs in front of Bldg. G. It runs east along Bldg. G's north side, towards Bldgs. D. and F. The spur is still used.

Richard J. Christopher, the son of John J. Christopher and his second wife, Jane Smith, was born in 1852 and died in 1917 (buried Wyckoff). He married, in May 1876 (Wyckoff) Anna Maria Green Ackerman, daughter of Jacob J. Ackerman and Elizabeth Young. She was born in 1857 and died in 1914 (buried Wyckoff). Richard J. Christopher was, according to his 1917 obituary in *The Ramsey Journal*, a cripple for the last 28 years of his life. He and his wife, Anna Maria Green Ackerman, had children:

Jacob Muried Christopher, b. February 15, 1879, d. Oct. 18, 1966 (m. Ada Mallinson)

James George Christopher, b. 1881, d. 1905 Richard J. Christopher, b. about 1884, d. March 1957 (m. Jennie Duvall)

Jacob Muried Christopher, son of Richard J. Christopher and Anna Maria Green Ackerman, was born Februaru 15, 1879 and died October 18, 1966 (buried George Washington Memorial Park, Paramus). In 1894 he was working as a saleman/clerk for the Smith & Henion General Store in Allendale. By 1898 he was a partner in the business, which was then called "Smith & Christopher." By 1905, the store was called "Winter & Christopher." This store was sold to Coats & Strunk about 1911, and J. M. Christopher began his Allendale Coal and Lumber business. During his lifetime he was active in church and civic circles, serving as a borough councilman, charter inactive member and charter treasurer of the Allendale Fire Association, a director of Citizen's First National Bank, and an active member of the Archer Memorial Church. He moved his family into their newly built home at 625 Franklin Turnpike by August 1927.



One-story single bay gabled addition at south side, appears recent.

Charles H. Weeks, the son of Addison B. Weeks and Rachel Ackerman, was born December 9, 1859 and died December 25, 1930 at the home of his brother-in-law, John Andrew Mallinson. At the time of the 1880 Federal Census, he was a clerk and was living (and probably working for) Richard V. Ackerman. Later his profession was as a painter. He married Agnes Westervelt, daughter of James Westervelt and Mary Ann Smith. Agnes Westervelt's mother, Mary Ann Smith, remarried about 1863 (after the death of her first husband), Joseph Mallinson, as his 2nd wife.





centuries.

Jesse Brown was born about 1835, died before Nov. 6, 1903, and was a carpenter. He and his wife, Mary J. (born about 1837, d. April 1901) are listed as living in about this location in the 1880 Federal Census. He served on the Allendale Borough Council for at least two years, 1897 and 1898. The house must have originally stood on a slightly different site, for newspapers of 1873 reported that "Jesse Brown is moving his house to a more elevated location" (Hackensack Republican, 11/27/1873) and "Mrs. Brown is moving her house on a more elevated position." (Bergen County Democrat, 12/19/1873). On Nov. 6, 1903, The Bergen County Democrat reported, "The estate of the late Jesse Brown was settled by the auction sale of property and household effects on Wednesday of last week. The house and grounds were sold for \$2,900 on account of taxes."

William Robinson and Gertrude Newlin Robinson brought their family to Allendale and this house from the Flatbush section of Brooklyn. They were living in the house by 1905, when their son, William Robinson was born here. His older sisters, Gertrude (m. Edmond Maurice Etesse) and Mary (m. William Buhlman) had been born in Brooklyn.





This house was probably built soon after May 15,1874, when *The Bergen County Democrat* announced "Mrs. D. Anthony has sold two lots to J. J. Pulis, near the depot." An addition was built to the house in April 1894.

The house underwent extensive renovation in the early to mid-1980's, including the unsympathetic replacement of sash and installation of aluminum siding.

John J. Pulis (Pullis?), probably the son of Jacob Pulis, was born about 1849, was a blacksmith and ran a blacksmith shop with Henry Mallinson on the Franklin Turnpike, opposite Archer Hall. He was a member of the Allendale Borough Council in 1897-1898 and was a trustee of the Archer Memorial Methodist Church. He and his wife, Ella (Ellen?) G., had children:

John A. Pulis, b. about 1873 Albert Z. Pulis, b. about 1875 (m. Maude A. H. --?--) Anna Bella Pulis, b. 1878, d. 1878 age 5 months.
