The Hackensack Republican on September 17, 1885 reported: "Chas. Merrill is pushing forward the building of his new house." On December 25, 1885 The Bergen Country Democrat reported (we assume tongue-in-cheek): "Mr. C. R. Merrill has built a fine residence which will soon be ready for occupancy. A few days ago a neighbor was anxious to examine the interior of the building. He had heard that there was no stairway in the house and wanted to find out how the inmates would get to the second story. After examining a spiral stairway he asked how it was worked. The builder told him by machinery and that it required a bucket of water a day to run it." This house was informally known to Allendale residents as "Merrill's Castle."

After Charles R. Merrill's death, his son, Frank S. Merrill evidently inherited the house and probably lived there, on and off, until sometime around 1940. He probably rented the house at various times, 668 W. Crescent Ave. Merrill House Block 1503, Lot 7 (Old Block 6, Lot 61A) perhaps especially in the summer. On July 28, 1927 *The Ramsey Journal* reported: "The Merrill homestead on West Crescent Avenue, recently occupied by the J. Haulenbeck family, will be remodeled this fall, into a model dwelling with all the latest improvements."

Later, in the 1940's, a nursing home, the Allendale Convalescent Home, was run in this building.

Diane Ivancich, new owner in August 1974, described the house as stucco over stone with two fireplaces (one in the kitchen), and said it once was a nursing home.


Charles R. Merrill and his wife, Elizabeth Millbank Wall, first lived in New York City, but began to summer in Allendale about 1864-65. In 1885, they built a home on West Crescent Avenue in Allendale. Charles R. Merrill was on the Allendale Board of Health in 1896 and 1897. He and his wife had children:



Frank S. Merrill, the son of Charles R. Merrill and Elizabeth Millbank Wall, was born August 15, 1864 in New York City. He summered with his parents in Allendale all during his childhood; it was said he had been brought to Allendale on a pillow, as a sickly infant, to live in the "good air" of the countryside. The good air agreed with him; he lived until the age of 91. He attended both Allendale schools and New York City schools and graduated from Swarthmore College. He worked for the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, but was granted leaves of absence to take charge of lead and silver mines in Monterey, Mexico (1904-06), to help build the shortway to Bristol, Pa., and to supervise the building of two bridges on the Green River, Washington, for the Northern Pacific Railroad (c. 1916-1917). He retired in about 1937-38. In 1917 he was living with his father, Charles R. Merrill.

This house is said to date to 1800 or earlier. The Girl Scout Old House List dates it as having been built in 1800. Leah Storms married William Shannon in 1834; they lived in this house. If the house was built 1800 or earlier, it was probably built by or for Abraham A. Quackenbush, who was probably the grandfather of Leah Storms and who left her property in this vicinity in his LW & T. Or it may have been built by or for Abraham A. Storms, who was probably Leah's father, and who died before 1840. William Shannon and his wife, Leah Storms, were almost certainly living in this house by 1840, when they were listed in the 1840 Federal Census.

Mrs. Pinckney in 1972 answered a Junior Woman's Club questionnaire on old houses: "The floors, walls, and ceilings, in fact the whole interior of my house has been rebuilt. My husband was a building contractor; there's very little of the old house that hasn't been changed. I think this is one of--if not <u>the</u>--oldest house in Allendale. Original Owner: Storms (Andrew). Previous Owner: Storms (Florie). Present Owner: Neva Pinckney. Date of Original Construction: ? Number of Original Rooms: 6. Additions: new bedroom and addition to kitchen. Original windows have been changed to modern. 3 outside entries. New garage. Beamed ceilings in dining room and living room. Original beams in living room."

The Bergen County Historic Sites Survey (1983) describes the house:

Shannon-Hopper House. Date Erected: c. 1800, altered early 20th century. Residence; vernacular; 2; replacement shingles; South facade: 6 bays, 2/2, 2nd story - 4 bays, 6/1; gable.

Besides its narrow side proportions and sandstone foundations, the Shannon-Hopper House retains little of its 19th century appearance and seems to have been extensively altered in the early 20th century: raised 2nd story, replacement shingles, some replacement windows, added south gabled entrance porch and shed roof porch. Perhaps the east wing is an altered 19th century kitchen wing.

Although it seems to have been extensively altered in the early 20th century, the Shannon-Hopper House at 723 West

Crescent Avenue has some architectural significance in Allendale's early 19th century agricultural settlement. Before the alterations, it appears to have been a modest 3 bay wide farmhouse with an attached east kitchen wing. The 1974 CKT map of Allendale shows Wm. Shannon as owner of the house in 1835.

(1861, Wm. Shannon; 1876, Isaac Hopper; 1902, R. C. Storms; 1913, shown.)

William Shannon, born about 1813, married on November 15, 1834 (New Prospect) Leah Storms. She was born about 1817 and died February 24, 1874 (buried Union Cemetery, Waldwick). She was likely the daughter of Abram A. Storms and Susanna Quackenbush; and probably the granddaughter of Abraham A. Quackenbush, who in his LW&T left her property in this vicinity in Allendale. William Shannon, according to the 1880 Federal Census, when he was listed alone (a widower), aged 67, was a shoemaker. He and his wife, Leah Storms, had children:

John Shannon, born about 1837 (married Matilda --?--)

Isaac Shannon, born about 1842 (married Georgianna --?--) Rachel Shannon, born about 1836

Ann Martha Shannon, born about 1844

The house may have come into possession of the Hopper family sometime after 1880. It is interesting to note that on February 25, 1835, Levi Hopper married, at New Prospect (Waldwick) Josie Maria Shaddon (almost certainly a corruption of "Shannon"). She was a contemporary of William Shannon, and may have been his sister. The Bergen County Historic Sites Survey cites the 1876 Walker's Atlas as showing "Isaac Hopper" as owner of this house.

Somehow the house (perhaps through inheritance) became part of the John A. Storms and Eliza Storms estate, and was conveyed by the heirs in 1907 to John A. Storms' son, Andrew J. Storms. Andrew J. Storms, son of John A. Storms and Mary Terhune, was born about 1859 and died January 27, 1922. He married Florence L. --?--. They had a daughter: --?-- Storms (m. Everett Sayre). Sometime after January 1922, probably in the 1930's, Florence L. Storms, widow, sold the house to Harry James Pinckney (who may have been a Storms relative). 723 W. 



Block 6, Lot 80 was also part of this property at one time (it was transferred 3 May 1947 from Mabel Scoville Critchley, widow, to Harold F. Critchley and Olive P. Critchley, h/w). On this property, west of the original house, was built "the cottage," (today's 792 W. Crescent Ave.). This smaller dwelling was probably built about 1917 for Everett Sayre (whose wife was the daughter of Andrew J. Storms) and was completely remodeled c. 1940. On 19 February 1962, Harold F. Critchley and Olive Perry Critchley, h/w, sold a portion of Block 6, Lot 80 to San Jacinto Heights, Inc.

An article in the June 19, 1986 issue of *The Town Journal* described the restoration work of the house's new owners: "[One of] Two local couples who have accepted this civic challenge [restoring an old house] are John and Mary Troast, who bought the county-cited, circa 1860 Storms-Critchley house at 794 W. Crescent Avenue in March 1985....In the case of the Troasts, their vernacular Greek Revival 794 W. Crescent Ave. Storms-Critchley House Block 1501, Lot 15

home seemed a logical first-house choice for a recently married couple whose careers included John's real estate development position and Mary's architect job with a firm specializing in renovation. "It felt just right," explained Mrs. Troast, echoeing the gut-reaction sense of many home buyers. "I just knew right away this was a house where good things had happened." Of course, the Troasts' backgrounds gave them more to base their opinion on than mere good vibrations." In the 5 months between purchase and move-in they were able to quickly tap capable workers to do the outdoor shingle restoration, porch support work and bedroom-tobath conversion while they concentrated on woodwork/wallpaper stripping, painting and other weekend "elbow grease" jobs. "The biggest work was outside, where the cedar shakes on the house were dry-rotted," Mrs. Troast explained. "We took the shakes off and the original clapboard siding was underneath. We had to replace it in some areas, but for the most part we restored the original." Mrs. Troast added that their guideline was to do "anything authentic and practical," while adding some "spaces for the '80s"--a second bath upstairs, for example. The Troasts were helped in their house research by pictures taken at various periods in the house's history and by long-term family ownership where information was passed more easily from one person to the next. The Critchleys owned the house--originally part of a 250-acre farm-from 1907 to '55..." [Photo caption: "The Troast house at 794 W. Crescent Avenue, above, was originally part of a 250-acre straberry farm, one of many in the area. The deed shows that one of the early owners raised 11 children in the four-bedroom home, deeding it to them upon his death."

The Bergen County Historic Sites Survey (1983) describes this house:

The north end cobblestone chimney was added, as was the north end open porch (circa/post 1925). Early 20th century well building with cobblestone base and flared hexagonal roof to southeast of house. Later alterations include exterior wood shingles, shed dormer in kitchen wing roof. The kitchen wing appears to have been rebuilt, as the frame rests on 20th

Although altered in the 20th century, the Storms-Critchley House at 794 West Crescent Avenue is architecturally significant in Allendale's agricultural settlement. The house retains an attractive early 19th century Greek Revival east entrance and some handsome interior 19th century features. The early 20th century alterations reflect the Colonial Revival and the Arts and Crafts styles.

The Storms family in this area is difficult to trace because the families by that surname in this vicinity are (1) very numerous, and (2) favor certain given names, resulting, for instance, in numerous Abrahams, Isaacs, Johns, etc. living in the same vicinity during the same time periods. At this writing, the early Storms family citations are, when not positive, given as "probable." More research into the Storms family and title searches of this vicinity will help to clarify both genealogies and land titles.

Abraham Storms, who died before 1840, probably married Susanna Quackenbush, possibly the daughter of Abraham A. Quackenbush, and they had <u>probable</u> children (and likely others, unknown at present):

Leah Storms, born about 1817 (m. William Shannon) (see No. 723 W. Crescent Ave.)

Eliza Storms (married February 19, 1831 at New Prospect, Martin C. Blauvelt) (they may have lived on Brookside Avenue, Allendale)

Sarah (Sally) Storms (married, March 3, 1835 at New Prospect, Isaac Courter) (they lived in a house near the southeast corner of today's Brookside Avenue-W. Crescent Avenue intersection; the house burned to the

ground in May 1871.) Isaac Storms Abraham Storms, born about 1810 (married September 26, 1829 at New Prospect, Rachel Ackerman)

Abraham Storms, born about 1810, the probable son of Abrham Storms and Susanna Quackenbush, married September 26, 1829 at New Prospect (Waldwick), Rachel Ackerman. They were living in this vicinity (probably in this house) at the time of the 1850 Federal Census for Franklin Township. They had children: Rachel Storms, born about 1830, and John Storms, born about 1835.

John A. Storms, possibly the son of Abraham Storms and Rachel Ackerson, was born about 1835 and died between 1898 (date of his LW&T) and January 1907. He married, (1) Eliza --?--; and (2) Mary Terhune. About 1867 he sold property on the southeast corner of the intersection of Brookside Avenue and West Crescent Avenue to Daniel Anthony. He was a farmer. He and his wife were living in this house by January 1864 when their son, Jacob John Storms, was born. John A. Storms (and his two wives) had children:

Abram (Abraham) Storms, born about 1855 (married 1877, Sarah C. Terwilleger) (they lived in Waldwick)

Rachel A. Storms, born about 1857

Andrew J. Storms, born about 1859, died January 27, 1922 (m. Florence L. --?-)

George Storms (m. Mary A. --?--)

Jacob John Storms, born January 23, 1864, died May 24, 1938 (married twice? (1?) Elizabeth --?--; married (2?) Carolyn Greer, daughter of --?-- Greer and Katherine Matthews)

John A. Storms (m. Rachel --?--) Archer Storms (m. Maud --?--) Anna Storms (m. George Terwilleger) Mary <u>Nellie</u> Storms (m. Ernest M. Ackert) Lydia Storms (m. William H. Holcomb)

Perry W. Critchley bought the house and surrounding property (about 12 acres) from the Storms estate about 1908.

Perry W. Critchley, the son of William George Critchley and Mary Stewart, was born about 1872 and died in 1929. He married Mabel Scoville, born about 1877 in Brooklyn. Perry W. Critchley was a member of the Allendale Borough Council, a charter inactive member of the Allendale Fire Association, a director of the First National Bank of Allendale, a member of the Allendale Library Association, and a member of the Allendale Holiday Observers. He and his wife, Mabel Scoville Critchley, had two sons: Harold F. Critchley, born about 1900 (married Olive Perry) and Perry Critchley, born about 1900.



Although a building date of 1890 has been suggested for this house, it seems likely that it was actually built about 1903 for Dr. G. H. Parkhurst. Parkhurst came to Allendale in 1900, living first in the house at 146 Park Avenue, which he leased from the Parigot family.

In March of 1903, *The Hackensack Republican* reported that "Dr. Parkhurst has had plans prepared and will soon commence the building of a new residence." This, most likely, was the house at 50 West Maple Avenue.

The Parkhursts called their home at 50 W. Maple Avenue "The Knoll."

Dr. G. H. Parkhurst was born about 1836 and died in January 1921 (buried at Sloatsburg, N.Y.). He married Mary Ward Sloat, daughter of Jacob Sloat and Sarah Biglow Hollenbeck. She was born December 8, 1833 and died November 4, 1900 (buried at Sloatsburg, N.Y.). They had two daughters: Mary Sloat Parkhurst (d. May 26, 1927 at Riverside, Cal.); and Martha J. Parkhurst (b. at Elmira, N.Y.), who was probably Allendale's first Councilwoman, serving from 1922 until 1925, and who ran for Mayor of Allendale in 1924 (but was defeated).

Dr. Parkhurst served as medical inspector for the Allendale Public School and was a member of the Allendale Board of Health.




