This house was built in 1897. An item from *The Bergen County Democrat* August 27, 1897 reported: "Preparations are under way for the erection of another fine house on the turnpike. Stephen Van Houten is the owner."

Stephen Terhune Van Houten (Sr.) was born in New York City April 29, 1866 (died June 1936), the son of Jacob Henry Van Houten and Hannah Matilda Terhune. He married Georgianna Schneider, born in New York City (died 1943), the daughter of John Schneider. The Van Houtens moved to Allendale at about the time this house was built. Mr. Van Houten was a department manager for Claflin's wholesale dry goods firm and served on the Allendale Board of Education. Mrs. Van Houten was active in the Ladies Village Improvement Association and later the Woman's Club of Allendale. She was one of the Ladies V.I.A. committee instrumental in starting the Allendale Library in 1900, and later signed the Library certificate of incorporation (in 1923).





There are <u>6</u> extant pre-1900 Quackenbush homesteads in Allendale. This house is thought to be the first extant Quackenbush homestead in Allendale, owned by Abraham A. Quackenbush, at about the time of the Revolution or shortly after. In the Quackenbush family in this area, the name "Abraham A." was a favorite. There were multiple Abraham A. Quackenbushes all living during the same period of time, and all either living in or owning property in what became the Allendale area. The problem is to distinquish, in early public records, one Abraham A. Quackenbush from another.

The first Abraham A. Quackenbush to live in what is now Allendale appears to be the Abraham A. Quackenbush who built the house at 700 Franklin Turnpike about 1780-1790. This house remained in the Quackenbush family until about 1886-87, when Alfred E. Ivers bought it. *The Hackensack Republican* of November 29, 1888 reported: "Mr. Ivers' house presents an imposing appearance. The old Quackenbush manor would hardly be recognized

in the present edifice."

Laura Barrett Haviland, grand-daughter of Alfred E. Ivers, wrote in 1977: "My grandparents moved to Bergen County from Brooklyn because their second daughter, Adeline, was in poor health and they had heard that the air in Bergen County was exceptionally healthful. They eventually settled in Allendale on Franklin Turnpike, a little south of the toll gate hill. My grandfather, Alfred Ivers, bought a house which was a hundred and fifty years old, and several acres of land. There was a huge meadow down a slope in back of the house. Some of the meadow, I believe, he sold to Mr. Appert for his celery farm. There is a little information concerning the Ivers house that may be of interest. It was originally a one and a half story house. They moved

(Old Block 53, Lot 100?) the back section across the driveway and made a small two story house of it which we called "the cottage." Then they built a new addition on the back which was the kitchen and a full second story of seven bedrooms and a large attic above, known as the "garret" in those days. Grandpa sold most of the land but lived in the same house until his death in 1919. His son Charles built a house next door on part of the property and sold the old house."

In 1979 Mrs. Haviland wrote: I believe that Alfred E. Ivers house could be one of the oldest [in Allendale]....The property was bought in the 1880's and the house on it was alleged to have been 100 to 150 years old at the time....Adeline G. Ivers, Alfred E.'s wife...when Allendale was Orvil...bought 100 acres from A. A. Lydecker. While still Orvil, Adeline sold to A. Legg [100] acres. Then when named Allendale she sold a lot to S. J. Van Blarcom, two lots to J. M. Southwick, same to Georgianna Van Houten, C. W. Van Horn, and to E. Van Horn and to Lucy Ewen."

The Bergen County Historic Sites Survey (1983) describes the house:

Date Erected: Late 18th century, with major alterations in the late 19th century, minor alterations in the early 20th century.

Residence; vernacular; 2-1/2; clapboard; South facade: 6 bays, 2/2, attic-central bay, 2/2; gable; South facade: paneled center door with 1 bay entrance porch: two piers support a semicircular hood, rising sun motif in wood over the door. Roundheaded attic windows in north and south cross-gablets. Interior end chimneys at east and west (appear to be replacement). Deep overhanging cornice. Alterations: This building was, until the late 19th century (circa 1880's), a 1-1/2-story Federal style house with 2 bay east kitchen wing. The wing had eyebrow windows. The late 19th century alterations have removed all exterior traces of the earlier style. A few interior features remain, including a circa 1790 mantel. A 1985 inspection by Claire K. Tholl revealed the alterations. Other alterations include a turn-of-the-century north entrance porch with Tuscan columns and rail, and a Colonial Revival style south entrance porch.

The A. Quackenbush-A. E. Ivers House at 700 Franklin Turnpike is an interesting architectural remnant of Allendale's late 18th century (Federal style) farmhouse. A low cobblestone wall (an Arts and Crafts style feature) was built along the west property edge in the early 20th century. A E. Ivers moved to the Allendale area circa 1887, and purchased this Quackenbush property circa 1889. It seems that Ivers had commercial and legal associations in Allendale. He was Justice of the Peace in 1892. Currently the house's south facade is obscured by excessive foliage.

Robert Cockroft and his wife moved from Brooklyn to this newly built home in 1896 after having rented homes for the summer for at least two years. On July 30, 1896 The Hackensack Republican reported: "Mr. Cockroft is building a large house on Allendale Heights, on land purchased from the Van Horn estate." The house was built by John Magee. His daughters and their husbands, Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Weyand and Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Carver, lived in the house as well. Both Robert Cockroft and Wallace Carver were avid gardeners, and their home became a well-known landscaping showplace. (Wallace Carver was the charter president of the Allendale Garden Club.) Probably after the death of Mrs. Carver in 1939, the house was sold and by 1947 it was being used as a nursing home, which is its present use (1986).

Robert E. Cockroft and his wife had two daughters: Fannie M. Cockroft (m. Wallace Carver) and E. Varian Cockroft (m. Charles L. Weyand).

Wallace E. Carver was born in 1863 in North Leeds, Maine. He worked for the law firm of Siebert and Shearer, 60 Wall Street, New York City. He was charter president of the Allendale Garden Club, member of the Allendale Board of Trade, secretary of the Allendale Board of Health, a member of the Music Committee of the Allendale Christmas Tree Association (1917) and a president of the Allendale Players. He had served as a lieutenant in the Navy during the Spanish-American War, and he was

703 Franklin Turnpike Cockroft House Block 910, Lot 9 (Old Block 40, Lot 8) affectionately called, by friends, "The Admiral." He died in October 1921. Fannie M. Cockroft Carver was an ardent worker for and supporter of the Allendale Library. She was one of the members of the Ladies Village Improvement Association who, in 1900, started the Allendale Library and she signed the certificate of incorporation in 1923. In April 1919 she was elected Librarian of the Allendale Library Association. She was, at the time of her death on October 9, 1939, a continuing member of the Board of Trustees of the Library Association. Wallace E. Carver and his wife, Fannie M. Cockroft Carver, had a daughter, Dorothy, born abt. 1893-94, married William Becker.

Charles L. Weyand married E. Varian Cockroft. He was a charter inactive member of the Allendale Fire Association. E. Varian Cockroft studied art in Paris and won awards for her paintings, two of which were displayed, c. 1915, at the Panama-Pacific Exposition. For a time, she ran a business in New York, selling hand painted clothing and silk scarves. She devised a new method of loose-block printing for silk manufacturers.



John J. ("Griddlegreaser") Van Horn was born about 1829 in Allendale and died February 1888. He married Maria E. --?--, b. abt. 1824, d. July 1894. He was a carpenter and machinist, and was well-known as a local eccentric "inventive genius." His nickname, "Griddlegreaser" was probably given him as a joke because he was, rather than fat (like a "griddlegreaser"), "more than six feet tall, exceedingly thin, and with long hair falling about his neck. 

There are <u>6</u> extant pre-1900 Quackenbush homesteads in Allendale. This house is thought to be the Corines A. Quackenbush homestead built about mid-19th century for the son of (probably) Abraham A. Quackenbush. In the Quackenbush family in this area, the name "Abraham A." was a favorite. There were multiple Abraham A. Quackenbushes all living during the same period of time, and all either living in or owning property in what became the Allendale area. The problem is to distinguish, in early public records, one Abraham A. Quackenbush from another.

Corines (Crynus, Corinus) A. Quackenbush was born abt. 1820 (1829?), probably the son of Abraham A. Quackenbush, and died September 1900. He married Eliza Hosey, daughter of Francis Hosey and Elizabeth, his wife. Corines A. Quackenbush was a farmer. He was a Trustee of the (Allendale-Waldwick) District 55 School Board in 1889. This house was probably built for him at about the time of his marriage (c. 1855-56).



This house may have been rebuilt in 1919 using the walls and chimney of the Elwood H. Moore house, which burned December 30, 1917. Moore had purchased the property by July 1908 and had a house built about that same year. In 1915 (and perhaps other years) during the summer the house was run as "The Little Knickerbocker Chocolate House," operated by Mabel McLaughlin of Bethlehem, Pa., and Edith Christenson, of Arlington. The Ramsey Journal of January 3, 1918 reported: "On Saturday night the cottage on Franklin Turnpike, owned by E. H. More was destroyed by fire. The fire was discovered after midnight and the alarm given. When the firemen arrived the flames had made such headway that it was impossible to save anything except a portion of the furniture. It is said some of the furniture was of considerable value, being hand-carved. The house was well known in this section as the "Chocolate House." On August 28, 1919 The Ramsey Journal reported: "The Moore property on the Turnpike running through to West Crescent Avenue, with a turnpike frontage of 300 feet, was sold last week for \$3,000 to Brooklyn parties who will start at once rebuilding the residence which was destroyed two years ago by fire. The walls and chimney being substantial, will be repaired and form part of the new structure."

Additional research is needed to determine and verify the Moore ownership of this property.

The "J. Straut" indicated on the 1861 Hopkins-Corey Map as living in this house may have been the "John Straut" listed in the 1850 Federal Census for Hohokus Township. In that Census, John Straut is listed as 60 years old, his wife, Maria, as 54, and their children: John Straut, 24; Peter Straut, 22; Betsy Ann, 18; Richard, 15; Sarah, 13. The household listed just before this one was headed by Conrad Straut, 33, another son of John Straut.

By March 1868 Peter D. Rapelje and his family were living here (he is cited ("Peter Rappleger") as a north boundary in the deed conveying property from William Van Horn to Charles H. O'Neill). Peter D. Rapelje and his family are listed in the 1870 Federal Census for Hohokus Township.

Peter D. Rapelje was born about 1828 and married Mary E. --?--. He was a farmer and was Allendale's first Mayor, serving in that ofice for more than three years, being elected in December 1894 and serving until 1897. He also served on Allendale's Board of Health, in 1897 and 1900.

Peter D. Rapelje and his wife, Mary E., had two children (possibly twins?): Charles E. (M. Charles?) Rapelje, b. abt. 1863; and Maria E. Rapelje, b. abt. 1863.

About 1892, Peter D. Rapelje had the house at 64 West Allendale Avenue built, and the family moved from this Franklin Turnpike house to their new home. Peter D. Rapelje retained ownership of his former home at 829 Franklin Turnpike, renting it to various tenants over the following two or three decades (in March 1916 *The Ramsey Journal* reported "The Rapelje farm on the Turnpike has been rented by Charles Ackerson, Jr.").







The Turner family was probably living here before 1924, when in June, a son, Robert Turner graduated from the Allendale School. When Mrs. Rowland C. Turner (nee Emma Heller) opened her "Hill Top Tea Room" in Nov.-Dec. 1927, The Ramsey Journal reported "Mrs. R. C. Turner's "Tea Room on the Hill Top" is now open for business. Mrs. Turner is well known as amost excellent caterer."

An advertisement from the same newspaper, in February 1927: "Turner's Tea Room, Franklin Turnpike, Allendale. Try our delicious waffles with pure Vermont syrup." A later ad (1929) stated: "The Hill Top Tea Room, Franklin Turnpike, Allendale. Our Specialty Grilled Chicken and Steaks. Tel. 3046 Allendale." 



Louise Burnett's Old House List (c. 1970, Johnson Public Library, Hackensack [Bergen County Historical Society Collection?]) confuses this house with the ones at 829 and 977 Franklin Turnpike. She describes what is actually this house at 913 Franklin Turnpike: "House is on west side of Franklin Turnpike just north of Crescent Ave. It is marked J. H. Van Houten on an 1861 map. [House marked "J. H. Van Houten" on 1861 map is probably actually the house at 977 Franklin Turnpike.] It is a white frame [sic] with black trim house, beautifully restored, pre-Civil War Colonial. The floor plan comprises a center hall, living room 15 x 29 with a log burning fireplace, panelled family room with sliding glass doors looking out on the property. Has a modern swimming pool, powder room, kitchen and dining room on the 1st floor. Has 4 bedrooms and bath upstairs. [Newspaper article & picture of house for sale."

The Bergen County Historic Sites Survey (1983) describes this house:

Date Erected: North block: c. 1850; South wing: c. 1870. Residence; vernacular; 2-1/2 north block: gravel wall construction, south wing: replacement aluminum siding; East facade: 1st and 2nd stories - 5 bays, 2/2; gables; North block: main entrance has panelled door (replacement?) with transom and sidelights. Stone (?) sills under windows. Frieze under eaves. Paired interior end chimneys replacement at north; Alterations: replacement aluminum siding on south wing and on north gable of north block.

Although unfortunately altered by replacement aluminum siding, the Wilson House at 913 Franklin Turnpike retains architectural significance in Allendale and in Bergen County, and it is a remnant of mid-19th century agricultural settlement along Franklin Turnpike. The north block's gravel

913 Franklin Turnpike **Wilson House** Block 407, Lot 11 (Old Block 47, Lot 20A) wall construction (c. 1850) is contemporary with the same building material promoted by Orson Fowler in his 1848 publication, "A Home for All; or, The Gravel Walland Octagon Mode of Building." In Bergen County, similar gravel wall construction has been found only in the County's two extant octagon houses in Garfield and in Montvale. Currently, it is not known why this modest farmhouse was built with gravel walls, although the influence of Fowler's book upon local farm journals should be considered. Extant gravel wall buildings are rarities in Bergen County, and their existence and construction bear comparison with another rare building construction in Bergen County -- the "mud houses" in Paramus and in Washington Township. Both these houses are of modest design, nearly contemporary with the Wilson farmhouse in Allendale. Further research and inspection are needed to determine possible relationships and to understand the gravel wall and mud wall construction in mid-19th century Bergen County. William Wilson was the first owner (perhaps builder?) of this Allendale farmhouse. Born around 1830 in Ireland, he came to this country and lived in Paterson before moving to Allendale around 1850. He is listed in the 1850 census as "shoemaker" and in the 1870 census as "farmer." Evidence of early 20th century occupation: the Arts and Crafts low cobblestone property wall, and the picturesque cobblestone wall in the southeast yard.

William Wilson was born about 1798 in Ireland and married Ellen --?-- (she was born in Ireland about 1801). They were living in this house by the time of the 1850 Federal Census for Ho-Ho-Kus Township, in which he is listed as a "shoemaker." (In the 1870 census he is listed as a farmer.) William Wilson and his wife, Ellen, had children:
