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Allendale in the Good Old Days Some Memories... by Anne Cullen Webb, Englewood, FL, December 1993

I remember Temperlyn's Pharmacy, "Doc" Temperlyn, and George Price, who made the best black and white ice cream soda I ever had. I remember the Great Eastern store, Kaplan's Department Store, and my sister Jean's "Gay Shop" gift shop (Elting Oakley bought her shop, and I worked for him part time for 18 years).

My mother, Mae Cullen, was the first woman in Allendale with a real estate license. I remember Crestwood Lake in the summertime when people came from all over by train and walked along West Allendale Avenue past the Cullen house on their way to Crestwood.

I remember the fireworks at the ball park and the wonderful parties for kids put on by the Holiday Observers. Who could forget the great fireman's parades and carnivals.

I remember Job's Crescent Terrace Inn and Mary and Cyril Job. Our daughter, Patti Webb had her reception there when she married Walter Wardell. My sister Jean had her reception there when she married George Stein. Our son, John Webb, Jr. married Mary Ann Bowler in the Old Paramus Church in Ridgewood.

My mother and dad, Mae and Frank Cullen, and Mom and Dad Webb Ida and Jim Webb always had Christmas dinner with us, as Christmas day was also Dad Webb's birthday.

I remember Dr. Kanning, who took care of all of us and our families — there will never be another doctor like him! Dr. Lampa, our dentist, had his office in the basement of his home.

Whenever you would stop at Megnin's Central Garage for gas, Barney Megnin always had a joke to tell you.

The Winter Brothers — Herb and Willy — sold the best rat cheese you ever tasted. I also remember Willard Alling, who was principal of the Allendale grade school and loved to tease the children.

We used to go by bus to shop in Paterson when Meyer Brothers and Quackenbush's were the only big stores nearby.

I remember "Mom" Connelly — she was called "Mom" by everyone. Whenever there was a big fire in the middle of the night, Mom was there with coffee and sandwiches for the firemen.

Dad Webb, who was a builder and contractor,

built our home on Crescent Place for us. He also built most of the homes on the north side of Crescent Place as well as some on Heights Road. He worked on building the old firehouse and did renovations on the Taylor home, which is now the Pfister home.

l remember walking up the trolley tracks to Ramsey, and stopping at Turtle Pond, right next to the tracks.

We had so many wonderful friends and family. Allendale was a great place to grow up in!

A Note from Dr. Genevieve MacKeeby Capstaff Orland Park, IL, December 1993.

I've been wondering why you have never listed the Storms house at Park Avenue and West Crescent Avenue?*

It was built by my aunt and uncle, Andrew and Florence Storms, long before 1940. Aunt Florie sold it to Harry and Neva Pinckney. I don't know whom Neva sold it to.

Aunt Florie told the story of baking an apple pie and placing it on the kitchen window sill to cool. She heard a noise in the kitchen and went out to find a deer munching on her pie.

She used to send my cousin, Doris Sayre and myself out with buckets to pick dandelions so Uncle Andrew could make dandelion wine.

In the winter, the families used to gather at the top of the hill and the men would build a huge bonfire to keep us warm as we sleighed down the hill. We used to hitch rides with our sleighs on the back of Ackerman's truck!

The last time I hitched a ride was when Helen and Bill Hanson moved to their new home. The last load filled the car to overflowing and they put me and a box of books on a sled and towed me along.

One last thing. Longrack has been transplanted to Illinois. I have a piece of property I'm subdividing and I have to name it. There is a brook running through the property. So I named the subdivision Longrack.

Who got me going on Allendale? All those wonderful memories!

Mrs. Borger's Dry Goods Store


Henry C. Borger and his wife, the former E. Lillian Wheeler, moved to Allendale about 1898, with their three children, L. Gertrude Borger (who later marriedAlfred E. Atkinson), Ethel Borger, and John Borger.

Henry Borger was in real estate and insurance. He was a charter member of the Allendale Fire Association in 1910 and he was a director of the Orvil Co-operative Building and Loan Association in 1906.

Mrs. Borger opened a dry goods store on West Allendale Avenue, which she was running by August 1903. The business was operated in a building that was later moved to High Street in 1931 to make way for the new storefront buildings which were to house the Allendale Post Office and Winter Brothers Store (today the Allendale Hair Studio and the Christian Book Store).

Mrs. Borger discontinued the business between 1914 and 1916, and about May 1916 Mrs. Orvil O. Clark opened a new dry goods store in the same location. Mr. Clark was Mayor of Allendale in 1919 and 1920. About 1920, Mrs. Clark sold her busness to Mrs. Symonds.

The Borger Store billhead reproduced here was found by Brian Mulder of the Ken Mowerson Roofing Co., while putting a new roof on the Allendale Bar & Grill building a few years ago. The AB&G building had been the Jacob P. Beaver home (and later the Ferris Beaver home) in the early 1900s.

Compiler's Note: This "inventory" of pre-1940 Allendale houses has been compiled using information in the Society's files and in my own files. Very few of the houses have been systematically researched, so we know that for most of them, the information is incomplete. We would welcome any additions, corrections, updating, etc. from our readers, and will happily add such information to the Society's files.

Only houses still in existence today are included in this inventory. Houses are generally named for the earliest known owner/occupant. Names associated with a house are not necessarily always owners; some may have been tenants. Also, not all owners actually lived in houses they owned; some houses were leased for rental income. The houses are listed alphabetically by street names, then numerically by house number.

Ackerman-Rozmus House

Block 2004, Lot 20 (Old Block 22, Lot 48)

(See December 1991 issue of Allendale History and Heritage for photographs of restoration work being done on this house.)

The original section of the house (now restored by Min Metals) dates from the Revolutionary era.

John Goodbartlett may have lived in the house by 1780. ("Goodbart" in this vicinity on Erskine Map 1778-1780.)

"A. C. A." on Hopkins-Corey Map in 1861.

Aaron C. Ackerman prior to 1861. Possibly "Jno. Cummings" shown on Walker's 1876 Atlas of Bergen County.

J. Alfred Ackerman, unknown date-1892. Gustave Nadler, 1892-1927; C. F. MacHaffey, 1927-unknown date. W. Lehman (by 1947). Rozmus Nurseries (by 1947). J. Rozmus (by 1963); W. Kowal (by 1965); Wanda Kahn (by 1965); Robert Rozmus (by 1985).

In 1983 the original house was so covered with a gunite-type stucco and surrounding additions that it was impossible to tell from the outside that it was an old stone house. There were many late Victorian additions and alterations. The house was a residence with a recently-run nursery business on its property. The tract on which it stood was being subdivided and the house was threatened.

Today, the house has been restored, with its stonework repointed. Its stonework is similar in type to The Old Stone House museum in Ramsey.

The Ackerman family owned land in this vicinity from a very early time, but it seems possible that John Goodbartlett and his family were living in the house during the Revolution. A New York City family, the Goodbartletts may have fled the British occupation of the city for the neutral ground of Bergen County.

John Goodbartlett is listed as a householder in the 1780 Franklin Township Rateables. What is today Allendale was a part of Franklin Township at that time. The fact that he is listed as a "householder" may indicate that he did not own, but leased, the property. In 1781 "John Good Berlet" was chosen a roadmaster for Franklin Township.

This is probably the same "John Goodperlet" who had children baptised from 1755-1765 in New York City (recorded in the Lutheran Church of New York City). The Goodbartlett family may have been related to the Forshay family, because Godparents at several of the baptisms were Daniel and Catherine Voshee. John Goodbartlett and his wife were Godparents during the same time period at the baptisms of children born to Daniel and Maria Catherine Voshee and Michael Scheekel and his wife, Maria.

Aaron Cuyper Ackerman was born about 1790 and died 23 May 1871 (buried Union Cemetery, Waldwick). He married Hester Sharp, daughter of Morris Sharp and Elizabeth (Stagg?). She was born in 1790, and baptised 12 Dec 1790 at the Paramus Reformed Church. She died 15 April 1861 and was buried in the Union Cemetery, Waldwick.

Aaron Cuyper and Hester Sharp Ackerman had children: Morris Sharp Ackerman, b. 1811, d. 1841; Aaron Ackerman, b. 1814, d. 1889 (m. Margaret Hopper); Tiny Ackerman, d. 1841 (m. Benjamin — or Isaac — Geroe); John A. Ackerman, b. 1825, d. 1902 (m. Margaret Hopper); James Alfred Ackerman (known as Alfred Ackerman), b. 10 Sep 1827, d. 1907 (m. Rosa Estelle Hopper).

Aaron Cuyper Ackerman was living here by 1811, when he signed a petition for the vacation of a road called "The Shunpike" (Bergen County Road Return, Book D, p. 239). In June 1861, while "plowing on the farm of Mr. Aaron Ackerman, Sr." the plow struck metal. A search was instituted, and several pieces of Revolutionary-era pewter were dug up. They found a very large bowl, 2 platters, and 8 smaller plates, "all made of pewter, and all carefully arranged in the earth upside down. ... It is supposed they were hidden there during the Revolutionary War, probably to save them from being converted into bullets. Mr. Ackerman recollects being told by Mr. Folly many years ago that such things had been buried on his farm by somebody, he has forgotten who, who entered into service as a soldier, and never returned ... " (Paterson Daily Guardian, 10 June 1861).

Aaron Cuyper Ackerman died in 1871 and his son, James Alfred Ackerman, came into possession of the house and surrounding property.

James Alfred Ackerman was born 10 September 1827, son of Aaron Cuyper Ackerman and Hester Sharp. He died 29 January 1907. He married Rosa Estelle Hopper, daughter of Abraham Hopper and

Sarah Van Blarcom. They had children: John Ackerman, b. 1859; and Hester Sharp Ackerman, b. 10 Nov 1863 (m. Charles E. Palmer).

James Alfred Ackerman taught in the Allendale School for many years. He was listed in the 1850 Federal Census, at the age of 22, as a schoolteacher.

Through the years, James Alfred Ackerman sold off parts of the Franklin Turnpike property. He seems to have developed parts of the tract, building houses and selling them. Some transactions, reported in newspapers of the time, include:

Oct 1871, J. A. Ackerman to John Colman.

May-June 1875, James Alfred Ackerman, 23 acres of the old homestead of the late Aaron Ackerman, to Eliza M. Longchamp.

June 1876, James Alfred Ackerman, part of his farm and a dwelling, to W. P. Shearman, Treasurer of the Erie Railroad

Oct-Nov 1892, J. Alfred Ackerman sold his house to Mr. Nadler, of Paterson.

Gustave Nadler was born in Germany in 1864 and died 26 May 1939. He came to America as a young man and at the age of 21 opened an ice cream and confectionery business on Main Street in Paterson, from which business he retired in 1927.

He and his wife, Marie, were married in Paterson on 13 April 1884 and moved with their family to Allendale in 1892, settling in this house on Franklin Tumpike.

Nadler was active in civic affairs in Allendale and served as Mayor of Allendale from 1914 to 1918. The Nadlers had four children: a son who died in 1897 of injuries sustained after being accidentally hit by a baseball bat; Gustave Nadler, Jr., killed in action during World War I; Florence Nadler, m. (1) Abbott Sherwood, and m. (2) William Meader; and Marie Nadler, m. Arthur Arnold.

Wanda Barbara Rozmus, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Rozmus, married, about 1948, Lester Arthur Kahn.


Schoenheiter House

Block 2003, Lot 6 (Old Block 21, Lot 16)

Built about 1915. H. K. Schoenheiter and Clara Schoenheiter owned the house by 1933 until 1947. Joseph A. Delaney and Elizabeth C. Delaney, 1947-1967. Grover C. Gedney and Elizabeth M. Gedney, 1967-unknown date. Peter H. Sandfort, Jr. (by 1974). William and Marilyn Storff (by 1985).

The Schoenheiters called this property "Pine Lodge."

In 1940 this house was described as a 2-1/2 story frame dwelling standing on 1.51 acres. It had a 14'6" x 18'6" garage, and outside fireplace, and a toolhouse. It had a stucco exterior with a tile roof, and stood on a poured concrete foundation. There were 7 rooms, including 4 bedrooms. There was a wood & plaster lavatory and one half-tiled bathroom. The basement was finished with a recreation room.

99 Franklin Tumpike Sullivan House

Block 2003, Lot 7 (Old Block 21, Lot 10)

Built probably about 1910-1911. Arthur Bull Sullivan, 1911. "A. B. Sullivan Sable Feather Farm" on 1913 Bromley Atlas of Bergen County. Oakley Hall School for Girls, 1927-at least 1933. George H. Simpson and Marie T. Simpson, 1943-1957. Francis J. Feeley and Agnes R. ("Scotti") Feeley, 1957-1967. Einar A. Juhlin and Britta Juhlin, 1969-unknown date.

Arthur Bull Sullivan came to Allendale to live in 1911. He called this estate "Sable Feather Farm" because on it he bred and raised Black Orpington chickens, of which he was a well-known importerexporter.

Arthur Bull Sullivan was born 25 February 1873 in New York City, the son of Arthur Thomas Sullivan (or John T. Sullivan) and Isabel Place. He married 20 November 1907 in New York City, Lilly Mott, daughter of Charles Mott (a Pennsylvania State Judge) and Marie Jeannette Schimmel. They had two children: Isabel Place Sullivan (m. -?- Fox) and Arthur Thomas Sullivan.

Arthur Bull Sullivan was a reporter for the New York Sun for two years and then joined his father's firm, Sullivan & Vail Co., of New York City, wholesale dealers in woolen goods. He later worked for A. D. Julliant & Co., also in the wholesale woolen business.

In Allendale, he was an active supporter of the Allendale Fire Department and served as its president from 1917-1919. For Allendale's 21st Birthday Celebration in 1915, he donated swings for the Allendale Recreation Park as a permanent improvemnt.

In May of 1927, Ethel Veronica Bender opened her "Oakley Hall" private school for girls, running a summer camp when the school was not in session.
