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SOCIETY NEWS

As of this writing, our soon-to-be published book, "Allendale: Background of a Borough," is at the printers. The book, published in commemoration of the borough's centennial and the Society's 20th anniversary, has 437 pages and includes over 270 photographs, as well as 35 pages devoted to both subject and personal name indexes. The book's hard cover will be in durable black leatherette with gold stamping. We expect it will be a publication of which the Society and the borough can be proud. Every Society member will soon receive an announcement mailing (with an order form) — you may have received it before this newsletter. In addition, these announcement/order forms will be sent to every home in Allendale, libraries and historical societies throughout the county, and other names which have been supplied to us. The book will be shipped on November 10, 1994 (Allendale's actual 100th anniversary of incorporation),

The size of the book has made its selling price higher than we would have liked, but because the Society has committed its entire savings of \$2,500 toward the book's publication costs, we have been able to bring the selling price down somewhat. In addition, donations from Society members toward the publication have amounted to over \$2,000. The total publication cost for a limited edition of 400 copies will be between \$18,000. and \$19,000. Printing and postage costs for mailing of brochures and order forms advertising the book's availability will add another \$600-\$700. Shipping each book will actually cost between \$4 and \$5, which covers the cost of the packaging box, labels, and actual postage or UPS shipping (we will use whichever is

less expensive). Fortunately the commitment of Society savings and the donations from Society members have subsidized the publication so that we can charge a pre-publication price of \$40 plus \$4 shipping per book. This price will be in effect until October 31, 1994. After that date, the book will be \$50 plus \$4 shipping. This selling price is competitive with other similar books (Upper Saddle River Historical Society's 172-page "Lore of Upper Saddle River" sells for \$35 plus \$2 shipping (they had a prepublication price of \$30). The prepublication discount is offered to recoup money as quickly as possible in order to pay the publisher.

In addition to the Society members and friends who made donations of money toward its publication, other contributions to the book's production should be mentioned. Pat Wardell, in addition to her volunteer efforts in researching and writing the book, also designed the pages and set the type on computer, which allowed the printer to print from computer disk — a big money saver. Many of the photographs reproduced in the book were made from slides in the Society's collection. The cost of producing the glossy prints for publication — a several-hundred dollar contribution, was underwritten by OakTree Graphics (Walter Wardell). Labels for an in-town mailing to every household were provided to us by the Allendale Water Department (this saved us countless hours of hand-addressing).

Society member Don Landzettel and his committee who were selling Allendale commemorative Christmas ornaments (see page 2) at the townwide Centenrial weekend celebration on September 24 and 25 and also at the Octoberfest celebration the following weekend, October 1 and 2, also sold for us

the Allendale Historical Map drawn by Claire Tholl that we published several years ago. As of this writing, map sales have amounted to \$175. We thank Don and his committee!

The Allendale "100" Committee distributed its souvenir booklet to every household in Allendale during the week of September 18th. The committee has done a wonderful job and the booklet will be a keepsake for years to come.

We had intended to publish in this newsletter photos sent to us by Ethel Braun Maratene. They are, however, also being used in the book, and have not been returned from the printer in time to use them here. We will print them in the next issue of the newsletter.

In this issue we are printing the first of several school photos sent to us by our member (and former Allendale resident) Col. Allen L. Bogardus, who now lives in Buena Vista, GA. We can name very few of the students in these photos, so would welcome any identifications from our members. We thank both Mrs. Maratene and Col. Bogardus for the photographs they sent.



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Allendale Class of 1929

The above picture shows the Allendale Public School graduating class of 1929 with their teacher (and principal) Willard Alling (standing, at right). They are posed on the steps of the front entrance to the school built on Franklin Turnpike shortly after the borough's incorporation. The remodelled school building is today's police headquarters. The photograph was probably taken in the fall of 1928. Col. Allen L. Bogardus (who is one of the students in this photo), now of Buena Vista, GA sent us this picture.

Only two of the students have been identified, both in the front row: third from left, Anna Elizabeth Cooper, and on the far right, Howard Edward Webb.

The class of 1929 graduated on June 20, 1929 at the Borough Hall. According to the commencement program, graduates (most of whom are probably in this picture) were: Arthur Henry Albert, Harvey Rorbach Allen, Allen Louis Bogardus, Anna Elizabeth Cooper, Ethel Ruth Forshay, Frank Walter Golembeski, Marianne Grace Haulenbeek, William B. Hill, Ruth Elizabeth Hummer, Ruth Edith Kalb, Mary Alice Keen, George Albert Klaschka, Jeanette McLeod, Kenneth Donald Moore, Frank Theodore Novakowski, Robert Sabens Phair, William H. ALLENDALE HOUSES BUILT BEFORE 1940

Compiler's Note: This "inventory" of pre-1940 Allendale houses has been compiled using information in the Society's files and in my own files. Very few of the houses have been systematically researched, so we know that for most of them, the information is incomplete. We would welcome any additions, corrections, updating, etc. from our readers, and will happily add such information to the Society's files.

Only houses still in existence today are included in this inventory. Houses are generally named for the earliest known owner/occupant. Names associated with a house are not necessarily always owners; some may have been tenants. Also, not all owners actually lived in houses they owned; some houses were leased for rental income. The houses are listed alphabetically by street names, then numerically by house number.

232 Franklin Turnpike

Folly(?)-Ackerman-Badeau House


Block 2009, Lot 1 (Old Block 27, Lot 11; formerly Lot 306-308?)

Built before 1861. The earliest part of the house is thought to date to about 1810.

Possibly William Folly pre-1811. Aaron Ackerman,

mid-1800s. "A. Ackerman" on 1861 Hopkins-Corey Map. "A. Ackerman" on 1876 Walker's Atlas Map. "Dr. C. Badeau" on 1887 Driving Chart. "Dr. C. W. Badeau" on 1902 Robinson Map. "R. The 1983 Bergen County Historic Sites Survey for

Allendale described the house as dating from about 1811, with its present appearance as altered mid-19th century. The house was, the Survey continued, a vernacular/Italianate/early 20th century, 2-1/2 story with replacement aluminum siding, and a 2-story addition attached to the south wall.

The Survey went on: "Although it has been extensively altered in the early and recent 20th century, the Folly-Ackerman House at 232 Franklin Tumpike contains part or all of the earliest house included in this district, thus the house is significant in Allendale's early architectural history. William Folly was a farmer who owned property along Franklin Turnpike in the early 19th century. The Franklin Turnpike was chartered in 1806, thus this was an early house built along the newly-established road. By 1861, the Folly House was owned by A. Ackerman. Between the 1860s and the 1890s, the house was enlarged almost to its present size, in a vernaular/Italianate style. In 1879, Dr. Charles W. Badeau bought the house, and lived there until 1902. He was commissioner of the Allendale Board of Health after the borough was incorporated in 1894. The 2-story south wing was added and many of the window sashes were altered in the early 20th century."

A "William Folly" is listed in approximately this location in the 1779 and 1791 Franklin Township Rateables, with 100 acres of land.

A "William Valley" [Folley; Folly] with the date

"May 1787, 106 A [acres]" is shown in this area (Lot #203) on Claire K. Tholl's map of "The Rampopock Tract," drawn in 1963 for the Bergen County Historical Society, and based on the Alexander-Morris Survey of 1767-68, Jonathan Hampton's-Morgan's Survey of 1783, and notes courtesy of D. Stanton Hammond.

One "William Folly" and his wife, Antje, had children baptised at Paramus in 1792 and 1803. Another "William Folly" (possibly the son of the previous William?) and his wife Marrity (Margery) had children baptised at New Prospect (Waldwick) M.E. Church from 1818 to 1833 and later.

Bergen County Road Return D-249, dated 1811, concerns Hopper Avenue (now known as Chestnut Street in Allendale) and describes it as: "...running...to the Franklin Tumpike Road, near the dwelling house of William Folley." The January 1811 Road Return (D-239) petitioning for vacation of "The Shunpike" describes the road to be vacated: "The road desired vacated runs over the lands of the following persons... William Folly..." and William Folly was also one of the signers of the petition.

Martha Ann Zabriskie wrote in her diary under the date of January 16, 1832: "Died old William Folly from Turnpike." His will and codicil were filed 1832 and is no. 4362B (Bergen County). An Inventory of his estate was also filed in 1832.

According to an entry in the Martha Ann Zabriskie diary, William Folly, b. about 1816 married on Sept. 1, 1838, Margaret Mowerson, "both near Saddle River."

Aaron Ackerman probably lived in this house after William Folly.

Dr. Charles W. Badeau and his wife Louise (or Louisa) E. Badeau, came to Allendale about 1876, first buying property at 46 Maple Street, which is shown as Lot #31, labelled "Dr. Bedeau" on the "Map of the Property of John L. Yeomans" surveyed March 1886 and filed May 5, 1886. According to items in *The Hackensack Republican*, by April-May 1879, he had bought this house at 232 Franklin Turnpike from Aaron Ackerman.

Charles W. Badeau was born about 1844. He was the brother of General Adam Badeau, who served in the Civil War and was the "well-known author of General Grant's memoirs." Dr. Charles W. Badeau was a physician, a Trustee of the Orvil Co-operative Building and Loan Association, and an amateur photographer. In 1901 he retired and moved to Passaic, where he spent his summers, and Dunedin, Florida, where he spent his winters. He died on January 3, 1918 at Dunedin.

By 1909, Dr. Robert W. Rodman was living in this house with his first wife and their two sons, Thomas Rodman and Robert Rodman. Dr. Rodman was a charter member of the board of trustees of the Allendale Fire Association in 1910, and the charter Commander of Allendale's American Legion Post 204. He enlisted in World War I in the Medical Corps and

suffered shattered health and shell shock as a result of his wartime experiences. He returned to Allendale after the war, briefly resuming his medical practice. He remarried, and with his second wife had another son, Samuel Rodman. He died at the age of 49 on August 9, 1928 at his summer home in Saddle River.


