

# O'Connor Reports Carnival <sup>E-44</sup> Huge Financial Success

Exceeds Last Year's Event by \$200 in Gross Receipts---Buy Bonds to Insure New Ambulance

Enjoying perfect weather from Monday until Saturday evening of last week, with the crowds being some of the largest ever, the Allendale Ambulance Corps announced that although final figures won't be available for several days, the fifth annual carnival which was held at Recreation Park had exceeded last year's event by \$200 in gross receipts.

The return of unsold items and other details Captain Paul D. O'Connor said, will delay the final net figure, but he estimated that the net profit will exceed the amount of profit made in 1941.

Looking towards the future, as well as doing their patriotic duty, the Ambulance Corps will take several hundred dollars and turn them into War Saving Bonds as a sinking fund toward the purchase of a new ambulance when it is needed in the future.

Late last Saturday night trucks, carrying carnival equipment left Allendale and many a youngster was around to see them off, and heart-broken about having to wait another year for the merry-go-round, swings and other rides to come back to town. Adults, too, had enjoyable evenings at the Park patronizing the numerous concessions.

One of the features was a combined booth where War Bonds and Stamps were sold and USO headquarters located. It is reported that \$75 in War Saving Stamps were sold during the week. Captain O'Connor reported that business was steady throughout the week.

Award of one war bond was made, with the bond going to Miss Janet Taylor of Wood-Ridge. Miss Taylor was a guest at the home of her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen T. Van Houten.

Another feature of the Carnival was a special box erected so as that patrons could donate money to be used to see selectees off from Local Draft Board Number 1, located in Allendale.

Co-Chairmen of the affair were Kenneth Booth and Nelson White, while they were assisted by a committee composed of J. George Christopher, Paul D. O'Connor, Charles Bijou, Walter Rumsey and Thomas Brady.

The Ramsey chairman added that with the amounts bought by residents of the Borough at their places of business, he had no doubt that the committee will bring in returns topping that \$28,000 monthly figure.

A neighbor from Allendale, William C. Lee, who has done such an excellent job in his own borough, will be on hand at the meeting tonight for the purpose of assisting the Ramsey committee in organizing for its campaign.
