Bank Applies For O.K. To Open Waldwick Site

The First National Bank of Allendale entered an application with the Treasury department of the United States for a branch bank to be situated in Waldwick. Their's is the second application, the first being filed with the State by the North Jersey Trust Co. of Ridgewood. The latter's application was filed in July.

Hearings have been held with another, and possibly the final hearing scheduled for January. Observers pointed out today that the hearings are held by the state commissioner and he may possibly favor a state institution, especially if that one had applied first.

Walter Weber, attorney for the local bank, pointed out in the application that this bank had been servicing the residents of Waldwick for many years and total deposits of \$1,188,000 and 71 mortgage loans totaling \$308,000, plus 125 other loans totaling \$96,000 as of August 6, 1952.

Requests for a branch of the local bank in Waldwick have been made in the past and only a change in the laws governing national banks in July made this possible. Mr. Weber stated the Allendale bank had taken care of Waldwick deposits and loans when no one else was interested and permission to open a branch should be given the local bank.

Roy Grimley, attorney for the Ridgewood institution pointed out that his bank had deposits of \$2,000,000 from an area one and one half miles around the center now and to supply the banking services requested by the business men and over 900 residents. These petitions were circulated early this summer.

The area mentioned by Mr. Grimley would include some portion of Midland Park, Ho-Ho-Kus and Ridgewood while the local bank only includes Waldwick proper.

The commissioners pointed out to Mr. Grimley that a mile and a half radius would come within a tenth of a mile from the Allendale Bank.

The hearings are being held before Warren W. Gaffney, Commissioner of Banking and Insurance of New Jersey in Trenton.

As previously announced, the first place winner will receive a suitable plaque from the Chamber of Commerce. Other winners will be notified and will receive their certificates.

BERGEN COUNTY WANTS NEXT GOV. OF NEW JERSEY

Bergen County Republican leaders will insist that the party's choice for the 1953 gubernatorial nominee be a resident of Bergen County.

County Committee Chairman Howard J. Cox said today that he and the other party leaders in this County will be firm in their demands that Bergen has earned the right to name the next Republican candidate for governor.

"I have talked with a number of Republican leaders throughout the State and I find strong support for Bergen's contention that the candidate should come from our County", said Mr. Cox. "Many of the leaders in the southern counties agree to this. The landslide majority of 119,000 which Bergen gave toward the victory of General Eisenhower has firmly established our county as the banner Republican county in New Jersey. Our party leaders are united in their stand that this honor will not remain an empty one. For many years, in the interest of party harmony, Bergen has withdrawn its demands to produce the gubernatorial candidate. We now feel that the time has come, as shown by the voting records, for the other 20 counties in New Jersey to withdraw whatever demands they may have and, in the interest of assuring the election of a Republican governor, they concede Bergen County's right to present its man as the choice of the party."

The change of government took place as prescribed by law exactly at noon. Prior to that, the old Council under Mayor Leslie Johnson met briefly for the year-end ceremony of calling roll and then adjourning as the legal governing body of Allendale.

Mr. Johnson before turning the meeting over to Mr. Tucker reviewed the accomplishments of 1952 by citing the following changes; Soil Removal ordinance, New street lights, new Police car, Parking plazas, the fire engine to be delivered this month, water tank repairs, fire house repairs and escape, flood control work, Crescent Ave. improvements, driveway ordinance road repairs and the new zoning law. He stated the borough was in good financial condition. Mr. Johnson thanked the employees for their fine work, the council for their cooperation. He concluded by wishing all a happy New Year, shook Mr. Tucker's hand and took his seat in the audience.

At noon, Borough Clerk Charles Volaro, swore in the new Council with John Tucker as Mayor, and newly elected Councilmen John Wattles and Perry Conklin.

Mayor Tucker also appointed the standing committees of the Borough Council. They are as follows:

Finance and Insurance: Chairman, John Wattles; other members Henry Cobb, Helen Hanson and Elwood Critchley.

Public Safety: Chairman, Henry Cobb, Elwood Critchley. Water: Chairman, Elwood Critchley, John Wattles.

Streets and Roads: Frank McCord and Henry Cobb.

Buildings and Grounds: Perry Conklin, Henry Cobb.

Parks, Lights and Playgrounds: Helen Hanson and Perry Conklin.

A Library committee was appointed to take over the administration of the Lee Memorial Library, which was voted to become a Borough property by the electorate in the November election. To head the committee for a period of five years will be Martin Husing. A four-year term will be served by Mrs. R. Smith; a three-year term by Mrs. D. deBlock; a two-year term by Miss Ruth Morrison and a one-year term by D. Colburn Sr.

TRUMAN PARDONS J. PARNELL THOMAS

J. Parnell Thomas, former Congressman from this district and a resident of E. Allendale Ave. was 'most gratified' by the action taken by President Truman in granting him a full pardon.

Mr. Thomas told this paper, "Needless to say, I am most gratified by the President's action," which was announced on Christmas Eve.

New York papers had quoted him earlier as saying: "I've always differed politically with President Truman, but I thank him sincerely for his action on Christmas Eve."

The President's action restores to Mr. Thomas his full citizenship rights and cancels the \$10,000 fine imposed at the time of sentence.

Mr. Thomas, a Republican, and former chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee, was convicted of putting non-working employees on his governmental payroll and collecting more than \$8,000 in kickbacks.

When he came to trial, Mr. Thomas pleaded nolo contendere—no defense. He was sentenced on December 9, 1949, resigned his House seat and began serving his sentence immediately.

He served eight and a half months of a six-to-eighteen month sentence at the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury, Conn. He returned to his home here on September 10, 1950.
