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Air Raid Test Drill To Be Held At 9 Tonight

The fire alarm will sound at 9 o'clock tonight in a red alert to mark the start of a 15 minute test alert drill for the Civil Defense Organization.

All citizens are asked by Defense Chairman F. Archibald Farrell, to take cover until the all clear is sounded. Those in cars are asked to remain in their cars for the duration of the drill.

During this period all traffic will be stopped. After the all clear has been sounded various roads will be blocked off and automobiles will be detoured from the center of town and around the firehouse and school.

The test will be conducted under conditions as realistic as possible, Mr. Farrell said. All members of the Civil Defense will take part in the drill: personnel of the Fire Department, Police and Auxiliary Police, First Aiders, Ambulance corps, Control center personnel, Medical (Registered nurses), Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

The Legion Building will be a first aid center for the East side of the borough and the firehouse will serve on the west side.

In order for the test to be successful, Mr. Farrell said, it is important that private citizens who are not members of any of the participating organizations, not offer their services during the drill. There will be plenty of time for that later, he said, and any person wishing to help in the future can contact the Civil Defense committee and get proper training for participating in the drills.

Citizens in their homes are not asked to take part in the test in any way, other than to stay inside until the all clear sounds.

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FIREMEN LEARNING HOW TO OPERATE NEW FIRE TRUCK

Allendale's new red fire engine is in the firehouse and being used as a training vehicle for all members of the Volunteer Fire Department. The \$14,000 rig which was ordered by the Borough Council last summer and delivered last month has passed the National Board of Fire Underwriters examination and is now being tested by the men who will have to use it.

Officially, the truck has not been accepted by the Borough Council and as such is not legally a piece of town property. This formal acceptance will come when the Fire Department has had an opportunity to check every detail of the new engine and properly school its members. Twelve firemen have already checked out in the operation of the truck and more will be schooled as quickly as possible.

The new machine will be used in the test drill being staged tonight by the Civil Defense organization but this does not in any way constitute the town's legal responsibility for its operation.

COUNCIL NIXES LEGION PLAN FOR CARNIVAL SHOW

Legal Attorney John Warshaw produced the legal parasitic resolution, but said that this would not prohibit local organizations from holding their own affairs.

In the discussion which followed at the Council meeting last Thursday it was made clear that this restriction did not apply to a local organization conducting its own carnival, entirely with local help and talent. Under these conditions the organization could import a ferris wheel or ponies for rides for children.

Councilman Henry Cobb said that he was reluctant to turn down the Legion's request but that he had objections to various aspects of carnivals. "We don't want anyone to think we are against the Legion," he said. "The Legion

Tucker's 5 Man Board Questioned By Council

Mayor John Tucker, despite criticism from at least one member of the Borough Council and the Planning Board, appointed a five-man advisory board to the Planning Board at last week's Council meeting.

Mayor Tucker said that he was making the appointment at the urging of various groups in town, mainly the Citizen's Committee, and at the request of the Planning Board itself. He cited a letter dated April 10, 1951, in which the chairman of the Board requested that the Mayor appoint such a Board to sit in on all Planning Board meetings and act in an advisory capacity.

The new five man committee consists of Frank Williams, E. Orchard Ave., Leonard Baum, Hillside Ave., Henry Schmidt, Hillside Ave., Wilford Paulson, Franklin Turnpike and Hadley Ford of Brookside Ave. These men will attend all public and private meetings of the Planning Board, take part in the discussion but will not vote.

Their function is to bring to the Planning Board the "citizen's viewpoint" in the discussion of planning board matters and advise members of the Board.

At the Council meeting last Thursday Councilwoman Helen Hansen took exception to the appointment of an advisory Board by the Mayor and said that the Council had not been notified of such appointments prior to the announcement made at the meeting. She said that she had received a letter from Planning Board Chairman, Francis X. Scaturro, pertaining to the appointment of such a board, written by Herbert H. Smith, chief of the Planning Division of the State Department of Economics and Conservations.

Mr. Smith's letter said that generally Advisory Boards were appointed soon after the inauguration of a Planning Board, not later as is the case with the Mayor's appointments. Moreover, Mr. Smith said that these appointments are best made in consultation with the Planning Board.

The letter went in to say that an Advisory Board can be a very helpful addition to the working members of the Planning Board, but it can also hinder very greatly the proper functions of the Planning Board.

Making Our Children Aware Of Danger

For some time we have watched the antics of most youngsters on the borough streets and how they ride their bicycles. We would like to believe they don't know the common, ordinary road courtesy that means safety for them and others. If you are not this broadminded you might say they are insolent.

They turn right in front of the unsuspecting motorist, make turns without bothering to signal, steer an erratic course down our main steets and jeer at the worried motorist. They pop at you at dusk from out of driveways and worst of all are a menace to themselves and others at night without even a puny flash bulb to warn the oncoming motorist of the dangers ahead.

Last Friday night a youngster on Franklin Turnpike caused a serious accident. Fortunately no one was injured but the shock to those concerned was considerable. Just where the youngster was going, we don't know but the motorist swerved to avoid hitting him and smashed into another car and both cars will cost many dollars to repair. Had he had adequate lights or even a little reflector, the accident very likely would have been avoided. The parents of this boy are equally guilty by allowing him out after dark without lights.

We have in Allendale a very popular young club. The Sixth Grade Bicycle Club. They have done wonderful things for our friend, Tom, the shoemaker. Our hats are off to them. Now they can do something even greater, and that is to make our streets safer for every boy and girl who owns and rides a bicycle. They can start a safety program that can teach every child the rules of safety and very likely save some youngsters life. Our Police Chief and School Principal would be happy to help this program along but they need some adult willing to give the time and energy to conduct such a safety program. In Ridgewood and other communities there is such a program and those in charge would be happy to start us off on the right foot.

Possibly after the members of the group demonstrate their own safety ability and their bikes have been passed for safety features, they could act as deputies to prevent serious accidents during the coming year. Parents could help the program along very easily by backing up those in charge. We pass the suggestion along to the Lions or some other adult group for their serious consideration. We offer free membership cards and other printing they might need and all the promotion they need to get the safety program underway. We have two youngsters and we want them to be safe on our roads too. Every parent feels the same, so how about getting it underway and doing it at once. Remember the life we save might be our own child's.
