## Stormy Council Meeting When Job Problem Hits

The Planning Board and the Advisory Committee to the Planning Board came up with conflicting recommendations to the Mayor and Council on the highly controversial matter of whether or not to rezone Crescent Inn and Turnpike Tavern as businesses. At present both establishments operate as non-conforming uses.

The Planning Board once again did not recommend that the Crescent Inn be rezoned. Their report read at last Thursday's Council meeting was fully protected under the zoning code and said that the Inn is "in effect already zoned for business" and that any change would constitute spot zoning.

The Advisory Committee recommended that both taverns be rezoned. Their report stated that they had considered the history of both businesses, the location of the properties, the arguments offered for and against rezoning, and concluded that in the interest of the Borough and in fairness to the owners, both businesses should be rezoned.

The contrary reports reflected the mood of the partisan audience which filled the War Memorial Building last Thursday night.

Following the Council's action to have the Attorney draw up two ordinances which, if passed, would rezone both businesses, Mayor Tucker set the date for the first reading of the ordinance for next Thursday.

Mayor Tucker expressed his hope to postpone all discussion of the matter until the public hearing on the ordinances.

Despite the Mayors repeated requests, the subject did come up when the meeting was opened to the public following the business session.

Robert Rich, 17 Crescent Place, said he represented 19 taxpayers in his part of town who had come to the meeting expressly to voice their objections.

"We've come to this meeting fully prepared to speak against rezoning the Crescent Inn, and now we find we have to come again in another two weeks."

"We ought not to have to act as watch dogs on our own council," Mr. Rich said.

The recommendations made by the Planning Board's advisory committee, Mr. Rich maintained, were biased because members of the committee did not adequately go into the history of the property, that they had not talked with anyone who opposed rezoning the property.

No sooner had Mr. Rich sat down than Pat Job was on his feet.

"You say Mr. Rich, that the taxpayers you represent have better things to do than keep watch on the council," Mr. Job said, "Well let me tell you, I've been here at every meeting for

## School Board Accept Foreit Bid For Playground Work

Repairs and bids took up most of the business at the meeting of the Board of Education on Tuesday night at the Brookside School. Good news for the children was one of the items when a contract to double the playground area was given to the Foreit Construction Co. to install loam over the filter beds. The

price was \$500. with the fencing of the area to be held up until the work is completed. Foreit was also told to go ahead with a black top along side of the building and rounding off of the present driveway.

A building to house outdoor equipment was ordered from John Cooper and Co. of Newark. It will be a prefabricated aluminum building and will be erected by James Keivet. A stone incinerator will be built at the same time. The building and work will start as soon as summer vacation starts.

In an effort to reduce still further the fuel consumed in the building, the present glass roof over the auditorium will be closed off and insulated. The saving from the insulation work already done was seen in the amount of fuel oil required next year. 25 thousand gallons are needed against 30,000 last year despite the degree days each year. Part of the fuel savings, according to President Stranding was in thermostat adjustments and the drying out of the new building last year. Bids for the insulation were not opened because of the cost of the roof work was unknown.

## Planning Board Vote Down Zoning Changes

The Planning Board voted 5 to 3 against changing the motion made at their last meeting on their recommendation of no change in zoning for the Turnpike Tavern and Crescent Inn. This action was taken on Monday night at the firehouse.

The matter was brought to a vote by a motion introduced by David Colburn and seconded by Chester Conklin. Mayor Tucker cast the other affirmative vote. Those voting against the change in recommendation were Chairman Scafuro, Sidney Maydel, Fred Rickerich, Henry Kahse, and C. Bardsley. The vote was taken after Pat Job reviewed his case and the reason for the request for rezoning. Stephen Van Houten spoke on behalf of Mr. Job.

The board contended that the present ordinance No. 503 provided protection for Mr. Job in case of a fire. Job replied that the validity of such an ordinance was in doubt. Attorney Warhol has taken the review of the ordinance under study and has not given his ruling as yet. Mr. Warhol was not present at the meeting.

Sebastian Gaeta, an attorney representing the Wyckoff Homes who sought permission to sub divide a piece of property on Franklin Turnpike and Cottage Place attended the meeting and told the Board they had overstepped their jurisdiction in asking that the land be filled in to bring the ground level up and to require curbing on a County Road. He cited a recent court action to prove his point. Mr. Scafuro replied that by developers doing the installation of curbing the borough tax rate would not be increased. Mr. Gaeta stated the Turnpike was a County road, not under the jurisdiction of the local authorities and if he was forced to put them in he would bring suit to have all others owning property on the road to do likewise. He further stated he would bring the matter to a court case if necessary to prove his point. On the matter of sight grading Mr. Scafuro told the attorney the borough ordinances would make such a leveling off a must. Mr. Gaeta concluded his remarks by stating "your rules and regulations are choking the borough," citing the earlier report of Building Inspector David Colburn that no new building permits had been issued in the borough this year.

Mayor Tucker later remarked that "something must be wrong with our regulations to bring such a condition about."

Stephen Van Houten who is remodeling an old home into office space and offered land to the borough to round off the corner of W. Allendale Avenue and Franklin Turnpike suggested to the board that part of the money for the parking plaza be used for the widening of Allendale Avenue from the corner to the Allendale Spa. \$8,600 is being set

### Property Owners File Objections To Prevent Fish Hatchery Here

Property owners in the vicinity of Victor Scafuro's proposed site for his fish breeding business behind Cottage Place on the land referred to as the celery farm object to the establishment of a wholesale business in the area. They maintain that it will bring hardship to the adjoining property owners caused by property depreciating in value.

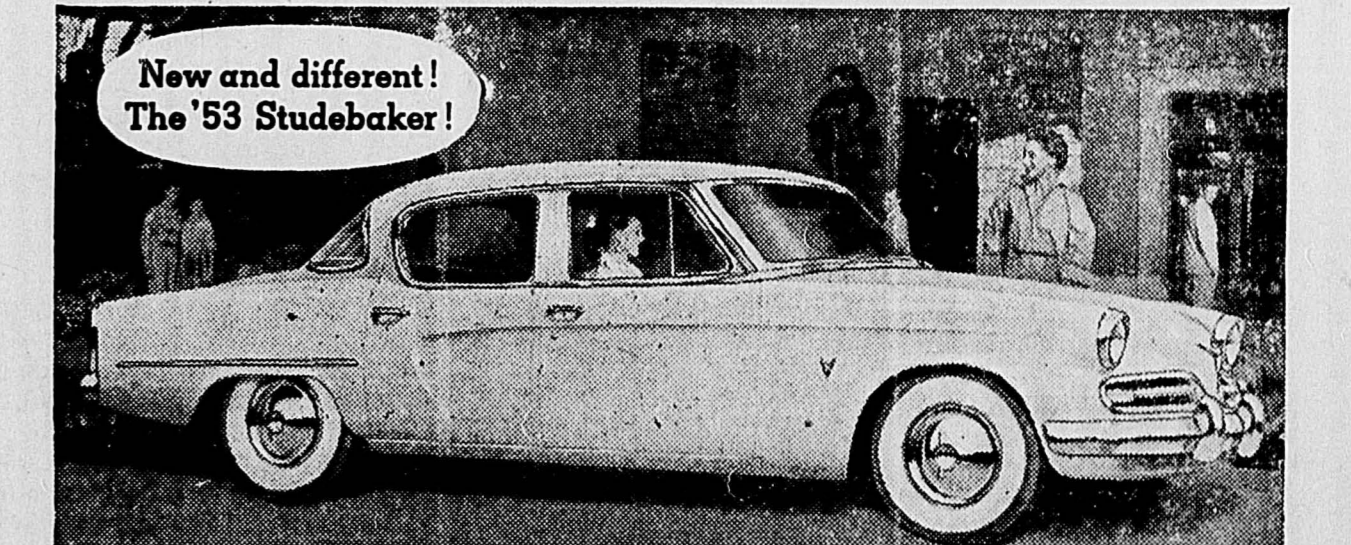

JR. WOMEN TO AID RIDGEWOOD VILLAGE SCHOOL

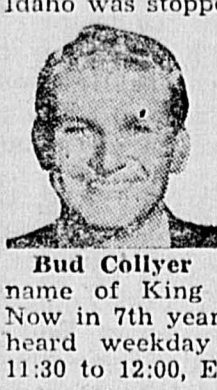

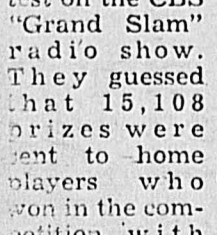
Star-Lites MOVIES, MIKES and TELEVISION TALK
