## Small Fry League Hold Tryouts For 3 Teams

Despite the inclement weather experienced over the past weekend, the Junior Baseball program sponsored by the Allendale Athletic Association went merrily on its way. On Saturday morning, intensive practice sessions were held under the supervision of Coach Bob Brinker. About 20 boys in the "Tiny Tim" group were in attendance and had a good workout. In addition to these boys approximately 40 candidates for the Little League teams turned out. The morning session was devoted entirely to practice on fundamentals and in the afternoon a practice game was held and all candidates were given an opportunity to display their talents.

Members of the Allendale Rod and Gun club will leave Sunday from the home of the President John Schockert at 9:30 to set out over 2,500 small trees in the club's program of reforestation.

1,000 Norwegian poplar trees and the balance of hardy pines make up the plants to be set out. Members are asked to bring along shovels and pick axes to help in the work.

Joseph Gannon is chairman of the project. Co-chairmen are Arden Bradley, Peter Grimley, Jack Boyle, Jacob Van Sickle, George Dean Sr., Vincent Lavigna, Bob Anderson, F. D. Workman, Edward Kuklinski, Ed Baldi and Rudy Kugler. Schockert will be in charge of refreshments—service at the grounds in the afternoon. Bob Hilingworth is co-chairman. Frank Winters and Vic Palace Sr. will be in charge of the hot dogs; Workman, rolls; Dean, ice; and Chief Chef Howard Dorr, charcoal and cooking. Assisting the chef will be Vic Palace, George Covert and Schockert.

The trout contest is now under way. A prize will be awarded for the heaviest catch. Submitted thus far have been a one pound, 15 ounce brook trout by Richard Prant Jr.; a one pound, nine ounce trout by Bob Anderson, and a one pound, serve and one-half oz. trout by Arden Bradley.

Schockert announced that any fish caught by a member anywhere in New Jersey is eligible for club prizes being offered for the heaviest trout, pickerel and bass. In the event the catch is made at a point remote from Allendale, the entrants are asked to send affidavits as to weight. Locally, fish are weighed at Herb Winters store.

A total of 125 members attended the meeting Thursday evening. Guest speaker, State Publicity manager Jules Martin congratulated the club on its work and talked on wild life Motion pictures were shown of the 1952 fish and game stocking program.

If Allendale is granted home mail delivery service, it will mark the end of a campaign which began in 1940, Postmaster Farrell said. In that year, he recalls, the Women's Club passed a resolution asking for home mail delivery.

Then the war came and nothing was done about it, Mr. Farrell said. In 1946 a survey was taken, similar to the one taken recently, but it was turned down because post office officials did not think Allendale had sufficient population to warrant home delivery.

"Now, I think we stand a very good chance of getting it," Postmaster Farrell said.

corner of the intersection, has offered the borough whatever land from his corner it needs to effect the rounding off. The Chamber feels that it

would be advisable to do the whole job, round the corner and widen the street, and strongly urged the Mayor and Council to give their proposal serious consideration in order to take advantage of the gift of land from Mr. Van Houten and the work to be done by the county.

There is no money presently available for this improvement work under the present budget. Undertaking of the project would necessitate the drawing up of a separate ordinance to draw money from the capital improvement fund.

Since most of this fund has been earmarked for other work to be done this year, in a period of "economy budgeting", some proponents of the plan have been eyeing the \$8000 allocated to the west side plaza improvement project.
