## G.O.P. Club Against Any Borough Rezoning

Chances of Council approval of ordinances which would rezone Crescent Inn and the Turnpike Tavern for business, dimmed perceptibly this week when the Regular Republican Club took a stand in opposition to rezoning any non-conforming uses in the borough.

They stated their position in a formal resolution passed Tuesday night at the club's regular meeting.

The Republicans at the present time have a one member majority on the seven man borough council. While the actual outcome of the vote to follow a public hearing next Thursday night cannot be forecast, it is conceded that opposition of the two ordinances by the Republican organization will have a strong influence on the way their members decide.

If the four members of the Republican party — Councilmen McCord, Hansen, Cobb and Critchley — vote according to their party's resolution, the ordinances will go down to defeat.

This will be a blow to Pat Job, owner of Crescent Inn, who requested rezoning a year ago following a fire which partially destroyed his tavern. Since then, the Inn has been rebuilt and improved with the addition of a complete new dining room capable of handling large gatherings.

Mr. Job contends that under the present zoning code his business could not be rebuilt if destroyed again by fire in the event that a taxpayer's suit was raised against him.

The Turnpike Tavern bases its request for rezoning principally on the fact of its location. South of the Turnpike Tavern, but over the boro line in Waldwick, a business zone exists. Therefore, owners of the Tavern say it would not be spot zoning to have their business conform to those adjacent to it.

The Crescent Inn ordinance will have strong support from residents in town who contend that since the Job family has (Please Turn to Page Eight)

## Thomas Withdraws As Council Candidate Here

Republicans will have to substitute the name of another candidate to run for Borough Council in November. Robert Thomas, who was endorsed by the GOP voters in the recent primary has had to withdraw his candidacy. He is moving to Tulsa, Oklahoma, in June.

### SPAS DROPPED FROM YMCA LEAGUE

The Spas, Allendale's softball club in the 1953 Ridgewood YMCA Twilight Softball League, has been dropped from the loop and replaced by the Stasny's Casino nine of Waldwick on a technical ruling of the circuit executive committee.

Commissioner Charles Ponkop ruled after reviewing the Allendale Spas' roster, which by loop regulations must carry at least two-thirds of last year's players to be eligible to compete under changed sponsorship, that the Spas were not eligible. The roster carried only six members of last year's full complement of 18 players listed by the Bergen Herald team which was to have become the Spas of this season.

The team representatives at the meeting, held last Friday immediately voted to drop the Spas from the circuit and substitute the Stasny's team.

League play will begin May 11 with the Ridgewood Taxi team (formerly Foster's Hardware) facing the MacHugh's nine, at the YMCA Diamond on Oak Street, Ridgewood.

A nominating committee was appointed by the Republicans at their meeting Tuesday night to choose another candidate to run in Mr. Thomas' place. Announcement of that choice will be made at the June 2nd meeting of the organization.

The candidate chosen will have to be approved by Republican County committee chairmen in order that his name appear on the November ballot.

The executive committee also appointed Vail Frost to be program chairman, and William Hanson, publicity chairman, for a Candidates Night to be held in late October preceding the election.

A resolution stating the Republican Club's objections to rezoning Crescent Inn and the Turnpike Tavern for business, was also passed at the meeting.

Filling the vacancy created by Mr. Thomas' withdrawal will provide a challenge to local politicians for Mr. Thomas was well known in the borough although he and his family have only lived here since September 1950.

Mr. Thomas has been very active in civic affairs; serving currently as president of the PTA, vice-president of the Holiday Observers, a trustee of the War Memorial Association and a member of the executive committee of the Epiphany Church. His wife, Mary Thomas, is a Girl Scout leader and member of the Evening Guild of Epiphany Church. The Thomases have four children, Mary Lou, Marjorie, Bobby and Jane.

Mr. Thomas, now associated with Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, is moving to Tulsa to become vice president of the Midwest Mortgage Company. He will leave Allendale in June. The family will follow later in the summer.

## 1.2 Million Regional High School Will Help Here If Tri-Boro Okays

A decision, if approved by the communities affected, that could greatly affect the future growth of Allendale was seen in a report submitted by the six man planning committee for the three communities of Wyckoff, Oakland and Franklin Lakes. The committee unanimously

improved the formation of a Regional High School for the three boroughs at a meeting Tuesday night at the Abraham Lincoln School in Wyckoff.

One of the many problems facing communities in this area is the school population, especially the high school. The time is not far distant when Ramsey will not be able to take the students from the eight sending districts and a formation of such a school would relieve the congestion at the high school for Allendale students. Both Franklin Lakes and Wyckoff send their students to the same school. Oakland sends theirs to the high school in Pompton Lakes.

Highlights of the committee report, which was based on an intensive study of the school needs of the respective towns, are:

1. A new high school for the three communities can be constructed at an estimated cost of \$1,200,000 which will provide fully adequate facilities for an enrollment of 1000 stu-

dents.

2. New high school facilities for the three communities are urgently needed by the 1956-57 school year because both Ramsey and Pompton Lakes High school will have student bodies far in excess of rated capacities at the start of that year.

3. The proposed new regional high school will have an initial enrollment of 673 students in the 1956-57 school year. By the 1961-62 school year approximately 946 students will be attending the new high school.

4. Approximately \$97,000 in

state financial aid will be available under the regional plan during the 1956-57 school year which will more than meet the cost of principal and interest on any bond issue needed to finance the new building. This state financial aid is based on enrollment and can be expected to increase in subsequent years.

5. The three communities within the regional district will be able to set the educational policies of the new school; whereas the districts now have no voice in the educational policies of the Ramsey and Pompton Lakes schools.

6. The three communities lend themselves geographically to a regional district.

7. The purchase of land should present no problem because the regional district contains more than 25.4 sq. miles.

8. The type of people and the tax policies of the three communities are similar and the ratio of valuation to high school students is approximately equal.

No action was taken jointly by the Boards of Education at Tuesday's meeting. Each Board received the report of the planning committee and is expected to consider it in more detail on a regular meeting night this month.

Seven representatives from local organizations attended the meeting.

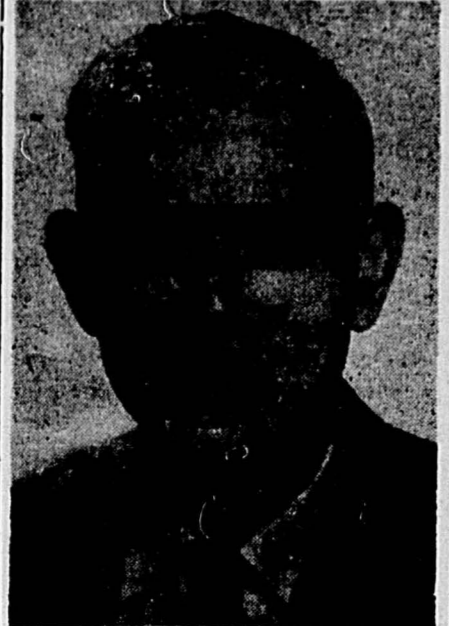

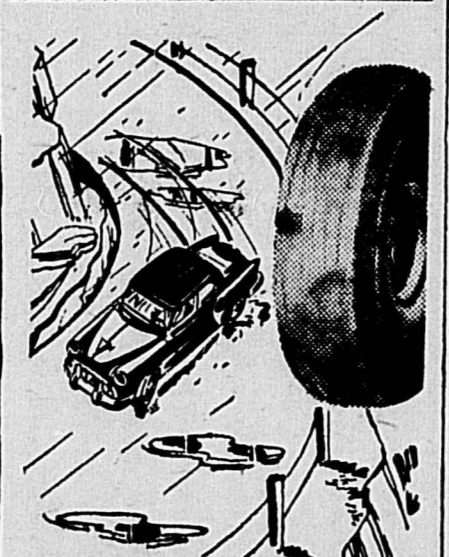

Charlie Smith Retires From Sugar Business - But Maintains Lively Interest In Local Affairs

Charles F. Smith, one of Allendale's most venerable citizens, reviewed some of the changes which have taken place in the borough over the past half-century and also looked back on 50 years of service in the sugar business.

A STATEMENT OF POLICY The membership of the Republican Club of Allendale at its regular meeting held Tuesday, May 5, 1953 considered the current and vital question of rezoning Crescent Inn and Turnpike Tavern from their present non-conforming status to a business zone. For the following reasons a resolution was adopted voicing opposition to rezoning ANY non-conforming uses in the Borough of Allendale to a business zone. 1-The Borough now is zoned for one "Central Business District" - roughly located on West Allendale Avenue. 2-Considerable opposition was raised at the public hearings on the Comprehensive Plan, against proposed local shopping facilities one mile removed from the Central Business District. 3-If the Tavern areas are so rezoned, they could be easily expanded and developed so that the Central Business District would suffer severe loss of business and become a blighted area. 4-There are other non-conforming uses in the Borough. There is no stigma attached to such a designation. 5-The Mayor and Council and the Planning Board favor protection to the fullest extent possible in the event of destruction, for all non-conforming uses in the Borough. 6-All businesses now non-conforming can continue on the existing basis practically forever or as long as the present owners, their families or successors choose to carry on in that business, assuming Section 503 will protect them in the event of fire or destruction.

The text of the Republican resolution may be found on another page in this issue of The Allendale Press. It says, in brief, that at the present time Allendale business is zoned in the downtown area and that logical expansion of the business zone should be in that area.

Also, the resolution states the same arguments raised against the development of outlying shopping centers are valid against rezoning the two taverns as businesses because both are away from the downtown business section.

The resolution further states that the whole purpose of issuing non-conforming use permits is to enable the town to rid itself, over a period of years, of improperly placed enterprises. It would be unfair, the resolution states, for the Council to consider individual requests without considering all other non-conforming businesses.

The Republicans point out that the Mayor and Council and Planning Board favor protection for all non-conforming uses, to the fullest extent possible in the event of destruction. The resolution states that if the zoning code is faulty in providing this protection, the remedy would be in changing the zoning code, not rezoning the properties in question.

The resolution concludes by saying that the Borough is entitled to and should control these non-conforming uses and not be at the mercy or caprice of any individual owner no matter how well intentioned he may be today.
