G.O.P. Club Against **Any Borough Rezoning**

Chances of Council approval of ordinances which would rezone Crescent Inn and the Turnpike Tavern for business, dimmed perceptibly this week when the **Regular** Republican Club took a stand in opposition to rezoning any non-conform-

ing uses in the borough.

a formal resolution passed Tuesday night at the club's ' regular meeting.

The Republicans at the present time have a one member majority on the seven man borough council. While the actual outcome of the vote to follow a public hearing next Thursday night cannot be forecast, it is conceded that opposition of the two ordinances by the Republican organization will have a strong influence on the way their members decide.

If the four members of the Republican party - Councilmen McCord, Hansen, Cobb and Critchley - vote according to their party's resolution, the ordinances will go down to defeat.

This will be a blow to Pat Job, owner of Crescent Inn, who requested rezoning a year ago following a fire which partially destroyed his tavern. Since then, the Inn has been rebuilt and improved with the addition of a complete new dining room capable of handling large gatherings.

Mr. Job contends that under the present zoning code his business could not be rebuilt if destroyed again by fire in the event that a taxpayer's suit was raised against him.

It is unfair to consider individual requests without considering all of them. Obviously if all were to be rezoned the Borough would be a hodgepodge of businesses and residences seriously affecting the values of each citizen's investment in his home and property.

Board favor protection to the fullest extent possible in the event of destruction, for all non-conforming uses in the Borough. This is evidenced by providing 100 per cent coverage in Section 503 of the Zoning Ordinance. If this Section is faulty the remedy lies in amending it -not in creating the problems outlined above.

on the existing basis practically forever or as long as the present owners, their families or successors choose to carry on in that business, assuming Section 503 will protect them in the event of fire or destruction. The Borough is entitled to and should control these uses and not be at the mercy or caprice of any individual owner no matter how well intentioned he may be today.

We were glad to see the parking lot problem come to a conclusion at the last council meeting and while we did think the money appropriated was too much for the work, evidently the Borough Engineers didn't, and that is both the present Borough engineers, Fraleigh and Swanewede and former borough engineer, Harvey Beswick. We do have confidence in their judgment. Evidently both felt the right kind of a job would cost that much and they refused to recommend anything less. We hire these men for their knowledge so we must accept it or risk being too smart for our own good.

All too often in the past we have started a job and then somewhere in the process of finishing it, left it undone. We should stop this kind of economy. It's more expensive in the long run. The fact the council voted almost to a man in favor of it shows a trend along this line. This speaks well for future projects undertaken by the borough. Why Mr. Conklin did not vote escaped us. If he did not want the job done he should have registerd a nay. To abstain looks like he didn't have much of a feeling either way.

The widening of Allendale Avenue and the correction of a drainage problem certainly is one of the first things to be considered when another public project is to be taken up. Certainly the corner should be rounded off as soon as possible and when sufficient money is available, do the rest of the work and widen the street. To our mind, a nice parking lot, both for shoppers and commuters will do more for the town than widening the street. As long as we didn't have the money for both, we are glad to see them do one job as it should be done.

With the coming election expected to be a hot one we imagine this will be one of the platforms of either or both sides. How a group with economy as one of their basic platforms will hurdle this in view of the support of this work by the Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Chamber of Commerce is something we don't know but we will find out in a very few months.

Also, the resolution states the same arguments raised against the development of outlying shopping centers are valid against rezoning the two taverns as businesses because both are away from the downtown business section.

The resolution further states that the whole purpose of issuing non-conforming use permits is to enable the town to rid itself, over a period of years, of improperly placed enterprises. It would be unfair, the resolution states, for the Council to consider individual requests without considering all other non-conforming bus-

inesses. The Republicans point out that the Mayor and Council and

Planning Board favor protection for all non-conforming uses, to the fullest extent possible in the event of destruction. The resolution states that if the zoning code is faulty in providing this protection, the remedy would be in changing the zoning code, not rezoning the properties in question.

The resolution concludes by saying that the Borough'is entitled to and should control these non-conforming uses and not be at the mercy or caprice of any individual owner no matter how well intentioned he may be today.
