Taxpayer League Hear Problems Of John Q

The open meeting of the Allendale Taxpayers League was disappointing from the number of residents that attended on Monday at the firehouse, but the smallness of the audience resulted in a more informal type of meeting than would have been possible with a larger audience.

Mr. Helmuth Falcke conducted the meeting and questions concerning the number of signs in the residential district that advertise private businesses were brought into the discussion and the feelings of those present reflected the general thought of curtailing those non-conforming residential businesses to a minimum.

Charles Smith brought up the matter of lot sizes and explained that the problem of undersized lots could be brought to the Bd. of Adjustment for an exception. He also asked the League to look into the ever rising school costs and suggested that courses that are unnecessary be dropped. He cited the cost of students attending high school as being over \$300 per pupil.

James Stranding, president

of the local board made no defense of the question but stated the people wanted the children to receive the very best of education and today, that costs money.

Robert Rich attended the meeting and represented the group of citizens on N. Crescent Avenue. He asked the League to seek out the unused talent in the borough to bring about a better working government and said his organization was for "a reasonable tax ceiling" and "the rural atmosphere of the borough be continued."

Edmund Gofsick spoke briefly but very much to a point when he stated "the mayor and council, after they are elected, think they are little tin gods and vote not the way people want them to, but how they feel themselves." He suggested they spend more time learning the peoples desires so they could vote that way.

All in all, the meeting brought some knowledge of the feelings of those present to Walter Dunsby and Richard Van Houten, Taxpayer's League candidates for the coming election for council.

J. P. Burns, Inc., construction company from Dumont, was awarded the contract for resurfacing the parking area west of the railroad track, by the Borough Council last week.

The Burns Company's low bid of \$6,713.80 was accepted from among eight competitors. The J. A. Mullen Company of Tenafly was high with a bid of \$8,892.50.

The Council accepted the Burns company bid after examining the terms of the contract which will provide a macadam top over a 4 inch base to cover the parking area and the completion of curbs and sidewalks. Work is to begin immediately, weather permitting.

Henry Schmidt, a member of the citizens group had told the board his committee was working in the dark and didn't even have a copy of meeting minutes. Mr. Scafuro agreed that the group had in the past worked in the dark because they had not asked the board for their data and cited the example of the recent parking plaza recommendation made to the council by the group. In the report, the recommendation of the borough engineers was not given by the group as the report did not come until the night before the meeting of the council.

Thomas Zane and Mr. Scafuro asked a fresh start be made for both groups to work together to accomplish the most good.

Possible clarification of the disputed non-conforming section of local ordinance 503 was seen in the request to the borough attorney for his opinion of the legality of the present ordinance and if the ordinance was wrong that a correction be made. Attorney John Warhol was not present at the meeting.

The board was advised by Mr. Warhol to stay with their decision as to the requirements of improvements to lots that Sebastain Gaeta of Wyckoff had contended the board had exceeded their authority in requesting, citing court decisions. Mr. Warhol contended the decisions in that case had no bearing in Allendale because the planning board had passed the necessary ordinances to have such power.

The rounding off of both corners of the Franklin Turnpike and Allendale Avenue moved a step closer to being done when reports of local and county engineers were discussed. A recommendation that a final survey of Allendale Ave. from the Turnpike to the Parking plaza be made, was ordered sent to the council for consideration.

GARDENERS HAVE PLENTY OF BLOOMS TO ENHANCE SHOW

One benefit from the excessively wet weather Allendale has had is the abundance of flowers seen in gardens throughout the borough. It is the hope of the Garden Club that many of these flowers will be on display at the flower show being held at Epiphany Parish the weekend of June 6.

A spokesman for the club emphasized that entries will be welcome from all types of gardeners, be they professional or amateur. The show has a varied program which provides for a large number of exhibits which may be entered by even the most casual gardener.

Th specimen classes require only that the flowers entered be grown by the exhibitor. Peonies, roses, iris, perennials and biennials, and flowering shrubs, are the classes chosen for the show, and the garden club picked these groups because they are easily grown in this area and simple to display.

The art of flower arrangement will be recognized in the display. There are 17 different classes which may be entered. Again, garden club members stress the fact that professional skill is not a prerequisite for entries in this group because often a very simple display prepared with imagination can come off a winner.

Children may enter exhibits also. Three classes have been specified for competition.

The club says that any meritorious exhibit not provided for in this schedule will, at the discretion of the judges, be given an award of merit which leaves room for any unusual entries that gardeners care to exhibit.

Police Chief Robert Wilson and Dr. F. R. Kanning testified that Mrs. Moriarity was under the influence of liquor at the time of the accident.

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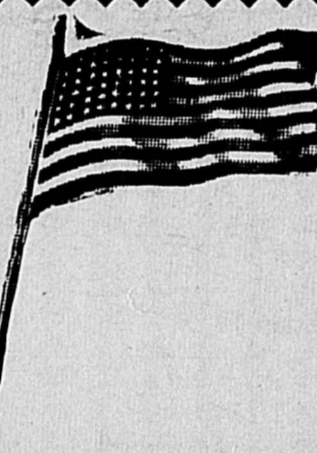
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GRADE SCHOOL BAND ENTERTAINS AT PTA MEETING

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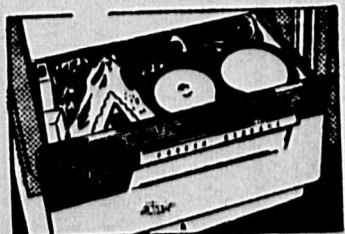
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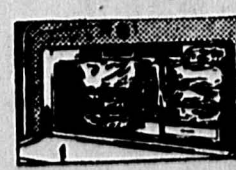


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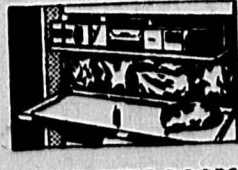
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ALLENDALE A'S OPEN SEASON WITH 10-4 WIN OVER MAHWAH

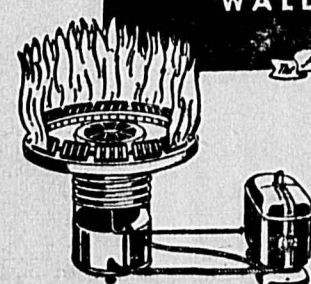
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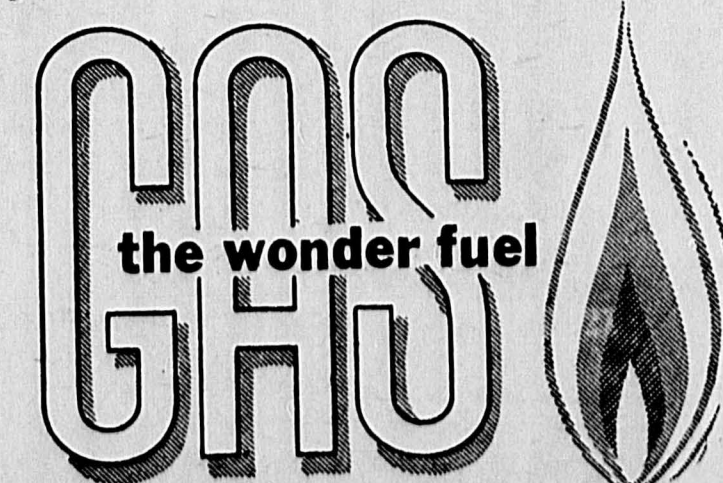
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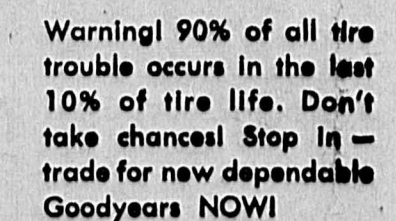
