## Lack Of Money Holds Up Turnpike Project

A letter to the Council from the Planning Board with recommendations for the rounding off of the corner at W. Allendale Avenue and Franklin Turnpike, spurred the Council to call a special meeting Monday night to discuss where to get the money to do the job.

Councilman Elwood Critchley said the council was agreed that the borough ought to round off the corner at the same time the County does the work on the drainage problem and thereby, save some money.

The problem nowever is not one of agreement but one of money. There is not enough money in this year's budget or extra projects of this kind.

S. T. Van Houten said he would donate his corner property to the project if the corner was rounded off to the brook, but he would not be willing to give up any land if less of a job was contemplated.

Engineer's plans however calls for the widening the corner up to the brook.

## WOODEN BRIDGE FOR SWIMMING POOL

The pedestrian bridge to be built over the brook by the swimming pool, is to be a wooden one instead of concrete, as previously announced.

Councilwoman Hansen said that the lowest bid she was able to obtain on the construction of a concrete foot bridge was \$600 and there was not enough money in the Parks & Playgrounds account to pay that much.

Instead, a wooden bridge with concrete pillars will be built by a local contractor for \$350.

Work on the bridge will start as soon as possible, but in all likelihood, Mrs Hansen said, it will not be completed before the pool opens for the summer.

## CRESCENT AVENUE SOON TO BE CURBED

Curbs are soon to go in on W. Crescent Avenue and thereby complete the Crescent Ave. improvement project started last fall.

A resolution passed by the Board of Freeholders on May 20th approving the survey maps which established the center line of Crescent Avenue, now make it possible for the work to be started.

Pat Job Construction Co. was granted the contract for the work last year and will now finish the job. Pavements will be put between the old pavement and the new curbs which will provide at least a temporary covering for the whole street from curb to curb. Engineer Harvey Beswick will supervise the work.

Leslie Johnson was elected vice-president of the 8 Town League for the coming year.

## TWO LOCAL GIRLS WIN HORSEMANSHIP AWARDS AT SHOW

Ten members of the North Jersey Horse and Pony League attended the horseshow held at Sunnyside Stables on Sunday and two members came out top winners.

Carol Thurston won top honors in the ASPCA Maclay competition which is a hunter-horsemanship event that entitles Carole to compete in the National Horseshow held at Madison Square Garden next November.

Catherine Foster also qualified for competition in the National Horseshow by winning the National Horseshow good hands equitation trophy.

Both Carol and Catherine are now out of the running for events in the NJH&PL horseshow to be held July 11 at Talmann, N. Y. because they are already qualified. However, this makes room for more winners to qualify for events in the National Horseshow, a spokesman for the League reported.

## SCHOOL BOARD GETS COUNCIL OKAY ON VOTERS BALLOTING

The Borough Council went on record saying that it had no objection to the Board of Education seeking permission to put the question of buying future school property on a school ballot this fall.

The proposed site is a nine acre tract owned by Dr. Godfrey Pittis, located off Franklin Tpke. south of Ivers Place Price \$26,750.

James Strandring, President of the local board said that the Board did not seek Council approval on the question of whether or not to buy the site, just assistance in getting the referendum on the ballot.

Full information regarding future school needs will be made available to the public by the board before the fall election.

## GREENERY ON BOROUGH PARKING PLAZA ISLE

In the nick of time, the park plaza was saved from having black top put across the top of the parking island west of the railroad station.

Cardon Hutchinson made a plea for greenery in the plaza rather than "factory dressing", at the Borough Council meeting last Thursday.

The Council, after prolonged discussion, voted to have the Borough Engineer instruct the contractor to leave the area in dirt. The contract specified a blacktop dressing. The saving from this will be used to buy greenery, but the total amount of money is not to exceed the amount of the contract.

Councilwoman Helen Hansen was made directly responsible for the planting of the platform. She said she will get cooperation from citizens in town who are interested in the project and offered her personal guarantee that the platform would get planted to the satisfaction of everyone concerned.

## Rain Mars Impressive Memorial Day Services

A gentle rain fell on Memorial Park during the services held last Saturday morning, but fortunatly heavy rain held off until after the program presented by the American Legion.

The parade, colorfully led by the Ramsey High School band proceeded through

town on schedule and arrived at the park at 10 o'clock. The parade members took their places quickly and a good crowd gathered on the green for the services.

Charles Tricker, businessman from Saddle River, gave the main address in which he said he thought Memorial Day services too often were devoted to those who died for their country, and not enough to the responsibilities of those who must go on living.

"Living is much more difficult to do than dying," he said. And those of us who are alive, he continued, must be

true to those who died by being alive to our heritage.

Mr. Tricker said we must be alive to the privilege of freedom, not merely passive in our acceptance of the benefits our soldiers fought to maintain. We must be alive, he said, to our public responsibility to our neighbors, to our communities and to our government.

"In these days we are indeed our brother's keeper," Mr. Tricker said, and we must be aware of this and be active in the task of living. He closed his address with a poem by Ella Wheeler Wilcox.

## CHESTER SMELTZER TO BRIEF PUBLIC ON SEWER PROBLEM

Sewer needs for the borough and the eventual tying in of Allendale to the trunk line sewer which is under construction south of here, will be discussed at the Council meeting next Thursday night.

Freeholder Chester A. Smeltzer, newly appointed member of the Passaic Valley Flood Control and Chairman of the County Sewer Authority will be the guest of the Council Mayor John Tucker has issued a special invitation to the public to attend this session of the council and hear Mr. Smeltzer speak on flood control in this area and the possibility of sewers for neighboring communities - as well as for Allendale in the future.

Freeholder Smeltzer, former Mayor of Ramsey, is thoroughly familiar with the problems this section of Bergen County has with excessive water and poor drainage.

He will give an account of what has been done to alleviate these problems and will outline what is planned for the future.

All citizens of the borough are urged to attend and acquaint themselves with the problem which Allendale will have to deal with in three years to come.

Meeting starts at 8:30 P. M. Thursday, June 11.

## GOP STILL MINUS COUNCIL CANDIDATE

The Republican Club has delayed announcement of their candidate to run for Borough Council in place of Robert Thomas who has withdrawn.

David Cooper, president of the organization, said that a special meeting would be called during the summer to announce the name of the GOP candidate when a decision is reached.

At the regular meeting held Tuesday at the firehouse, Gil Job, brother of Pat Job who is owner of the Crescent Inn, objected to a resolution the club had passed against rezoning his brothers establishment for business.

Mr. Job, a member of the club, said he thought the action of the GOP was politically unwise.

Sponsors of the resolution agreed with Mr. Job that their action may very well have been politically unwise, but that they felt their organization had a responsibility to speak out on a public question regardless of the consequences.

This subject had been aired at the Planning Board meeting held on Monday night prior to the Council meeting. At that meeting Planning Board Chairman Francis Scafuro read from the state statutes the duties of an advisory committee, and gav mittees fution.

However, Mr. Schmidt was unsatisfied with this and brought the matter to the Mayor and Council. He said his committee felt they were being unjustly treated. "If we do nothing we are criticised. If we do anything his interpretation of the com-we are criticised" he said.

He referred to a letter from the Planning Board which criticized his committeee necimmendatins ti the Council. "If we are to make recommendations only at the request of the Planning board chairman" Mr. Schmitt said "than our work is pitntless" He asked the Council for specific instructions on how to proceed.

The mayor said hestood behind the committee one hundre percentand would try to iron out the difficultieso by calling meeting of Mr. Scafuro and he Advisory committee chair. "There is enough work for oth groups to do" Mayor ucker said.

A report from the Mayor's Committee appointed to investigate Rockland Electric Co. for possible dereliction of duty in restoring services in the borough following the severe ice in January, was turned in at last week's Council meeting.

What the report said in essence was that the committee had found definite evidence that the Rockland Electric Co. had not made adequate provisions of supplies and additional crews to meet the emergency. Pursuance of these charges however ought to be done in concert with other communities who also suffered from the lack of service in January, the committee said.

Mayor Tucker thanked the members of the committee for their work and said that he would contact the Mayors of nearby towns to see if they would join with Allendale in filing a formal complaint before the Public Utility Commission.

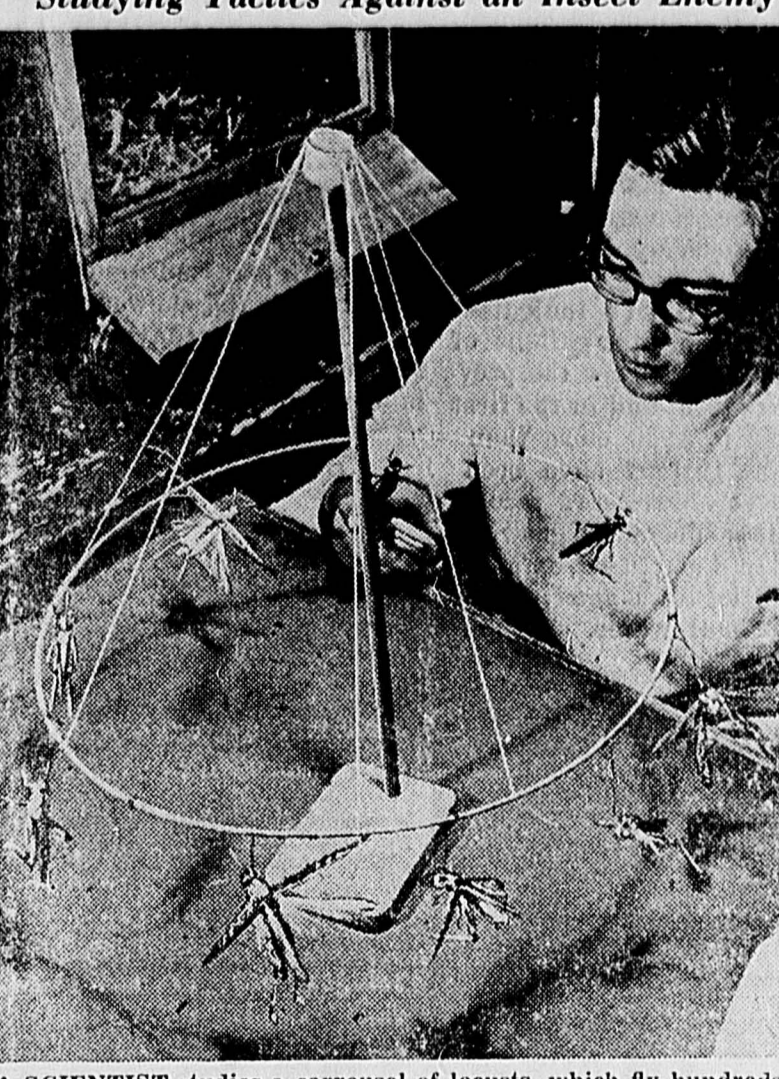

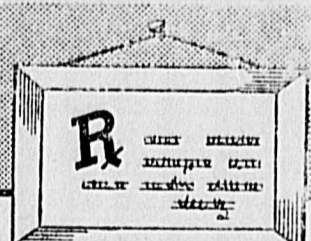
