Kellers, K. D. Howatt and T. L. Everett, of Ramsey; Mrs. W. B. Widnall, of Saddle River; Mrs. G. W. Sawyer, of Upper Saddle River; Mrs. G. O. Uhlman, Mrs. C. M. Breder Jr. and Mrs. F. T. Vilmar of Mahwah.

Mrs. M. A. Kenyon and Mrs. W. C. Yanall were appointed as delegates to represent the Chapter at the National Red Cross Convention to be held in Washington, D. C., June 22-24.

Annual reports were presented by all officers and committee chairmen. In his report to the organization, Mr. Witt commended all those who had worked during the past year and spoke particularly of the work done by Mrs. Kenyon as Blood program chairman and Allan C. Jacobson, fund drive chairman.

Mr. Jacobson reported that a total of \$10,896.10 has been received in the annual fund drive. This amount is more than \$1,000 over the chapter quota and Mr. Jacobson was outspoken in his praise of those who contributed to the drive both with money and with work.

Dorothy Metzger and Ruth Ann Bidlack of Ramsey were announced as Junior Red Cross delegates for training sessions to be held at Hood College in Frederick, Md., June 28 to July 5. The sessions are designed to give potential leaders a picture of the nature, philosophy and scope of the Red Cross movement and to equip the junior members with the knowledge, skills and inspiration necessary to strengthen their local Junior Red Cross program.

Six Jersey City youths broke into a juke box at the concession owned by Robert Conklin at Crestwood Lake last Sunday afternoon and were caught by Police Chief Robert Wilson.

Four of the youths were booked at the county jail in Hackensack on a charge of breaking and entry. The two younger members of the group were placed in the Bergen County Children's Home in Hackensack for a similar offense.

She said she had found a great deal of support for the idea of a town directory and is ready to begin work with her committee right away in order to get the book published by fall.

NURSING SERVICE OPEN DRIVE FOR OPERATING FUNDS

The records of the Northern Bergen Nursing Service disclose that last year Allendale received more than 600 free visits from the visiting nurse — more than any other town served in this area.

Mrs. Frank Winters, chairman of the current fund raising drive, said she didn't know why Allendale should have more nursing service than the other communities served by the NBNS.

"But it does show how important the nursing service has come to be," Mrs. Winters said. Mrs. Winters also expressed her confidence that this year the community would support the nursing service with substantial contributions. Letters to this effect were sent to all box-holders this week.

Of concern to Mrs. Winters is the fact many people seem to have transferred their responsibility for supporting the organization to the Borough Council. For while it is true that the council contributes \$400 annually to the service, this amount of money in no way covers the expenses incurred.

The free visits alone cost more than \$400. And the other charges are deliberately made low, or below cost, in order to be available to everyone.

The visiting nurse has come to be a real part of our community life, Mrs. Winters said, and it is hoped by the local auxiliary that the drive will be generously supported.

LOCAL UNIT AIDS BUILDING PROGRAM

An examination for appointment to Substitute Clerk jobs in the Allendale, New Jersey Post Office has been announced by the Regional Director of the Second United States Civil Service Region, U. S. Civil Service Commission. The starting salary for these jobs is \$1.61 1/2 an hour.

No specific education or experience is required but applicants must take a written examination which includes address checking and a test of their ability to follow instructions.

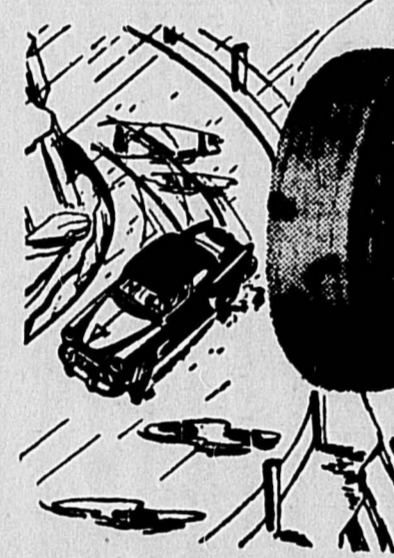

Your Nursing Service Deserves Support

It seems as though every week in the year is some special week for the donating of funds for this cause or another and this week is no exception. The vast number of "drives" are for a worthy cause and this too fills the requirement. For those who don't know, the drive for funds to operate the North Bergen Nursing Service is on and your contribution will be solicited through the mail by members of this organization that serves about seven communities of which Allendale is one.

The service, while it is not free for those who can and should pay, is free to those who can't. Each year the group operates at a loss and needs financial aid from the healthy to take care of the ill.

Last year the group made 4,351 visits to serve the people of these seven communities with Allendale having its fair share of those who needed their services. We have met some of the young ladies who do the work and found them to be personable, efficient and definitely interested in their patient's welfare. What more can any patient want in a nurse regardless of their position?

Of these visits, 43% were paid for, 40% free, with the balance almost evenly divided between part paid and insurance company visits. Most of the visits to the home result from some defect found in the schools or by various board interested in the welfare of the citizens of the community.

Another big service the organization renders to the community is the visits to the expectant mother. Much of the credit for the exceptionally low death rate among infants can be attributed to the knowledge these mothers get from such an organization.

Recently an auxiliary of the North Bergen Nursing Service has started in Allendale and these women are kept busy making dressings so badly needed by cancer patients. The donation you make to this organization will help provide all these needed services.

The Nursing Service is your service so use and support it. It is a service which all can use sometime or other. Every dollar you donate is used for direct service in this community. If you need the services of the organization they are standing by ready to help. This is your chance to reciprocate by helping them to help you to better health during the coming year.

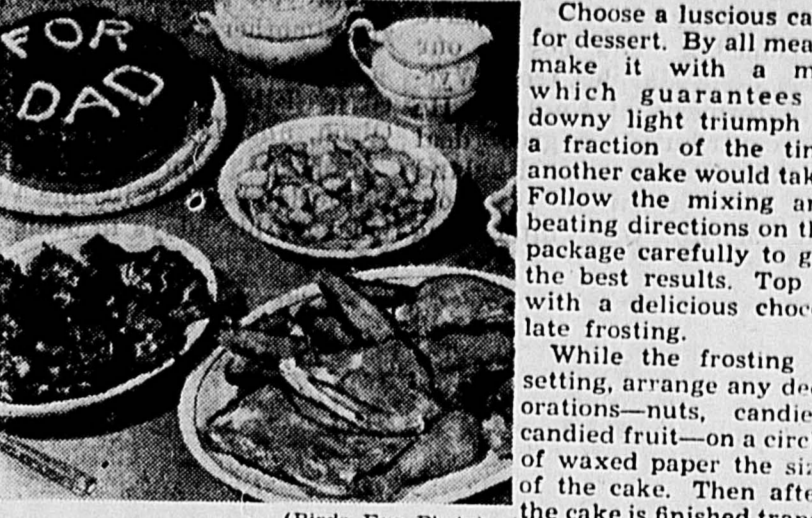

A PARTY FOR DAD

PART OF THE TRADITION OF FATHER'S DAY is to serve Dad all his favorite dishes. Chances are fried chicken rates high on his list of favorites and with the plump, flavorful quick-frozen fryers available you can produce a meal that is fit for a king. Serve the chicken fried to a golden glow of perfection with colorful quick-frozen vegetables and a big tossed salad.



You can inscribe your cake with an appropriate greeting: "To Dad, cinnamon drops or baby gumdrops, or with little candies. The work will be a lot easier if you arrange them first on a round of paper.

FRIED CHICKEN

Thaw quick-frozen frying chicken or chicken parts just enough to separate pieces.
Sprinkle well with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Fry sizzling hot fat, 4 to 1/2 inch deep, in heavy skillet until lightly browned on both sides. Reduce heat and cook slowly 20 to 30 minutes longer, or until tender, turning parts frequently. Serve on hot platter with cream gravy. Makes 4 servings. (ANS)

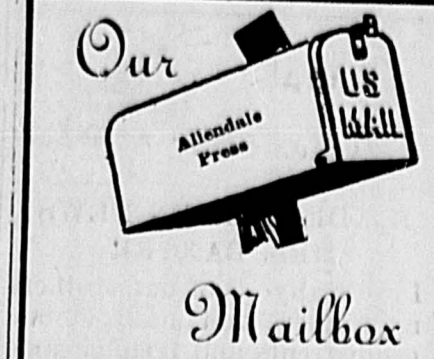

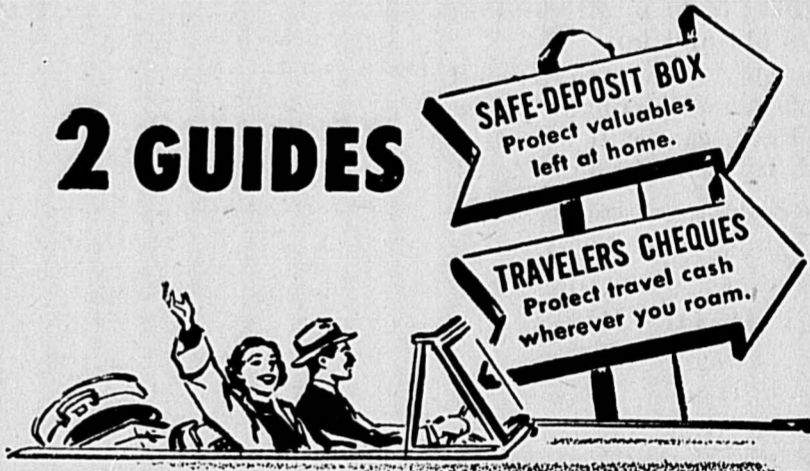
