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Smeltzer Outlines Plan For Sewage Program

Freeholder Chester A. Smeltzer promoted the coming trunk line sewer project that will someday cut through the borough, at last Thursday's Council meeting. He spelled out how Allendale can get in on the ground floor of the Bergen County Sewer Authority, if it so desires.

The pollution in this area of Bergen county is getting very serious, Freeholder Smeltzer said. "And if anyone doesn't think we need sewers now, then heaven help us ten years from now."

He admitted that the biggest job ahead was to "sell" the communities of this area on the project. The more towns that join the authority, the cheaper the cost to everyone, he said.

Freeholder Smeltzer spoke enthusiastically of his pet project and described in general how the authority would work. No mention was made of how much the sewer line would cost.

The project is just now getting its feet off the ground, Freeholder Smeltzer said. The engineer's survey for the entire area was ordered last week and "by Christmas" the report ought to be complete. Then Allendale and neighboring communities will know the extent of the costs.

But the benefits described by Freeholder Smeltzer were glowing. Each community that joins the Authority will be a member of the corporation and will have a voice in directing its affairs.

The alternative to not joining, would merely mean delaying what is going "to have to come," Freeholder Smeltzer said. Other communities in this area, he said, are faced with a far more serious sewage problem than Allendale. He mentioned three towns which already have expressed a desire to join — Ramsey, Midland Park and Waldwick.

If those towns do join, Allendale would then be in between two towns connected to

Allendale School Holds Impressive Graduation

Wednesday night was warm and clear overhead — an altogether fitting June evening for the 27 graduates of the Allendale Public School.

Promptly at 8:15 the graduates marched down the aisles of the school auditorium to take their places on stage facing a packed audience of families and friends.

The graduates made a rainbow of color as they sat in a semi-circle on the platform banked with spring flowers. The girls in their summer pastel graduation dresses carried colonial bouquets. The boys provided contrast in their gray jackets and dark blue slacks.

The program given by the class was designed for the entertainment of all. Music was provided by the chorus, made up of the graduates and a number of students from the lower grades. They sang "The Lord's Prayer" and a lighthearted number called "Country Style" which was illustrated by pantomime and musical jugs.

A highly non-academic look at grammar school education was presented by class members who read short compositions on their views of what really happens at school. It was a humorous sketch called "Eighth Grade Echoes."

Two ballet numbers were danced in costume by graduates Beatrice Forsyth and Barbara Robbins.

Deborah Higgins presented the class prophecy by using cards. As each graduate drew his card, Deborah read out the message it foretold—much to the embarrassment of the graduate, but to the delight of the audience.

Frank Vogt presented Principal Paul O'Connor with the class gift of \$100 to be applied to the purchase of sound equipment to be used in the auditorium.

Mr. O'Connor praised the members of the class for their generosity and for the usefulness of the gift they had chosen. He then read off the names of the prize winners.

COUNCIL ORDERS ALLENDALE AVE. SURVEY MADE

An engineer's survey of both sides of W. Allendale Ave from Franklin Turnpike up to Myrtle Avenue was ordered at last week's council meeting.

The survey, an extension of the work already done by the borough engineers for the corner of Franklin Turnpike and W. Allendale Ave., is needed to get county cooperation in rounding off the corner. Also, the extended survey will be used in the future if and when W. Allendale Ave. is widened up to the business section.

Scafuro - Williams Renew Old Feud

Before a relatively small audience the Planning Board tried to conduct its business despite criticism from the floor and unprecedented attacks upon individual members of the Board.

Frank Williams, a member of the advisory committee to the Planning board appointed by Mayor John Tucker, repeated charges that the Planning Board was "doctoring" the minutes by refusing to take verbatim account of what is said at the meetings.

Planning Board Chairman Frank Scafuro said that the minutes of the Board could not be taken verbatim because the Board was not a court. He read from "Roberts Rules of Order" a definition that minutes were to record action taken, not what was said.

Mr. Williams accused Mr. Scafuro of dictating the minutes to the secretary, Mrs. W.

James Hall, after the meetings were held.

Mr. Scafuro demanded an immediate apology but Mr. Williams did not comply.

Trouble between the Advisory Committee and the Planning Board stems from a lack of understanding on the part of the advisory committee as to its function, Mr. Scafuro said. Mayor Tucker had promised at the last Council meeting to try and iron out differences between the two groups by meeting personally with Mr. Scafuro and Charles Schmitt, chairman of the advisory group. The Mayor was not present at the meeting Monday night, but it was obvious no reconciliation had taken place.

Pat Job, still smarting from the refusal of the Borough Council to grant a business zone status to his Crescent Inn, asked the Board to reconsider its previous decision denying a

change.

He charged that one member of the Planning Board was a member of Alcoholics Anonymous and thereby was prejudiced against his business.

Chester Bardsley answered the charge. He said he was a member of Alcoholics Anonymous, but this did not influence his decision regarding Mr. Job's tavern.

Mr. Bardsley said that he was not against taverns at all, that he served liquor in his home and in his business he frequently went to bars and taverns.

Mr. Bardsley made it quite clear that his personal problem had no bearing on the decision and said Mr. Job's charge ought to be disregarded by the Planning Board. No action was taken on Mr. Job's request.

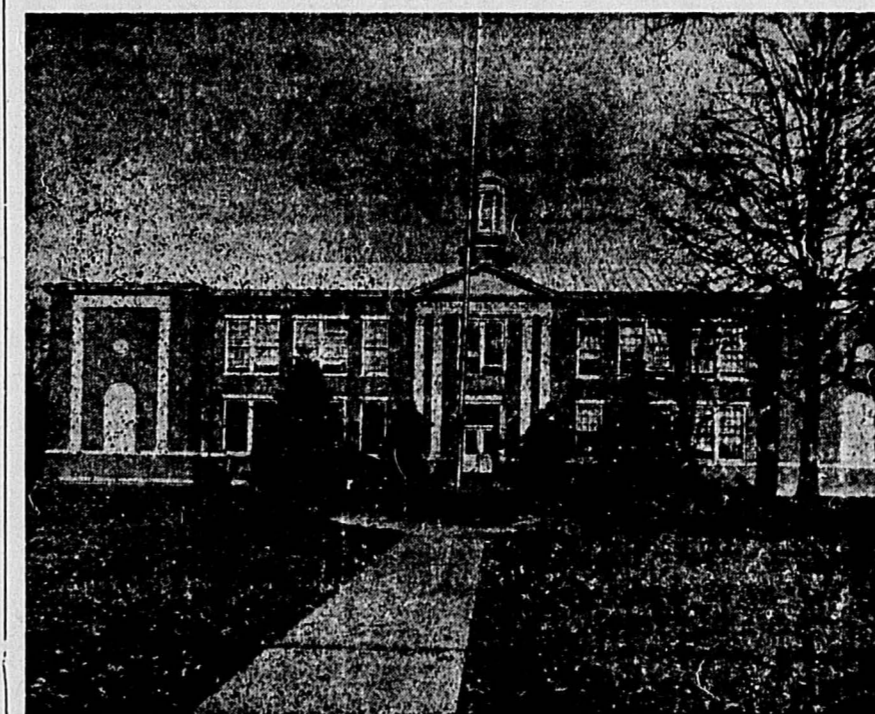

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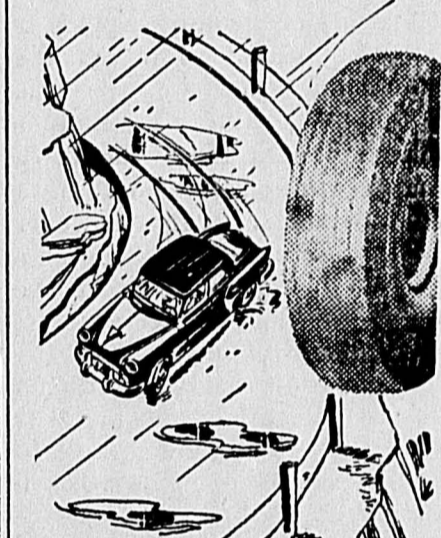

(Continued from Page 1) the trunk sewer.

Councilman Frank McCord asked what would happen if Allendale didn't go in with the others when the trunk line was established, and Freeholder Smeltzer said that the town might join at a later date on a rental basis. This however would leave the borough subject to being cut off if the trunk line had to decrease its service in any way.

"One thing we've got to get out of our minds, is the fear that this project is going to ruin us financially," Mr. Smeltzer said.

He described the authority as a corporation that would do all the construction work and finance the project. Each town would be charged by the amount of sewage it disposed of. This cost, Freeholder Smeltzer estimated at about half the water bill we now pay.

The lateral connections to the trunk line would have to be financed by the member borough. Pipe connections to homes would be assessed against the individual property owners under a long time payment plan.

Walter Dunsby asked if real

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estate values would increase if the sewers came in. Mr. Smeltzer was reluctant to speculate, but he said he didn't see how sewers could help but enhance real estate values.

Mr. Smeltzer was generous in his praise of Mayor John Tucker and Borough Clerk Charles Vollaro, who he said, made persistent visits to the Board of Freeholders, to secure benefits for Allendale. He also cited former Mayor Leslie Johnson for what he called "yeoman's work" in setting up the Sewer Authority.
