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Garden Club Announces New Shows Schedule

Husing, it was voted to hold this year's Flower Show in December and to have the following show nine months later in September. The new schedule of Shows will be every nine months in order to allow town residents to enter all of their types of flowers and shrubs.

Hints For Gardeners

Earle Conklin prepared a listing of garden jobs for the month of August. The 20 members present read the various hints from the listing prepared by Mr. Conklin. The following hints should be helpful to all the local gardeners.

Bleeding Heart, Lupines, Oriental Poppies and evergreen trees and shrubs may be transplanted now.

Lift and divide daffodil and Japanese Iris this month. Cut back Delphiniums after they have flowered.

Nearly all annuals will stop flowering if the seed pods are allowed to form.

Cut dead flower from Lilacs, Azaleas and Rhododendrons to prevent seed formation. Constant washing of evergreen foliage is desirable wherever possible as it helps control redspider. Now is the time to sow the perennials, but in hot weather it is well to cover seed bed with cloth or burlap.

Cut flowers should be cut early in the morning.

WIDNALL GOES TO BAT FOR LOCAL WOMAN

Congressman William Widnall introduced a bill in the final days of the 83rd Congress in behalf of Mrs. Josef Ablassmeir, a native of Germany, working in Allendale as a domestic. The bill would permit entry of her husband into this country from Canada where he is now waiting the verdict of the lawmakers.

The House passed the bill but it had to be passed by the Senate and signed by the President before Mr. Ablassmeir could join his wife.

The reason the case was brought to the attention of Congressman Widnall is that back in 1946, Munich-born Ablassmeir stole a bicycle tire pump and was punished under the law.

The misdemeanor cost Mr. Ablassmeir his entry into this country when he and his bride sought to come to this country in 1951.

Mr. Ablassmeir and her two children got into the country but the immigration authorities barred Mr. Ablassmeir on grounds of moral turpitude when they learned his record. He had to go to Toronto where he is still waiting for permission to enter the United States.

MAC GOWAN FAMILY IN RID'WOOD CRASH

Thomas J. Mac Gowan, son of Mrs. Thomas J. Mac Gowan of Maple Ave., Allendale narrowly escaped serious injury the accident caused six persons to be taken to Valley Hospital suffering injuries received in a two car accident at Spring and Hope Sts., police reported.

The injured were Robert Mac Gowan, 15, Marion MacGowan, 42, Ethel Richardson, 39, and Brooks Richardson, 39, all of McCoysville, Pa., suffering possible fractured skulls and contusions. They were occupants of a station wagon driven by Thomas J. MacGowan, 48, of McCoysville. Mrs. Lynn Stratman, 29, of 348 Harristown Road, Glen Rock, driver of the other vehicle, was released after treatment for contusions. Also injured was Kay Shawley, 16, of the Glen Rock address, occupant of the Stratman car, who was treated for contusions of the left arm.

Mrs. Stratman told police she was traveling south on Hope St. and did not come to a stop at the intersection of Spring Avenue. She did not see the station wagon crossing on Spring St., she said, and was struck on the left and hit a tree between the curb and the sidewalk.

The accident was investigated by Patrolman Robert Kay who issued a summons to Mrs. Stratman for failing to stop for a stop sign.

N. Y. WOMAN FINED FOR DRIVING WITHOUT LICENSE

The peace and quiet of the first week in August was ruffled at Magistrate's Court Tuesday evening. Two tickets were due but only one of them handled during the brief session.

Mrs. Alma Edna Grimes of West New York was fined \$5 plus \$3 for driving without a license last week. Mrs. Grimes was in possession of a driver's permit that had expired. She was accompanied by her son who was a licensed driver when Officer Frank Parenti apprehended her on W. Crescent Avenue near the entrance to Crestwood Lake.

Her son, however, was riding on the right front fender at the time she was apprehended and this did not fulfill legal requirements which state that a driver with a permit must be accompanied in the front seat by a licensed driver.

Inspection Stations Planned By State

Expansion of the state's auto inspection facilities was revealed this week by Motor Vehicle Director William J. Dearden who said that the overtaxing of existing stations in North Jersey is the department's "most pressing problem."

As a result, Dearden said, the division is going ahead with its plans for one new motor vehicle inspection station and four replacements in the area despite a setback given its program when the State Supreme Court declared the State Of-

fice Building Authority unconstitutional.

The division's original expansion program was to provide for six new stations and six replacements for outmoded stations throughout the state, according to Dearden. These facilities were to be constructed by the State Office Building Authority and leased to the division.

But when the Supreme Court invalidated the authority in June, the State House Commission suggested that the division might proceed either by

Ordinance Drafted By Request Of Magistrate

A disorderly persons ordinance for Allendale was drafted last week by Attorney John Warhol, Magistrate Morris Scharf and Councilman Henry Cobb and Elwood Critchley, as a result of an urgent request from the Magistrate.

The request was contained in Magistrate Scharf's bi-annual report to the Council reviewing action of the court.

The ordinance is needed now, the letter stated, during the summer months, and an early adoption of it would save the borough many man hours of Police time which would otherwise be spent at the County Court House.

In answer to a recent criticism of the Police Department, the letter also contained a statement of policy regarding neighboring disputes, which, in view of its clarity, we are reprinting in full:

"The Court has adopted and follows the recommendations of the N. J. Supreme Court in using a 'Notice in Lieu of Complaint' whereby a Magistrate is permitted to issue a Notice, in neighborhood dispute cases, requesting the appearance before the Magistrate for an informal discussion, of the individuals involved, in order to determine whether or not a Complaint should issue. This procedure has been found to be highly successful throughout the state and Magistrates have been urged to adopt it wherever possible. It almost always results in an amicable adjustment of differences, and most individuals involved leave the conference as friendly neighbors rather than feuding ene-

mies.

"It has been called to your Magistrate's attention that an unwarranted criticism has been levelled at the Police Department for refusing to take a complaint in a minor neighborhood dispute matter wherein there was no direct infraction of any ordinance or law. The officers followed your Magistrate's instructions and informed the Complainants of this policy. It apparently did not meet with the complainants approval and is in all probability the reason for their criticism. The Complainants have been involved in several skirmishes requiring police attention during the last year. The alleged Violator has resided in the Boro for a considerable length of time and the police report that his conduct had been excellent over the years with the exception of one incident about two weeks ago when he became intoxicated at a party in his own home.

"Your magistrate feels that it is not always wise to adopt a 'get tough' policy or impose penalties in neighborhood dispute matters. A minor misunderstanding, when adjusted informally, usually results in friendlier neighbors rather than neighborhood enemies. If the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Allendale prefer that this procedure be abandoned, in view of the criticism, your Magistrate would be willing to oblige.

(The following editorial, reprinted from "Publishers' Auxiliary," is a clear statement of the responsibilities and obligations assumed by the editor of a local weekly newspaper. We are publishing it here because it closely approximates the thinking that has governed the approach of the Allendale Press, and will continue to be our guide during the illness of Publisher Jim Martin.) -The Staff

IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST

When the young man or young woman picks rural newspapering as a career, and buys or starts a village or town newspaper with a determination to render assistance to the town or village in which they are interested, that young man or woman has started on a lifetime job. No matter what they accomplish the time never comes when they can call their job completed. Through their efforts the general store may have given place to reasonably stocked department stores; the home market place buying may have doubled, but the job is not done. There is always something more to keep them busy and on the alert.

But the results show satisfactory progress, and make the job well worth while, even though those for whom they are striving fail to express their satisfaction.

The rural editor derives the satisfaction that comes from accomplishment, and the joy of doing from his efforts to accomplish results for his community.

Seldom is one found who has engaged in the production of a rural newspaper whether it be a man or a woman, who has engaged in such an enterprise with the idea of it producing any large amount of wealth from the enterprise. If it produces results for the community for which they work, and a fair living for themselves and their families, it is enough.

Thousands of rural newspapers are producing satisfactory results for their owners, editors and publishers, and will so long as they continue to work at the job they assigned themselves, that of promoting the best interests of their communities.

It is a labor of love that has proven beneficial to the nation, thanks to the thousands of rural editors who never quit on the job of serving the best interests of the communities, and who are not willing to lay down on any unfinished job.

BARBARA BUHLMAN TO ENTER FAIRLEIGH D'KINSON

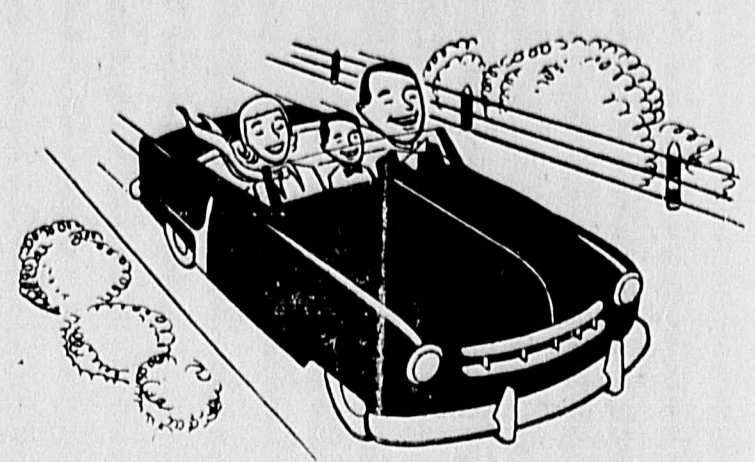
