Planning Board Sends Dispute to Attorney

Members of the Planning Board sat in weary silence when the Crescent Heights development case came up for discussion at the close of a lengthy meeting Monday night. The Board decided that the issues had become too involved for them to handle.

They wrapped up the entire file, which has been building over a period of 7 months, and sent it the Borough Council with the recommendation that it be turned over to the Borough Attorney, John Warhol.

The Board planned to write a covering letter to the council giving a resume of all that has transpired in the case thus far.

A letter from George Wilson of July 13 containing a threat of legal action against the borough prompted the Board to take this action.

Francis Scafuro, chairman of the Board, said that the charges raised by Mr. Wilson were serious and could not be kept in the hands of the Board any longer. Mr. Wilson had charged that previous decisions of the Planning Board regarding the Crescent Heights development had stalled further expansion of the area and caused him the loss of an anticipated revenue of \$60,000.

Mr. Scafuro had asked Mr. Wilson to submit a 'bill of particulars' specifying his grievances. At meeting time no letter had been received.

Individual board members expressed the opinion that the whole matter was so complicated it would take legal counsel to determine whether or not any violations of local ordinances existed.

The Board also conditionally approved subdivision maps of J. F. Zulig and M. M. Zulig; Gama Inc. which owns lots on W. Maple Street, and lots on Powell Street which were enlarged.

Governor's Race Starts In Boro Sunday Evening

The fall political race for Governor will make an early but auspicious start in Allendale with the Democratic candidate, Robert Meyner, attending a garden party Sunday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Pfister, 475 Franklin Turnpike.

An invitation has been extended to all residents to come and meet Mr. Meyner who is including Allendale in his campaign to visit the smaller communities in Bergen County.

Brief Speech

The Independent Committee for Meyner, sponsors of the garden party, expect the candidate to give a brief speech, answer questions from the floor and then meet the guests informally. He will arrive at the party at 8:30.

Building Inspector Dave Colburn Jr. reported having issued two building permits for new houses; one on Elmwood Avenue and one on Vreeland Place. Need for a revised building code for Allendale was shown when a discussion of prefabricated houses came up. Mr. Colburn had been asked by a citizen if a prefab building might be put up in Allendale. The house in question did not comply with minimum space requirements of the zoning ordinance and therefore permission was denied.

NO COMPLAINTS NO MEETING

The affairs of the borough, at least from the point of view of government, were stopped on dead center last Thursday night when the borough council convened without a quorum. Councilmen Frank McCord, John Wattles and Elwood Critchley were absent.

Mayor Tucker explained to the small audience that no business could be acted upon until the September meeting. Upon the suggestion of Councilman Henry Cobb, who said that "someone might want to complain about something," the Mayor opened the meeting to informal public discussion. There were no complaints. Meeting was adjourned until September 10.

SCHOOL REGISTRATION FOR NEW PUPILS BEGINS MONDAY

Registration for new pupils entering Allendale Public School will take place daily between the hours of 9 a. m. to 12 Noon beginning August 24th, 1953.

Pupils must present all records from former school. Pupils entering kindergarten must be registered by a parent and must present their Birth Certificate and any health records they may have.

Any new students entering Ramsey High School must receive admission slips from the office of the Allendale Public School. These will be issued daily from 9 a.m. to 12 Noon beginning August 24th.

All pupils will report to school on Thursday, September 10th at 9 a.m. Kindergarten children that are registered will receive notices of the hours they will attend school.

Freshmen entering Ramsey High School will report to Ramsey High School at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, September 9.

JOE FOX UNHURT IN MONTANA CRASH

Joseph Fox, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Fox, 154 Mallinson Street, was aboard a National Forest Service aircraft which was forced down near Spotted Bear Ranger Station in the Flathead National Forest in Montana, Monday evening, but he was not injured.

A call was placed from the ranger station in Montana to the Fox family reassuring them that Joseph was not hurt and gave particulars of the emergency landing. A letter followed which described the accident involving six other smokejumpers, some of whom were hurt in the crash landing.

Board Paves Way For Referendum in October

The School Board met Wednesday night in brief session to adopt a resolution to be submitted to the local Government Board and the State Commissioner of Education in Trenton, for the town to exceed its debt limit in floating a bond issue of \$24,000 for the purchase of an additional school site.

Election in October

This action paves the way for the question to be put to the voters in a special election to be held in October. The outcome will decide whether or not the town will purchase 9 acres of land from Dr. Godfrey Pittis for \$26,750, plus legal fees.

The property which is located off Franklin Turnpike south of Ivers Place is being held by the School Board by a \$100 option. The Board has already appropriated \$5,000 from its surplus capital toward the purchase of the land. This will bring the cost of the property down to \$21,750, plus legal fees, to total close to \$24,000.

The Board will hold a public hearing on this matter before the election in October.

The W. Crescent Avenue improvement project is nearing the home stretch. Pat Job, contractor for the curb installation, said that if weather permitted the curbs ought to be complete on both sides of Crescent Ave. by the end of next week.

Engineer Harvey Beswick, supervisor for the job, concurred. He could make no prediction however on when the Borough would resurface the shoulders of the road. The County Road Department, Mr. Beswick said, has agreed to do the east side of W. Crescent Avenue first because that side was torn up last fall by Public Service for the installation of gas pipes. He could not speculate on when the other side would be done.
