Meyner Scores Republicans On Issue Of Corruption

Robert Meyner, Democratic Candidate for Governor, said the number one need in the State of New Jersey is to appoint honest, sincere, qualified men of ability to administrative and judicial posts in the State.

He offered this in a direct challenge to the present administration which he said, "is covering up its tracks as fast as it can on the question of corruption in Bergen County." Recent crime disclosures Mr. Meyner said, "have rocked the very foundations of the Republican party in the State."

Upon later questioning, Mr. Meyner said he fully expected Republican political forces in the State to stall the trial of Harold Adonis until after the election.

"But we have enough evidence of corruption right now," Mr. Meyner said, "without waiting for the Adonis trial. After all, we're still waiting for the Winne trial to come up," Mr. Meyner said.

Mr. Meyner spoke before an estimated audience of 50 persons at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Pfister on Franklin Turnpike Sunday evening.

The meeting of townspeople with the candidate was sponsored by the Independents for Meyner, one of a number of committees working for the Democratic candidate.

Mr. Meyner arrived at the meeting at 8:45 after having talked at five similar citizen's groups during the day. He came to Allendale from Ridgewood where three meetings were held.

The candidate admitted that he was somewhat weary from the day's activities, but as he outlined his views on what needs to be done in New Jersey he warmed to his subject and spoke forcefully but quietly to the guests gathered in the north parlor of the Pfister home.

The Lee Memorial Library will be closed Labor Day and open on Tuesday, Sept. 8 — the usual hours 3:15 to 5:15 and 7:30 to 9 p.m.

Polio Threat Closes Pool As Safety Measure

Although there are no reported cases of polio in the borough of Allendale, Mayor John Tucker and Health Commissioner George Erickson ordered the town pool drained Wednesday afternoon as a precautionary measure.

This action was taken following the outbreak of 7 cases of polio reported in Waldwick, the last of which occurred Tuesday. No further restrictions have been planned for Allendale as long as no cases develop.

Emergency measures have been taken in Waldwick following two town meetings held Tuesday and Wednesday evening. Mayor Nelson J. Lumley said that all public gatherings had been cancelled in the borough. The Methodist Church will not hold services for the next two Sundays, the Library is closed, the Firemen's Picnic has been cancelled and the giant Italian celebration which usually attracts from 2,000 to 3,000 people has been called off.

In Ramsey where one case has been reported, the town pool has been closed.

Precautionary Measure

Mayor Tucker said that the action taken in Allendale is merely precautionary and was not designed to cause alarm. The Mayor explained his position on closing the pool by stating that "if closing our town pool prevents one case of polio, whether we know it or not, then I'm definitely in favor of closing down the pool."

Mr. Erickson issued the following statement:

"There have been reports of several cases of poliomyelitis in Waldwick, N. J. The Board of Health advises that there is no cause for panic in Allendale since no cases have been reported as yet. The swimming pool has been closed as a precautionary measure and will remain closed until further notice."

The pool was scheduled to be closed for the season following the Labor Day weekend.

Postmaster Archie Farrell, Chairman of Civilian Defense, has been in touch with the Polio Foundation. Mrs. Gertrude Taylor, Executive Secretary of the Bergen County Chapter, advises the public to get in touch with Mr. Farrell for additional information about the disease, or contact the Foundation headquarters (Please Turn to Page Six)

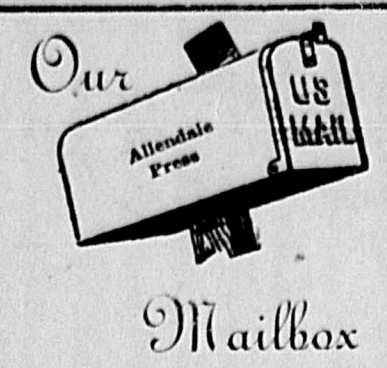
Mr. Spilling has just spent a five-day leave with his parents vacationing at Olive Bridge in the Catskills.

LOW BACTERIAL COUNT IN ALLENDALE POOL WATER

The Allendale pool which has been more widely used this summer than ever before had a remarkable record for purity. Joseph Tremitiere, lifeguard, reported that bacterial count in the pool water was lower in many instances than drinking water.

Five samples of water were taken from different points in the pool and sent to the laboratory for analysis. Time after time the report has come back saying that the samples have a bacterial count of 10. The highest count recorded was only 31. Drinking water has a count of less than 12.

Mr. Tremitiere says that this is in sharp contrast to samples taken from pools in this (Please Turn to Page Six)

The Editor Allendale Press Dear Sir:

In the interests of achieving the community harmony for which your paper is always striving, may I call your attention to certain inaccuracies in the last issue of the Allendale Press covering the August 17th Planning Board action on Crescent Heights Development.

The Planning Board decided to refer the 'Crescent Heights' case to the Mayor and Council for study by the Borough Attorney because of the implied threat of suit against the Borough by the developer and not because, "the issues had become too involved for" the Planning Board to handle.

1. The Planning Board is fully conversant with and quite capable of understanding all of the issues involved.

2. The "Crescent Heights Development" matter originated in April 1950, over three years ago, and not "over a period of seven months" as you indicated.

3. Your newspaper quotes the developer as having stated that, "previous decision of the Planning Board . . . had stalled further expansion of the area and cost him the loss of an anticipated revenue of \$60,000." No such statement was made at the Planning Board meeting. In fact, Mr. Wilson, who was present, made no comment whatsoever with respect to the Crescent Heights Development.

In the interests of achieving the fullest possible cooperation between the Planning Board and those of our citizens intending to subdivide land, your correspondent was furnished with a typewritten statement referring to the Land Subdivision Regulations recently adopted by the Planning Board and stating the objectives of such regulations. We trust that you will find it possible to assist the Board in bringing these regulations and their objectives to the attention of the community.

The regulations and forms, together with the Land Subdivision, Zoning, and other related ordinances, are available to the public in a compact envelope at a price of \$1.00. Real estate agents and property owners expecting to subdivide and develop their lands are urged to familiarize themselves with these regulations and ordinances.

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Cerebral Palsy Horse Show Largest Help In New Jersey

The fourth annual Cerebral Palsy Horse Show of Bergen County, scheduled to be held at the Allendale Recreation Park, October 17 and 18, will be the largest affair of its kind ever held in New Jersey. Professional riders from all over the country, including many who participate annually in Madison Square Garden Horse Show will go to the Bergen County event. All proceeds of the show will go to the Bergen County Cerebral Palsy Center, Ridgewood, which has been providing care for some 200 children weekly.

Governor Alfred E. Driscoll has agreed to serve as Honorary Chairman. Prominent also in supporting the show are Lansing Shield, of Ridgewood, president of Grand Union, and Mrs. Fred Link, of Westwood. The Links have raised show horses for a number of years. Their daughter has appeared several times in the Madison Square Garden Horse Show.

Souvenir Program Alfred B. Blaikie, of Allendale Avenue, co-chairman of the show, said today that one of the features this year will be a unique souvenir program dedicated to the merchants of Bergen County. Special pages in the souvenir program will be reserved for the merchants of each community, according to the announcement.

As an unusual feature of the show, merchants advertising in the program will be permitted of their town to the winner of one of the scheduled events, in recognition of their cooperation with the Bergen County Cerebral Palsy League. "We expect that there will be many communities thus represented in the horse show," said Blaikie. "Already several leading merchants have been signed up for participation in the souvenir booklet by our advertising committee chairman, Edward Marron, of Ho-Ho-Kus. CLEANLINESS FIGHTS POLIO

POLIO CAN ENTER THE BODY THROUGH THE MOUTH OR nose, so that the face and hands are obvious danger spots. Before your child eats anything—even an ice-cream cone or a sandwich—and-milk snack—see that his hands have been scrubbed to spotless cleanliness. Place soap and a brush at every available wash-up spot in the house and make sure he uses them frequently. It's the best kind of insurance against the tiny virus that can cause so much harm to young lives. The best measures against polio, during warm weather when the danger is greatest, are to keep children from getting overtired or chilled, to keep them away from new groups, and to keep them clean. This advice from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis makes good sense. Over-fatigue and chills lower resistance—an obvious come-on to disease. New groups of people from other localities bring added danger of infection. And since any virus thrives on dirt, extra attention to cleanliness is a wise precaution.

Observe These Rules

The Board of Health has issued the following precautions to the public.

1. See that children retire at an early hour in the evening.
2. Have children wash hands before meals, take plenty of baths and in every way keep as clean as possible.
3. It is advisable to keep children away from large gatherings of people. (This was a determining point in closing the pool.)
4. If your child has been exposed to polio, keep him and yourself calm. Be alert for the first symptoms of the disease.
5. Be especially alert to sore throat, fever, headache, nausea and lassitude. Be watchful for any pain or stiffness in the neck or back, and any weakness of the muscles. Remember

that warmth, inactivity and rest at the very beginning of an attack are your best defense. Contact your doctor immediately and be guided by his advice.

6. If possible avoid having teeth pulled, nose, mouth or throat operations during the polio season.
8. Teach your child to avoid exposure to the spray from the nose and mouth of others, and do not let him play with anyone who seems to have a cold.
9. Emphasize the need for washing hands with soap and hot water after every trip to the bathroom.
10. Avoid the use of common or unclean eating and drinking utensils.
11. Keep hands and unclean articles away from the nose and mouth.
12. Swimming in clean water does not expose your child to polio but over exertion and chilling are apt to make him more susceptible to the virus.
13. Above all do not let any member of your family get over tired or chilled.

favored a state income tax or sales tax. He was against both, and said that no candidate could hope to be elected in New Jersey if he favored either.

Mr. Meyner said that New Jersey roads are wholly inadequate for today's traffic and said that the Highway department has been constantly curtailed in its work of road improvement for the past 6 years.

"The Republican's have glossed over this deterioration with fancy plans for toll roads and throughways which benefit people who wish to get through the state, rather than those who live in the state."

On the question of non-resident taxes, which New York imposes on New Jersey residents who work in New York, Mr. Meyner was somewhat bitter against his opponent Paul Troast who has come out against this practice.

Mr. Meyner said that he too, was against this tax but that the matter had to be handled by the Federal Government. He said Mr. Troast was deliberately trying to confuse the issue.

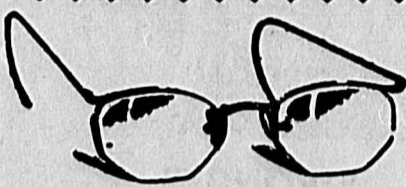
