Meyner Scores Republicans On Issue Of Corruption

Robert Meyner, Democratic Candidate for Governor, said the number one need in the State of New Jersey is to appoint honest, sincere, qualified men of ability to administrative and judicial posts in the State.

He offered this in a direct challenge to the present administration which he said, "is covering up its tracks as fast as it can on the question of corruption in Bergen County. Recent crime disclosures Mr. Meyner said, "have rocked the very foundations of the Republican party in the State".

Upon later questioning, Mr. Meyner said he fully expected Republican political forces in the State to stall the trial of Harold Adonis until after the election.

But we have enough evidence of corruption right now," Mr. Meyner said, 'without waiting for the Adonis trial. After all, we're still waiting for the Winne trial to come up," Mr. Meyner said.

Mr. Meyner spoke before an estimated audience of 50 persons at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Pfister on Franklin Turnpike Sunday evening.

Emergency measures have been taken in Waldwick following two town meetings held Tuesday and Wednesday evening. Mayor Nelson J. Lumley said that all public gatherings had been cancelled in the borough. The Methodist Church will not hold services for the next two Sundays, the Library is closed, the Firemen's Picnic has been cancelled and the giant Italian celebration which usually atracts from 2,000 to 3,000 people has been called

In Ramsey where one case has been reported, the town pool has been closed.

Precautionary Measure Mayor Tucker said that the action taken in Allendale is merely precautionary and was not designed to cause alarm. The Mayor explained his position on closing the pool by stating that "if closing our town pool prevents one case of polio, whether we know it or not, then I'm definitely in favor of closing down the pool."

Mr. Erickson issued the following statement:

"There have been reports of several cases of poliomyelitis in Waldwick, N. J. The Board of Health advises that there is no cause for panic in Allendale since no cases have been reported as yet. The swimming pool has been closed as a precautionary measure and will remain closed until further notice."

The pool was scheduled to be closed for the season following the Labor Day week-

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



chilled, to keep Good hygiene, based on soap-and-water cleanliness, is a major protection against polio, according to the experts. Since the virus can enter the body through the mouth, children should be keep them taught to always scrub their hands before eating.

This advice from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis makes good sense. Over-fatigue and chills lower resistance-an obvious come-on to disease. New groups of people from other localities bring added danger of infection. And since any virus thrives on dirt, extra attention to cleanliness is a wise precaution.

The reason why the town pool is so clean, Mr. Tremitiere says, is because it is small and can be carefully controlled. Also, fresh water pumped into the pool almost constantly, with a slight amount of Chlorine added, keeps down the bacterial count.

The pool has operated in much the same manner as in former years, Mr. Tremitiere says. He can detect no substantial difference in pool activity this year with the pool under town management, than in former years when it was operated by the citizens' Swimming Pool Association.
