BULLETIN When the water pumps

started pumping air yesterday morning one of the wells that supply the town, Commissioner Henry Cobb, on the advice of the water superintendent, issued the tollowing order:

"No more lawn sprinklers are to be used until further notice."

The Police have been instructed to see that the order is obeyed so that the supply of water, which is at a dangerously low level, will not be depleted any more than is necessary. Other water conservation measures, such as turning off dripping faucets, etc., are adand sanitation, will be convised also.

The present prolonged dry spell is eating into the town water supply at an alarming rate, informed sources report, At the present time the water pumps are woking round-theclock to supply the town needs The tank is only about half full and has been lower from time to time.

A word of caution has been issued to all residents not to use excessive amounts of water. The supply appears to be adequate for the water needs of the borough, but the longer it stays hot and the longer the drouth, the greater the danger of running short.

#### POOL OFFICIALLY CLOSED BY MAYOR

Mayor John Tucker announ ces that the Allendale swimming pool is officially closed for the season. The pool had been scheduled to close after Labor Day but the season was abruptly shortened last week The pool was closed as a pre cautionary measure following an outbreak of polio in Waldwick.

Mayor Nelson Lumley of Waldwick said that no new cases had broken out in his borough and that all but one of the 7 victims would be sent home from the hospital shortly. He expressed satisfaction with the situation remaining status quo, and said that if no new cases broke out in the next week, Waldwick would soon be back to normal. Last week the Waldwick Council voted to cancel all public gatherings scheduled for this week and the Labor Day weekend. The public was asked to cooperate in an all out effort to stop the spread of the disease. The Methodist Church cancelled services for two weeks, the town pool was drained and all civic groups were asked to call off scheduled meetings.
