Bergen Co. Bankers Ass'n Introduce Banking to Schools

As part of its broadened public relations pro gram the Bergen County Bankers Association has announced that it will make available to schools in the county some new and up-to-date educaional ma terial on banking.
President of the Bergen Coun
Bankers Association Coun Vice President, The Garden State National Bank, Teaneck, there will be at least two new teaching aids in printed form hat will be made availabe to the schools during the current school year.
"The first of these teaching aids will be based on a survey we are making, Mr. Bayles gram. "This survey will give us a list of the most common misunderstandings and miscon ceptins about banking encountered in Bergen County. We have engaged a firm of specialists in banking education to take this data and prepare ma terial in proper teaching form that will present the banking facts clearly and accurately.

While this county wide venture into the production o school material is new, indivi dual banks in all parts of the county have been cooperating taking a direct interes in local education, for many years.
Many of the County's banks make it a practice to conduc tourch of stucent groups thro ugh their banking quarters. A large number of the bankers willingly accept invitations to take part in actual classroom presentation of banking subjects by making talks, answering questions, and helping teachers in other ways. Some of the banks make teaching material available, in the form of sample checks, and other forms, films on banking, and other educational material.

We welcome opportunities to cooperate with school officials and teachers," Mr. Edward Hamilton, Vice President of the First National Bank of Allendale said in commenting on the educational program of the bankers. "The boys and girls in school today will soon be adults, working on jobs, run.

W. Allendale broke Wednesday ne at 7:55 p. confusion in signals for the air raid alert which was scheduled at 8 p.m. Firemen attended the fire that broke out in a vacant store located between Moneypnny Processing Company and the Better Sign Studio.

When the alarm was sounded at 8 for the air raid test defense wardens and civil proceeding to their stations Acting Civil Defense Chief Paul O'Connor, and former chief, Thomas Zane, manned headquarters at the firehouse and dispatched police to three cations where, according to ealed orders, conspirator were about to begin blowing up the telephone building, the water works and the Crescen Avenue underpass.
Police quickly rounded up dentified by arm bands,
rought them to headquarters leaving auxiliary police standing guard at the three places. By the time the all clear was ounded all operations had een completed. Members of the air raid group reported back to the firehouse for consultation on proceedures and discussed ways of overcoming difficultes resulting from inabilty to hear the siren and confusion in signals.
