Richard Van Houten and Lew Kort Gain Council Seat in Close Race

The balance of power in Allendale's governing body will shift to the Taxpayer's League members as a result of the election Tuesday of one Council candidate from each of the two opposing slates. The new Borough council will consist of three Republicans and three Taxpayer's Leaguers, with Mayor John L. Tucker holding the deciding vote. Mr. Tucker was elected on the T.L. slate in 1952.

The two new members of the Borough Council, to be installed next January, are Richard Van Houten, T.L., and Lewis Kort, Republican.

Mr. Van Houten was high man in the voting with a clear majority of 577 votes. Mr. Kort edged Walter Dunsby, T.L. candidate, with a bar plurality, 559 to 556. The photo finish was pointed up by the relatively high vote garnered by David Cooper, Republican, who ran just behind the field with 527.

The official decision on the voting was in doubt for several hours Tuesday night until five absentee ballots and one soldier vote could be counted by the election commissioner in Hackensack.

At poll closing, the machines read 556 for Dunsby, 554 for Kort. The absentee votes turned the trick for Mr. Kort, giving him a 3-vote lead over Mr. Dunsby in the final tally.

Dave Colburn, running unopposed on the T.L. slate for Tax Collector, wound up with a total of 768 votes.

On the warmly contested bingo referendum the "yes" votes won in Allendale almost 2 to 1, following a state-wide State Legislature can leagelize trend. This means that the bingo and raffles for charity purposes wherever the local public wants them. The vote here would indicate that bingo would not be opposed as a fund-raiser for charities if the matter were brought to a local option vote.

The referendum on extending tax exemptions and other benefits to the widows of war veterans won overwhelmingly here, as it did in the state returns.

Other trends evident in state voting were also evident in Allendale, though not to the same degree. Allendale's 445 votes for Democrat Robert Meyner against its 637 for Republican Paul Troast was considered a strong Meyner showing, considering that in 1952 the borough had gone Republican by 1,103 to 207 in the Presidential race, 1,047 to 210 in the Congressional contest. EVANGELISTIC MISSION AT ARCHER CHURCH

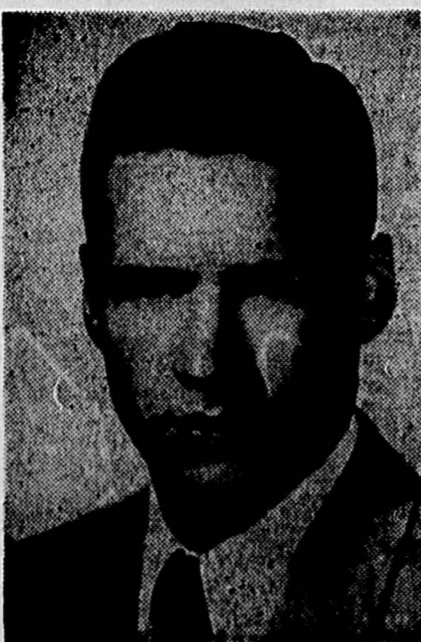
The Archer Memorial Methodist church of Allendale have their plans for the United Evangelistic Mission well formulated.

He will occupy the pulpit at Archer Church on Sunday, Nov. 8 and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 8 p.m.

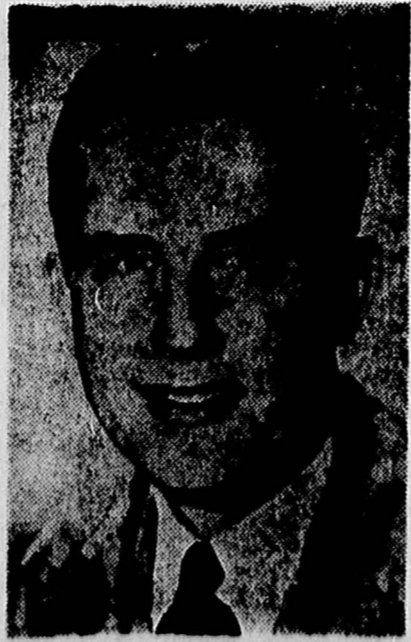

FIREHOUSE GETS HEATING PLANT

Installation of a new oil burner and heating system for the firehouse will be handled by the Hayward Gordon Modern Heating Corporation of Englewood which turned in the low bid of \$1,690 at the Council meeting last Thursday.

An estimate for the job had been set by the Council at \$2,000.

Allendale's Healthy Government

The most heartening aspect of the Nov. 3 local election was the high percentage of participation in our democratic process by Allendale's voting public. A high registration had been inherited from the Presidential election, and according to our own unofficial, and necessarily rough, figures, almost 80 percent of those registered made the trip to the polls.

This is a much better sampling of the public's wishes than could have been hoped for in an off-year election. This fact alone gives strength to the borough government.

Perhaps the most significant fact about the breakdown of the voting on the local scene was the close bunching of all the Borough Council candidates around the mid-way mark. Mr. VanHouten was elected with a scant but clear majority. Mr. Kort barely nosed out Mr. Dunsby. Even Mr. Cooper trailed only slightly.

The record shows that all four were strong candidates with good following. The record also shows that there was a good deal of ticket-splitting on the local ballot, and in these facts lies a nice political lesson for Allendale's leaders.

There can be no talk here of "mandates" for any minor programs. It seems evident that the voters were swayed little by emotion and sought after the facts and moderate, reasonable promises. There is no doubt that a thoughtful electorate has voted for good government, above all. They have apparently backed, without sharp division, the things all four candidates stood for: responsible, economical government with sound financial policies; and continued careful zoning and planning for Allendale's growth, with an eye to maintaining the borough's rural atmosphere.

In effect they have voted for the men and not the parties.

In so doing, they have not settled detailed problems such as the handling of the non-conforming status of certain businesses now in areas zoned as residential or the exact limitations to apply in regulating subdivision lots. But inspection of the voting shows definitely that there can be no political debts to be paid by either of the new councilmen. They are completely free to pursue their jobs, as they must, with the interests of the entire population of Allendale foremost in their minds.

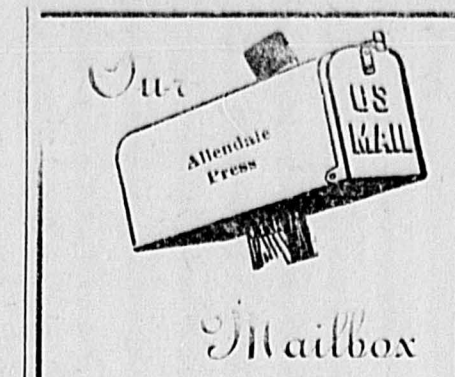
It is notable also that with the new division in the council, in which Mayor Tucker holds the tie-breaking vote, Mr. Tucker gains both in power and responsibility. His task, no doubt, now becomes more difficult and his leadership in the public interest even more necessary.

Public interest in borough affairs is running high. This is a healthy situation for any government. With such responsibilities heaped on their shoulders, the Mayor and Council have every right to ask and expect the public to support them wholeheartedly in their sincere efforts to give good government to Allendale.

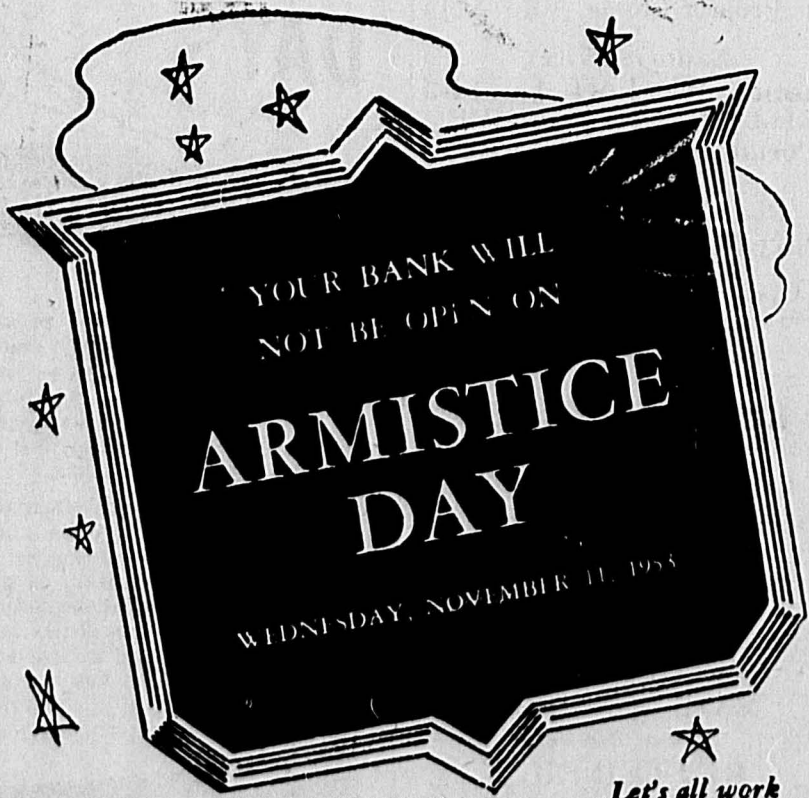
