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## Science Fiction Author Speaks To PTA Meet

Science author Franklyn Branley scored a huge success with Allendale's sixth, seventh and eighth graders at Wednesday's PTA meeting. Mr. Branley signed dozens of autographs after his talk on space exploration. Pleased to see so many children present, he said, "For an adult audience I would have to speak in very simple language, but with young people I can be much more technical," and from the questions put to him by youngsters, it was quite evident they were well informed.

Science fiction which includes "bug-eyed" monsters" insults our intelligence, stated Mr. Branley, and in his talk discussed the practical ways in which scientists hope to conquer space. Color slides of the three stage rocket ship, outer space station, moon landing, etc., were shown. Mr. Branley's six science books written with Nelson Beeler were later examined by many parents. They are: Experiments in Science More Experiments in Science, Experiments with Airplane Instruments, Experiments in Optical Illusion, Experiments with Electricity, Experiments in Chemistry. In addition, there is "Lodestar: Rocket Ship to Mars," which is Mr. Branley's own science-fiction work, for older boys and girls. The PTA is indebted to the "Reading is Fun" program of the New York Times for making Mr. Branley available to us.

Six panelists presented the topic: "How Parents Can Help With the Reading Program," mediated by Mr. Eric Smith, principal of Ramsey Elementary School. They were Miss Mary A. Hubbard, first grade teacher of Ramsey Tisdale School, Mrs. Eleanor Macardel of the No. 1 Ramsey school, Mrs. Austin Sprague, librarian of the Lee Memorial library, Mrs. Willetta La Roe, and Mrs. Stella Almoth of Allendale public school, and Mr. George Wolfson.

Mrs. Joseph Waldorf presided over a display of 200 new books in the school library, loaned by Doubleday Co. The colorful exhibit taxed the room to capacity with "browsers" most of the evening. Mr. R. ## Archibald Farrell Heads New Blood Bank Drive

The new Bergen Community Blood Bank, to be located in Paramus on Route 17, is fast gaining support from all the municipalities in Bergen County.

Allendale is well aware of the need for a blood bank which can supply whole blood to patients in all Bergen County hospitals because at the present time much of our supply has to come from New York City blood banks.

F. Archibald Farrell has accepted chairmanship of the fund raising drive for the borough. Allendale's quota will be only \$700 and Mr. Farrell believes that the money can be raised quickly once people realize the advantages the project affords the community.

"I have accepted the chairmanship of the fund raising drive," Mr. Farrell said, "Because I feel it is a most desired need at the present time."

The idea of an independent blood bank, supported by subscriptions and contributions of whole blood from many people

has been widely accepted in other communities. The project in this county arises out of the need for additional blood supplies because Bergen County is one of the fastest growing counties in the country.

If hospital needs are to be supplied, and a blood supply is to be stockpiled in case of emergency, then the people have to provide it. With this in mind the Bergen County Medical Society and a group of laymen have devised this new plan for a blood bank locally owned and donated.

The bank will be supported by citizens may build up a blood credit in advance at the bank by donating blood, or if necessary patients may pay back blood used, at a later date.

A small technical staff will be employed to supervise the technical operations of the bank, which will be non-profit. Blood will be available to all who need it the lowest possible cost.

## Board Defends Purchase Of School Site

The School Board, through its president James Standing, described the purchase of 9 acres of land as a future school site, as insurance for the future in case the present school becomes overcrowded in the years to come.

The Board's position was not arbitrary. Members frankly admitted they did not know how much the borough would grow or how many students would have to be educated in the future. But they did say

The new site, located off Franklin Turnpike south of Ivers Place is available to the borough for \$29,000.

The School Board has already voted to take \$5,000 from the surplus fund and apply it to the cost of the land. This brings the amount of money which will have to be raised by bond issue to \$24,000.

The site, which has a 155 foot frontage on Franklin Turnpike is cut back into the vacant land between Pittis Avenue and Ivers Place, and provides ample play area and adjacent ground for either a new grade school or possibly a new junior high school. One of its best features is that it is located close to the center of town and within close distance of the more populated area west of the railroad.

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## A New Service Comes To Area

The Vital Need for Bergen County is about to be realized. It is reported that the old Fox Property on Route 17 has been purchased as the future home for the Bergen Community Blood Bank. If one has ever had to sit at the bedside of a very sick loved one and watch this precious fluid give life and hope when the end seems so near. He soon would know the great need of getting strongly behind this project. As in a recent conversation with our own Ambulance Capt. John Comley, who has rushed many a local emergency case to the hospitals. "Why do we have to depend on an outside source for this essential ingredient, let's all roll up our sleeves and give, and keep giving. We might be the next one in need.

Henry J. Gabe of Hackensack will be the general chairman. The Allendale District Chairman will be Richard Amundsen. An effort will be made to raise \$175,000 as the initial cost to get the Bank started. Anyone that can help with the fund raising is urged to contact their District Chairman. The Blood Bank Headquarters will be located at 295 Maint Street, Hackensack.

With the proposed Blood Bank being located in Paramus rendering services such as in the event of disaster in the metropolitan area, which would drain the supply of the city banks, Bergen County would be seriously short of blood, even for routine needs.

The supply will be replenished by a county-wide donor system which will draw blood from individual donors, or from business or industrial groups, or organizations of various types wishing to set up a blood credit for members.

A blood credit may be established by an individual or a family unit simply by giving blood to the bank. The individual is then entitled to use as much blood as he gives the bank in any one year, without charge for the blood itself. There will be a small processing charge on each pint to cover the bank's expenses of processing and storing it. This charge will probably be \$10.00 per pint when the bank starts to function, and it is expected that this amount can be reduced in a short time.

The individual can draw upon his Blood Bank regardless of what hospital or where it is. If an individual needs more blood from the bank than he has been able to give, or if he has not given any blood to the bank and has no credit there, he will be billed by the bank \$25 for each pint of blood, plus the \$10 processing charge.

If he can subsequently replace blood in the bank, the individual will have his money refunded.

Groups which establish credit give blood as often as necessary to maintain at the bank a safe supply to meet the estimated needs of the members.

Blood will be taken from large groups such as business and industrial organizations by bloodmobiles, thus eliminating the need of trips to the bank itself.

## N. J. BELL HAS 4 PERCENT OF NATIONS TELEPHONES

New Jersey, with four percent of the nation's 50,000,000 telephones, has twice the number of phones in service in all Soviet Russia, statistics from New Jersey Bell and five connecting independent companies in the state showed today.

The six New Jersey telephone companies shared in honors at Washington Wednesday when President Eisenhower accepted a gold telephone marking the 50,000,000 telephone installation from Cleo Craig, president of the AT&T and Warren B. Clay, representing nearly 5,200 independent telephone companies across the nation.

New Jersey today has 1,965,092 telephones in service, of which 1,939,952 are operated by New Jersey Bell and the balance by the independents—the New Jersey Telephone Co., Hillsborough & Montgomery; West Jersey, United and Farmers Union Telephone Companies.

Over these telephones, an average of 7,900,000 calls are made each day, and it takes 7,298,000 miles of telephone wire and a plant investment of half a billion dollars just to complete the connections.

Locally, L. H. Kilgo, New Jersey Bell manager here, reports that there are now 2883 telephones in service an increase of 1831 since the end of World War II. Calls here average 14,292 a day.

New Jersey with two telephones for every five residents in the state beats the national average of one telephone for

Soviet Russia, which since before World War II has been loathe to give out any information on telephone development, last officially reported 861,181 phones in service. Bell engineers believe that Russia still has yet to reach the 1,000,000 mark in telephones.

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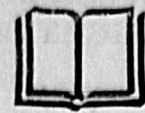
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**FRIDAY THE 13TH TURNS UP AGAIN**

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### VOCATIONAL SCHOOL HAS NEW BOOKS

The library of the Bergen County Technical and Vocational High School is richer by an extensive collection of film and books presented by the Aluminum Company of America recently. The material is now being classified, and will be available in the school library for classroom use shortly, according to Harold A. Weideli, director of vocational education, who accepted the gift on behalf of the school.

### Bergen Pines Hospital Budget Near-Million

Cost of operating Bergen Pines County Hospital last year was \$925,711, Dr. Rufus R. Little, superintendent of the hospital, reported today in his annual summary of the Pines. This cost compares with \$586,908 in 1951. Dr. Little told the Board of Freeholders, pointing out that the cost of operation of a general hospital is always greater than that of a chest disease and contagious disease hospital.

Bergen Pines opened its new 9-story addition in June, 1952, thus greatly enlarging the size of the institution as well as the scope of its services. The per capita cost of the Pines in 1952 was \$9.42, compared with \$7.63 in 1951, for the higher cost of living has struck hospitals as well as individuals. The increase, says Dr. Little, is modest, and is below the average cost of operation of similar hospitals.

In 1952, the figure for salaries was \$540,828, or 58.4 per cent of the total cost of operation. The figure compares with \$342,169 in 1951, which was 58.3 per cent of the total.

Food cost \$140,708 in 1952 which was 15.2 per cent of the total cost, compared with \$125,424 in 1951, which was 21.4 per cent of the total cost. Dr. Little notes that the

Board of Freeholders has been cooperative in providing every facility necessary for the proper care and treatment of patients, and that the advent of the new building had brought about an increase in both service and facilities.

There were 98,267 patient days at the Pines in 1952, compared with 76,915 in 1951. The average number of patients daily in 1952 was 268, compared with 211 in 1951.

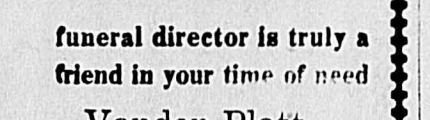

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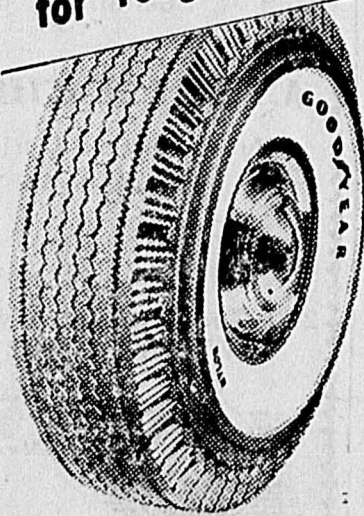
