Science **Fiction Author** PTA Meet To Speaks

Science author Franklyn Branley scored a huge success with Allendale's sixth, seventh and eighth graders at Wednesday's PTA meeting. Mr. Branley signed dozens of autographs after his talk on space exploration. Pleased to see so many children present,

he said, "For an adult audience I would have to speak in very simple language, but with young people I can be much more technical," and from the questions put to him

by youngsters, it was quite evident they were well inform-

ed.

Science fiction which includes "bug-eyed" monsters' insults our intelligence, stated Mr. Branley, and in his talk discussed the practical ways in which scientists hope to conquer space. Color slides of the three stage rocket ship, outer space station, moon landing, etc., were shown. Mr. Branley's six science books written with Nelson Beeler were later examined by many parents. They are: Experiments in Science More Experiments in Science, Experiments with Airplane Instruments, Experiments in Optical Ilusion, Experiments with Electricity, Experiments in Chemistry. In addition, there is "Lodestar: Rocket Ship to Mars," which is Mr. Branley's own science-fiction work, for older boys and girls. The School Board has al. ready voted to take \$5,000 from the surplus fund and apply it to the cost of the land. This brings the amount of money which will have to be raised by bond issue to \$24,-000.

The site, which has a 155 foot frontage on Franklin Turnpike is cut back into the vacant land between Pittis Avenue and Ivers Place, and provides ample play area and adjacent ground for either a new grade school or possibly a new junior high school. One of its best features is that it is located close to the center of town and within close distance of the more populated area west of the railroad.





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A New Service Comes To Area

The Vital Need for Bergen County is about to be realized. It is reported that the old Fox Property on Route 17 has been purchased as the future home for the Bergen Community Blood Bank. If one has ever had to sit at the bedside of a very sick loved one and watch this precious fluid give life and hope when the end seems so near. He soon would know the great need of getting strongly behind this project. As in a recent conversation with our own Ambulance Capt. John Comley, who has rushed many a local emergency case to the hospitals. "Why do we have to depend on an outside source for this essential ingredient, let's all roll up our sleeves and give, and keep giving. We might be the next one in need.

Henry J. Gabe of Hackensack will be the general chairman. The Allendale District Chairman will be Richard Amundsen. An effort will be made to raise \$175,000 as the initial cost to get the Bank stated. Anyone that can help with the fund raising is urged to contact their District Chairman. The Blood Bank Headquarters will be located at 295 Maint Street, Hackensack.

With the proposed Blood Bank being located in Paramus rendering services such as in the event of disaster in the metropolitan area, which would drain the supply of the city banks, Bergen County would be seriously short of blood, even for routine needs.

The supply will be replenished by a countywide donor system which will draw blood from individual donors, or from business or industrial groups, or organizations of various types wishing to set up a blood credit for members.

A blood credit may be established by an individual or a family unit simply by giving blood to the bank. The individual is then entitled to use as much blood as he gives the bank in any one year, without charge for the blood itself. There will be a small processing charge on each pint to cover the bank's expenses of processing and storing it. This charge will probably be \$10.00 per pint when the bank starts to function, and it is expected that this amount can be reduced in a short time.

The individual can draw upon his Blood Bank regardless of what hospital or where it is.

If an individual needs more blood from the bank than he has been able to give, or if he has not given any blood to the bank and has no credit there, he will be billed by the bank \$25 for each pint of blood, plus the \$10 processing charge.

If he can subsequently replace blood in the bank, the individual will have his money refunded.

Groups which establish credit give blood as often as necessary to maintain at the bank a safe supply to meet the estimated needs of the members.

Blood will be taken from large groups such as business and industrial organizations by bloodmobiles, thus eliminating the need of trips to the bank itself.
